Call to Order: The agenda for this meeting was filed with the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, as required by section 92-7(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS").

There being a quorum present, the Chair called the meeting to order at 9:05 a.m. and excused Dr. Chock from today's meeting.

Chair's Report: **Announcements and Introductions**

The Chair asked the audience to introduce themselves.

Additions/Additional Distribution to Agenda

None.

Approval of the Previous Minutes – March 31, 2016 Meeting and Public Hearing

The Chair pointed out on page 14, the first line should be amended to read, "... if a patient presents a prescription to a pharmacist for a controlled substance for 90 tablets,..." Also, on page 12, the first word of the fourth paragraph, should be corrected to "The".

The Chair called for a motion in regards to the minutes of the March 31, 2016 meeting and public hearing.

There being no further discussion, upon a motion by the Vice Chair, seconded by Dr. Ma, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes for the March 31, 2016 meeting and public hearing as amended.

Executive Officer's Report:

HAR Title 16, Chapter 95 – Status

The EO reported the rules are currently being reviewed by the DAG. Once she signs off on them, the Chair and the DCCA Director signs and then they are sent to the Governor's office for final approval/signature.

Dr. Ma asked if there is an estimated time frame that the rules will be completed.

The DAG said they should be completed by summer.

Conferences/Seminars/Meetings

NABP 112th Annual Meeting, May 14-17, 2016, San Diego, California

The EO reported that Ms. Keefe will be attending. She asked Ms. Keefe if she had an opportunity to review the resolutions and if she had any questions or concerns.

Ms. Keefe stated she has reviewed them and does not have any issues with them.

2016 NABP/AACP Districts VI, VII & VIII Joint Meeting, September 11-14, 2016, Portland, Oregon

The EO reported that Dr. Chock will be attending.

2016 Legislature

The EO reported on the following bills:

SB 2392, SD1 Relating to Opioid Antagonists

The EO reported that SB 2392, SD2, HD3 Relating to Opioid Antagonists is still in conference. Today at 10:00 is the next hearing. This bill would allow pharmacist to enter into a collaborative agreement with a licensed physician to dispense an opioid antagonist.

HB 1757, HD1 Relating to Health (Prepackage medication bill)

The EO reported that HB 1757, HD1, SD1 Relating to Health has died. It was not heard by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

SB 2320, SD1, HD1 Relating to Contraceptive Supplies

The EO reported that SB 2320, SD1, HD1 Relating to Contraceptive Supplies has died. The House Consumer Protection and Judiciary deferred this measure. This would have allowed more access to contraceptives.

Another bill that the EO is tracking is HB 254, HD2, SD1, CD1 Relating to Medicines, that would amend Chapter 328, so she would like to defer to Mr. Edwards regarding this bill.

Mr. Edwards stated this is not an administrative bill, he does not know who introduced this bill. The DOH made comments on it relating to the drug product selection board. The original bill had sought to bring back the influence of the drug product selection board and approving what FDA will eventually approve as biosimilar to the biologic, which is basically the generic drug to the brand drug. The bill was seeking to get ahead of this biosimilar to biologic wave that will be coming. Mr. Edwards was told that the "purple book" from the FDA is the document that would catalog what biosimilars are equivalent to biologics. The bill was seeking to parallel what would happen on the generic drug side to brand drug side and the use of the "orange" book and how the State is involved in sending out notification when the "orange" book is updated. The idea here is that the DOH would be posting on their website that they have adopted the current orange book and the current purple book. In past they would have faxed or mailed notice, but they would like to change that aspect by just posting on their website. Another aspect of the bill was notification to the doctor if you are substituting a biosimilar for a biologic. The only question was would this communication to the doctor that you have substituted and dispensed a biosimilar, would that also extend to how it is currently being done when you substitute a generic drug for a brand drug, and the answer is no. In the bill it clearly states it by virtue of definition.

Ms. Keefe stated it is her understanding that when a prescription is filled a second time using a biosimilar, you have to let the physician know again because biosimilars are not truly the same.

Mr. Edwards stated he does not know for sure, but he would think that you would prudently want to notify the physician. From what he understands there are even some generic drugs out there that are rated AB1, AB2, AB3, and they are only therapeutically equivalent to a particular brand, not all multisource generics are equivalent to the singular brand.

The EO asked because they are not all equivalent, but similar, if a biosimilar is dispensed, does that become a new prescription?

Mr. Edwards stated no, you would process it the same way you would a generic drug to brand drug.

Continuing Education Audit – Status Report

The EO reported 116 audit letters were sent out and as of April 26, 2016, all but 13 have responded. There are 2 deficiencies and 1 licensee went inactive. The deadline to respond is May 3, 2016.

DCCA

Consumer Guide to Healthcare Providers

The Board was provided with a new pamphlet put out by the DCCA. This was a project that was spearheaded by the DCCA's previous Director. More copies are available to anyone who wants them.

Fee Increase – Previously Discussed at March 12, 2015 Meeting

The EO reported the fee increase is in its final stages so the Department wants to make sure the word gets out as much as possible. It is also posted on the Department's webpage.

Correspondence:

Letter from Affiliated Motors, Inc.

The Board reviewed a letter from Affiliated Motors, Inc. They are a company that provides regulatory agencies a mechanism for independent oversight and feedback about practitioners' compliance and remediation activities. The programs that Affiliated Monitors programs include are:

- Monitoring;
- Assessments;
- Compliance Assessments and Training; and
- Education.

The Chair stated the letter will be referred to the Laws and Rules Committee for their review and information.

Hormonal Contraceptive Law Question – Out-of-State Pharmacist with Prescriptive Authority

Dr. Ma led the discussion on an email inquiry regarding the new Oregon legislation that went into effect January 1st granting Oregon pharmacists the authority to write prescriptions for birth control. The question is, “Does your state recognize Oregon pharmacist prescriptive authority? For example can a prescription for birth control written by an Oregon pharmacist be transferred to your state and be filled?”

After a brief discussion and a review of the laws and rules, the Board after careful consideration refers the inquiry to HRS §328-1, definition of “Out-of-state practitioner”, and determined that a Hawaii pharmacy would not be able to fill a prescription written by a pharmacist from Oregon or any other state since “pharmacists” are not included in the definition of “out-of-state practitioner”.

Compounding Pharmacies

Ms. Keefe led the discussion on the following email inquiry:

“...When my son purchased Voriconazole 1% OPTH DRP eye drop solution for his eye infection, the local Compounding Pharmacy denoted on the label that it would expire in 14-days. I contact the pharmacy and was told that they are not regulated by any government agency. My rationale for questioning their 14-day rules is that: A “Stability Study” conducted by the National Center for Biotechnology (www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov), published on line on 10 Nov. 2008, arrived at the conclusion that this drug could be safely used for at least 30-days, with “no significant degradation of Voriconazole occurring.”...”

Ms. Keefe stated the 14-day rule or beyond use date, is totally appropriate. Although stability studies are true, when it comes to eye drops there are sterility studies and that's where the 14-day rule comes from. It is in USP 797 if anyone wants to read about it.

After a brief discussion and a review of the laws and rules, the Board by consensus determined that although the “Stability Study” conducted by the National Center for Biotechnology indicated 30 days, the 14 day expiration date indicated on the label was appropriate to USP 797 standards for compounded drugs for sterility purposes. Apparently there is a difference between “stability” and “sterility”, especially when it comes to eye drops.

Prescription – Electronic vs. Oral vs. Written

The Vice Chair led the discussion regarding an email inquiry asking the following question:

“When we receive an electronic or paper rx but make changes to it via a phone call to doctor, is the rx now considered a verbal rx and the written date of the rx would be the date of the phone call?”

The EO asked the pharmacist what do they do now if this occurs?

Ms. Keefe stated if there are changes made to the prescription, then the date of the prescription would be the date of those changes.

The Board by consensus determined that if changes occur to the prescription as a result of the phone call, the prescription date is the date of the phone call.

Mr. Uyemoto asked if the prescription comes in electronically and you have to call in to change something, does that change the origin of the prescription?

Mr. Edwards stated in Chapter 328-17.7(9) Record of prescriptions. The format (oral, written, or electronic) in which the prescription was received. So if you, the pharmacist, determined that changes were made to the prescription and you feel it is no longer an electronic prescription, than you would make sure that you capture all the appropriate information for it to be an oral prescription.

Based on the discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that any substantive changes made to an electronic prescription via a phone call with the prescriber, a new prescription should be created and shall be considered an oral prescription since it was made over the phone.

Delivery of Prescription to Physician’s Office

The Chair led the discussion on an email inquiry regarding the following:

“... “The specialty drug is being delivered for a specific patient, but please provide answers if it is permitted for both (1) if it was being administered to the patient and (2) drug is dispensed but not administered to the patient.”

Ms. Keefe stated the Board has had this question before, and she believes the Board determined that if the patient wants the drugs delivered to a doctor’s office it is up to the patient.

The EO clarified, regarding (1), a pharmacy can deliver a prescription drug to the physicians’ office so the physician can administer it to the patient, and (2), the pharmacy delivers the drugs to the physician’s office at the patients’ request, not for the physician to administer it but just for the patient to pick it up at the physician’s office.

The Board, by consensus determined that in general, the patient may designate if they want their prescription drugs “delivered” to their physician’s office. Once the physician is in receipt of the prescription drug that was dispensed for a particular patient, the physician may administer the drug only to the patient for which it was prescribed.

This determination does not apply to the dispensing or delivery of any controlled substance.

Furthermore, in accordance with Hawaii Administrative Rules section 16-201-90, the above interpretation is for informational and explanatory purposes only. It is not an official opinion or decision and is thus, not binding upon the Board.

Patient Counseling Requirements

The Chair led the discussion on an email inquiry asking for the Board’s “patient counseling requirements”.

The Board after a brief discussion and a review of the laws and rules determined that although the definition of “Practice of pharmacy” under HRS §461-1 states, “(H) Providing consultation, information, or education to patients and health care professionals based on the pharmacist’s training and for which no other license is required;” the laws and rules do not require “mandatory” counseling by pharmacists.

Executive Session:

At 9:56 a.m. upon a motion by Ms. Keefe, seconded by Dr. Ma, it was voted on and unanimously carried to move into Executive Session in accordance with HRS, 92-5(a)(4), “To consult with the board’s attorney on questions and issues pertaining to the board’s powers, duties, privileges, immunities, and liabilities”.

At 10:07 a.m. upon a motion by the Vice Chair, seconded by Dr. Ma, it was voted on and unanimously carried to move out of executive session.
