<u>Call to Order:</u> The agenda for this meeting was filed with the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, as required by

section 92-7(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS").

There being a quorum present, the Chair called the meeting to order at 9:03 a.m. and excused

the Vice Chair from today's meeting.

Chair's Report: Announcements and Introductions

The Chair asked the audience to introduce themselves.

Additions/Additional Distribution to Agenda

Upon a motion by Ms. Keefe, seconded by Dr. Chock, it was voted on and unanimously carried to add the following to the agenda:

Approval of the Previous Minutes – March 12, 2015

The Chair called for a motion in regards to the minutes of the March 12, 2015 meeting.

Upon a motion by Dr. Ma, seconded by Ms. Kumasaka, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes for the March 12, 2015 meeting as circulated.

Vice Chair's Report:

None.

Executive Officer's Report:

HAR Title 16, Chapter 95 – Status Report

The EO reported there are some minor typographical changes that need to be made to the amendments to the administrative rules Chapter 95, and then they will be sent to the Governor's office for approval.

2015 Legislature – Bill Status Report

The EO reported on the following bills:

HB 253, HD 2 - Relating to Vaccinations

HB 253, HD 2 was modified by the Senate to change the effective date to "upon approval". It then went back to the House and they disagreed with the changes. It may go to conference.

The DME bills were not heard by the Finance Committees. If the Board wants to move forward with a DME bill next session, it may fall under 26H Sunrise Report and therefore the EO will need to check with the AG on how to proceed.

The AG stated in general, anytime you have a regulated profession, vocation or industry, the auditor will do a report, talk to people in the community, see if there is a need for the government to be regulating this. A lot of times the auditor says it is not warranted.

Conferences/Seminars/Meetings

MPJE Item Development Workshop, March 19-20, 2015, Mount Prospect, Illinois – Marcella Chock – Report on Attendance

Dr. Chock reported the workshop was very interesting from a new Board members perspective to meet the other states representatives. This was the exam writing seminar and so the people from the other states that attended were inspectors or executive directors and are paid to do this, unlike our volunteer members.

The EO asked if they were pharmacists?

Dr. Chock stated some were and some weren't, depending on the state. Learning how these other states have their resources is that the fines and fees incurred stay with the board. So that is what pays for all their travel, and things that they do. As far as the content of the workshop, they wanted to know "what is the common theme between all the states that you would write questions on". Some of the themes Identified were compounding and veterinary medicine, which is something Hawaii is not very robust on, so I couldn't really contribute on those questions. Being that Mark Brown, former Hawaii Board Chair, has attended several times and is now a reviewer, he knows that structure of the exam and how the questions should be written and having a current Board member, they can identify any gaps together.

NABP's 111th Annual Meeting, May 16-19, 2015, New Orleans, Louisiana The EO reported that Ms. Keefe will attend the NABP 111th Annual Meeting, May 16-19, 2015 in New Orleans, Louisiana.

<u>50 State Compounding Meeting – Greg Edwards – Report on Attendance</u> Mr. Edwards was not present.

2015 NABP Program Review and Training Session

The EO reported that NABP will be hosting their Annual Program Review and Training session for board staff members who are new or seeking a refresher course on NABP programs and services.

System-Based Causes of Vaccine Errors

The Chair reported that immunizations are widely recognized as one of the most successful and cost-effective health interventions ever introduced worldwide. However, errors with vaccines can result in an unintended and unrecognized source of vulnerability. While the immediate impact of a vaccine-related error on a patient may not be serious, such errors may render the vaccine ineffective or reduce its effectiveness, leaving patients unprotected against serious diseases. The most common contributing factors associated with the reported vaccine errors included mistakes in choosing age-dependent formulations of vaccines intended to prevent the same diseases; unfamiliarity with the vaccine, particularly its dose, dosing schedule, age specifications, route of administration, and the vaccine's various components; failure to check or verify the patient's age, health record, or state registry; similar vaccine names and abbreviations; similar and confusing vaccine labeling and packaging; unsafe storage conditions; and expiration dates not noticed or misunderstood.

<u>Idaho BOP – Administrative Rule Changes</u>

Dr. Chock reported that Idaho State Board of Pharmacy made several rule changes recently. Some of the rule changes that may be of interest to the Board are as follows:

- Rules 010, 011, and 130: Are amended to allow for the definition of and the substitution
 of biological products with interchangeable biosimilars as allowed by Food and Drug
 Administration and printed in the "Purple Book";
- Rules 011, 021, 074, and 600: Are amended to allow the board to define, register, charge a registration fee, and regulate a new class of drug outlet that was recently created by the federal Drug Quality and Security Act (DQSA): the outsourcing facility. Federally registered outsourcing facilities that are currently registered as Idaho mailservice pharmacies should pay particular attention to these rules; and
- Rules 144, 239, 240, and 241: Regulate the practice of compounding.

Kentucky BOP – DEA Disposal Regulations

Ms. Keefe reported that the Controlled Substances Act (CSA) was amended by the Secure and Responsible Drug Disposal Act of 2010 (Disposal Act). This gave Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) the authority to promulgate new regulations, within the framework of the CSA, to allow ultimate users to deliver unused pharmaceutical controlled substances (CS) to appropriate entities (including pharmacies) for disposal in a safe and effective manner consistent with effective controls against diversion.

<u>West Virginia BOP – Does the PIC of a Nonresident Pharmacy Also Have to Be the PIC of the West Virginia Mail-Order Permit?</u>

Dr. Ma reported that although West Virginia Code requires each pharmacy to have a pharmacist-in-charge (PIC) who is responsible for the pharmacy's compliance, which has long been the law in this state, and although the law requires pharmacists practicing pharmacist care in West Virginia, including dispensing into this state from outside of this state, to have a West Virginia pharmacist's license, the board in the past found that most nonresident mail-order pharmacies had no one licensed in West Virginia. In 2013, the West Virginia Legislature amended the Pharmacy Practice Act and added language to the board's rulemaking authority to make it clear that nonresident pharmacies dispensing into West Virginia, ie, mail-order pharmacies, must have a PIC licensed to practice in West Virginia.

NABP, Stakeholders Release Consensus Document on the Challenges and "Red Flag" Warning Signs Related to Prescribing and Dispensing Controlled Substances

The Chair reported that a coalition of stakeholder organizations released a consensus document representing the medical, pharmacist, and supply chain spectrum highlighting the challenges and "red flag" warning signs related to prescribing and dispensing controlled substance prescriptions. As detailed in the consensus document, the goal is to provide health care practitioners with an understanding of their shared responsibility to ensure that all controlled substances are prescribed and dispensed for a legitimate medical purpose, as well as to provide guidance on which red flag warning signs warrant further scrutiny. Overall, challenges faced by health care practitioners in regard to prescribing and dispensing controlled substances can be overcome through collaborations, communication, and broader efforts to prevent the diversion and misuse of controlled substances while ensuring access to the medications for patients who need them for legitimate reasons.

The Chair stated this is a very good document and asked if it could be posted on the Board's webpage?

The EO stated she will check with NABP.

NABP March 2015 State News Roundup

Ms. Kumasaka reported that as of December 31, 2014, 5,147 prescribers have registered to use the Iowa Prescription Monitoring Program (PMP) (an increase of 14.5% from one year ago) and 2,390 pharmacists have registered to use the program (an increase of 15% from one year ago).

Proposed Resolutions for NABP 111th Annual Meeting, May 16-19, 2015

The Chair asked that if the Board has any concerns with the resolutions to email her no later than May 8, 2015 so she can pass the concerns onto Ms. Keefe, as she will be attending the Annual Meeting as the Board's delegate and will be voting on the resolutions.

Request for Information from Virginia Department of Health

Dr. Chock led the discussion on a request for information from Virginia Department of Health. They are asking the Board to respond to the following questions:

- 1. Does your state currently allow a trained lay person to possess epinephrine autoinjectors, perhaps pursuant to a protocol, for the purpose of administering to someone believed to be experiencing an anaphylactic reaction?
 - a. If so, has your state developed training for identifying anaphylaxis and administering the drug?
 - b. If not, is your state currently considering legislation to allow this?
- 2. Does your state currently allow stocking of epinephrine auto-injectors, at places other than medical facilities and public schools, for the purpose of administering to someone believed to be experiencing an anaphylactic reaction?
 - a. If so, which places are so authorized?
 - b. If not, is your state currently considering legislation to allow this?
- If your state allows administration of epinephrine by lay people and/or the stocking of auto-injectors at other places, please provide cites for the applicable laws and/or regulation.

The EO stated she does not think this is under the Board's jurisdiction. She will check with the Department of Health's Epidemiologist on staff.

NAPLEX and MPJE Eligibility for Individuals Seeking Licensure in Utah

Ms. Keefe reported that at the request of the Utah Board of Pharmacy, the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy (NABP) will be confirming the eligibility of candidates to sit for the North American Pharmacist Licensure Examination (NAPLEX) and/or the Multistate Pharmacy Jurisprudence Examination (MPJE). The Utah Board and NABP expect that moving this task to the NABP will streamline processes for the Board and its licensure applicants. NABP is providing this service at no cost to the board.

NABP Seeking Volunteers for 2015-2016 Committees and Task Forces

The Chair stated the NABP is seeking volunteers from its active member boards of pharmacy to serve on the 2015-2016 committees or task forces.

The EO stated if anyone is interested to let her know.

Non-pharmacy Hires Pharmacist to Perform Telephonic Health Coaching and Disease Management – License Requirements?

Dr. Ma led the discussion on an email inquiry seeking clarification on a specific scenario. The scenario is a health and wellness company engaged in telephonic health coaching and telephonic disease management. A pharmacist licensed in Missouri will be talking over the telephone with participants in their program about medication adherence, medication side effects, polypharmacy, the appropriateness of nicotine replacement therapy, and overall education regarding medication. They are NOT a pharmacy, and the pharmacist will NOT be dispensing medication, but will be physically located in Missouri. The questions with the Board's responses are as follows:

- Does the state of Hawaii require a pharmacist license for this person in order to speak with residents of Hawaii? Yes.
- If so, is it a standard pharmacist license or a different category of license? Standard Hawaii pharmacist license.
- If a license is required, does the application entail the standard NABP License Transfer process? Yes.

Tricare Emergency Contraceptive Billing Form

Ms. Kumasaka led the discussion on an email inquiry asking if their "For Billing Purposes Only" prescription will be acceptable to process in Hawaii.

The Chair stated the form they want to use states "This is not a Prescription" and is only to be used with the purpose of billing.

Dr. Chock stated the product they are referring to is an over-the-counter (OTC) product.

The EO stated if they want to receive reimbursement for it then they would write a prescription, but they are saying this is not a prescription.

After brief discussion and a review of the pharmacy laws and rules, the Board determined that any prescription for dispensing must comply with HAR §16-95-82 and that "billing" prescriptions are not addressed in the current pharmacy laws and rules.

Containment Technologies Group Inc. – Compliance to Pharmacy Compounding Regulations and Standards

The Board was provided with a letter from Containment Technologies Group Inc. regarding their compliance to pharmacy compounding regulations and standards for their information.

Accreditation Commission for Health Care – ACHC Inspection Services

The Board was provided with a letter from ACHC Inspection Services, a Division of Accreditation Commission for Health Care regarding their program to provide inspection services for pharmacies on behalf of state regulatory bodies for their information.

Oregon State University College of Pharmacy's course: Patient Safety & Medication Error Prevention for Pharmacists

The Board reviewed an email and course outline from the President of the Oregon Board of Pharmacy for the Oregon State University College of Pharmacy's newest course: Patient Safety & Medication Error Prevention for Pharmacists. The course was developed collaboratively by Oregon State University's College of Pharmacy and the Oregon Patient Safety Commission. It contains a brief introduction by the Institute for Safe Medication Practices and provides pharmacists with the tools to identify problems, reduce risk and improve communication, leading to increased patient safety within the pharmacy environment. It is accredited by ACPE for 18 hours (1.8 CEU's) and priced at \$350.00. Upon registration, each individual has three years to complete the course.

The EO stated if the Board would like to pre-approve courses, she can then refer the course to the Regulated Industries Complaints Office (RICO) so they can incorporate them into disciplinary actions. For example, if they have a respondent that has to take a Board approved course, they will already have a list of Board approved courses available.

The Board by consensus, approved the course and will refer the course to RICO.

Drug samples for use with inpatients in institutional facilities

The Board reviewed an email inquiry asking whether drug samples can be given to institutional pharmacies for use with inpatients.

After a brief discussion and review of the pharmacy laws and rules the Board determined that the current pharmacy laws and rules do not specifically address this issue. However, the pharmacy laws/rules do allow manufacturers' drug samples be provided to practitioners who are then able to dispense them to their own patients.

Executive Session:

At 9:58 a.m., upon a motion by Ms. Keefe, seconded by Dr. Chock, it was voted on and unanimously carried to move into executive session pursuant to §92-5(a)(1) and (4), HRS, "to consider and evaluate personal information relating to individuals applying for professional or vocational licenses cited in section 26-9 or both;" and "To consult with the Board's attorney on questions and issues pertaining to the board's powers, duties, privileges, immunities, and liabilities;".

At 10:05 a.m. upon a motion by Dr. Ma, seconded by Dr. Chock it was voted on and unanimously carried to move out of executive session.
