Call to Order: The Chair called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. at which time quorum was established.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Joslyn, voted on and unanimously carried.

Approval of the Minutes:

The Chair called for a motion in regards to the minutes of the September 3, 2015 meeting.

There being no amendments, upon a motion by the Vice Chair, seconded by Ms. Kodama, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes of the September 3, 2015 meeting as circulated.

Chair's Report:

Announcements/Introductions

The Chair stated that she did not have anything to report and asked the audience to introduce themselves.

Vice Chair's Report:

Education Committee Report – September 3, 2015

The Vice Chair reported on the following:

Upon a motion by the Vice Chair, seconded by Ms. Daub, it was voted on and unanimously carried to accept the Education Committee's report and recommendations.

Executive Officer's
Report:

Conferences/Seminars/Meetings

2015 NCLEX Conference, September 21, 2015, Portland, Oregon

Ms. Daub reported on her attendance at the 2015 NCLEX Conference. She said it was a great conference which focused on NCLEX practice analysis, and NCLEX test plan. There was discussion on how the new test plan is on a three year cycle and an expected drop in the national pass rate occurs the first year, then pass rate increases the second year. The clinical judgment in decision making at the RN entry level practice was also a focus of discussion.

Leadership and Public Policy Conference, October 27-29, 2015, West Lake, California

The EO reported Ms. Kodama will be attending.

Psychopharmacology Conference, Outrigger Reef Waikiki Beach Resort, Honolulu, Hawaii, February 3-5, 2016 (pending approval by the AANP)

The EO reported that FYI, the UH Hilo Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy and the Hawaii Association of Professional Nurses are sponsoring a Psychopharmacology Conference that is pending approval by the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners.

2016 NCSBN APRN Roundtable, April 5, 2016, Rosemont, Illinois

The EO asked if anyone was interested in attending to let her know. Mr. Joslyn said he would check his schedule.

2015 Legislature

The EO reported on the following:

Dispensing Bill

The EO stated that at the last meeting the Board reviewed a bill that would clarify that an APRN with prescriptive authority could dispense non-controlled legend drugs to patients under their care since the Board previously interpreted HRS §457-8.6 as only pertaining to the dispensing of manufacturer's prepackaged samples of non-controlled legend drugs. However, upon further review it appears that this section may be interpreted broadly to allow APRNs with prescriptive authority to dispense non-controlled legend drugs to patients under their care.

The Board reviewed and discussed Act 110, SLH 2011, HRS §457-8.6 and HRS §457-6.5 and HAR §16-89-126 and §16-89-128.

The Chair mentioned the APRN compact language.

The EO asked the Board to reconsider HRS 457-8.6, the practice of an APRN with prescriptive authority along with the applicable laws and rules and the NCSBN language for APRN practice.

The DAG asked if the Board had previously adopted the specific sections of the NCSBN Model Act/Rules?

The EO responded that HAR §§16-89-126 and 16-89-128 address the adoption of the NCSBN Model Act/Rules for RN and LPNs for the scope of practice and standards of practice and that the Board could chose to not adopt certain provisions of the NCSBN Model Act/Rules pursuant to HRS 457-6.5.

The Chair and Mr. Joslyn concurred that the Board previously adopted the NCSBN Model Act/Rules.

Ms. Daub stated that whether you're dispensing a sample or prescription it's the same drug and so perhaps we don't need to specify "sample".

The DAG asked so for clarification, do you want to delete the word "sample"?

The EO stated that over-the-counter (OTC) drugs are over the counter, not sure why manufacturers would give "samples" of OTC drugs.

The Chair stated that perhaps the reason for the word "sample" is that the manufacturer is sending it to the practitioner for free but it really doesn't matter because it's the same drug. She said that perhaps the issue is when the drug is "prepackaged" so the practitioner is unable to constitute drugs.

The DAG stated that we're discussing whether an APRN can dispense a limited amount or a whole month supply that is prepackaged so when she discussed with the EO, they were thinking about adding the word "drugs" after OTC samples and a semi colon but now we're discussing removing the word "sample".

The EO did not agree with removing the word "sample".

The DAG said that perhaps deleting the word "samples" may raise some flags.

The EO stated that she would be concerned if the Board removed the word "sample" that drug manufacturers and/or wholesale distributors of prescription drugs may not provide APRNs "samples" of non-controlled legend drugs but by leaving in the word "samples" it would clearly specify that an APRN can receive and dispense manufacturer's prepackaged samples of OTC and non-controlled legend drugs to patients under their care.

Ms. Kodama stated that it's confusing because if you can receive the drug then you should be able to dispense it.

The EO stated that unlike physicians, depending on where the APRN is practicing, the scope of practice may differ. So in order for the drug manufacturers and wholesale distributors to provide the APRN with samples or a supply of drugs so that the APRN can dispense it to patients under their care, this language would clarify it.

Mr. Joslyn stated that the NCSBN Model Act/Rules allows and APRN to "procure" drugs so why do we need to clarify the language in the nurse practice act.

The EO stated that previously HRS 456-8.6 was interpreted to allow APRNs to dispense manufacturer's prepackaged samples of OTC and non-controlled legend drugs only. However, we are taking another look at this section to see if APRNs are allowed to dispense non-controlled legend drugs, not necessarily samples only, to patients under their care. By re-reviewing the section along with the NCSBN Model Act/Rules that the Board previously adopted, we may justify a re-interpretation by the Board.

Ms. Joslyn stated that since the Board previously adopted the NCSBN Model Act/Rules that allows an APRN to procure and dispense non-controlled legend drugs to patients under their care, and today we agree then that APRNs can dispense non-controlled legend drugs, then why do we have to still clarify the nurse practice act?

The DAG replied that the NCSBN Model Act/Rules state that an APRN licensed by the Board may prescribe, order, procure, administer dispense and furnish over the counter drugs, legend and controlled substances pursuant to applicable state and federal laws but the Hawaii nurse practice act, depending on how you interpret it, may allow APRNs to only request, receive and dispense OTC and non-controlled legend drug samples allow APRNs to request, receive and dispense OTC samples and non-controlled legend drugs to patients under their care. So, to clarify the nurse practice act, we would need to add the word "drugs" and a semi colon.

Ms. Daub stated that the proposed amendments would make that section clear.

The EO stated that so far, the Board is re-interpreting HRS §457-8.6 to allow APRNs to dispense non-controlled legend drugs to patients under their care but would also recommend clarifying this section.

Ms. Kodama asked so currently APRNs can't accept samples?

Ms. Daub stated that amending the law would clearly allow distributors to sell drugs to APRNs so that they can dispense to their own patients.

Ms. Minton stated that she had two points to make. The first one is that the sales rep doesn't require her signature to receive the samples, as a certified nurse midwife. They have the doctor sign for it. The second point is that she manages her Title 10 program under DOH and because it is not clear that an APRN can dispense non-controlled substances, it was a huge ordeal. She added that they were saying that they were illegally dispensing birth control pills because the monies to purchase the drugs were not going to the pharmacy but to the office inventory and that they were told only doctors could dispense non-controlled substances out of their office.

The DAG stated then the DOH is interpreting the law that APRNs could only dispense samples. However, the Board may be interpreting it differently but that she would recommend that the law be further clarified.

Ms. Minton stated that they had to choose to interpret the law to allow APRNs to dispense non-controlled substances in order to service their clients.

The Chair stated that Ms. Minton's interpretation is appropriate.

Ms. Minton and the DAG both stated but it isn't clear. The DAG stated that she could understand how DOHs admin could interpret the law the way they did.

The Chair stated that the pharmaceutical company may not be accepting her signature for the samples because they are national, and APRNs are not empowered in the same way in every state so that may be their internal practice or policy.

Ms. Minton stated that APRNs have to go to another clinic to get the signatures to get the samples to bring them back to their clinic for dispensing.

The EO stated that if the Board re-interprets HRS §457-8.6 to allow APRNs to dispense non-controlled legend drugs to patients under their care and make slight amendments to clarify this section further this would also allow drug distributors to distribute non-controlled substances as well as samples to APRNs.

Mr. Joslyn asked if the recommended amendments would make it clearer?

The EO stated yes.

After further discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Joslyn, seconded by the Vice Chair, it was voted on and unanimously carried that based on the nurse practice act and the Board's adoption of the NCSBN Model Act/Rules, the Board would like to clarify that they interpret HRS 457-8.6(d), to mean the dispensing of

manufacturer's prepackaged samples and non-controlled substances, not limiting the non-controlled to samples and that the section should also be amended for clarification.

Repeal Joint Formulary Advisory Committee Bill

A draft of the bill was discussed at the September meeting, there are no changes and we are still waiting to see if this will be part of the admin packet.

Amend Board Member Terms to Four Years Bill

A draft of the bill was discussed at the September meeting, there are no changes and we are still waiting to see if this will be part of the admin packet.

Amend DLIR, DOH and DHS Statutes for APRN Recognition

She is working with Ms. Reichhardt on the language. This is not an admin bill and may be submitted by the Center.

The EO also mentioned that she is working on a bill that would allow the Board to fully participate in NURSUS, a national nurse license database, for the purposes of verifying nurse licenses and as a requirement for joining the national license compact initiative. She said she hopes to have a draft at the November meeting for the Board's consideration.

Mr. Joslyn asked if we could include clarifying language of HRS §457-8.6 in this bill as it pertains to APRNs and amends other State laws.

The EO said yes, she will work with Ms. Reichhardt to see if it was okay.

RICO Nursing Advisory Committee – Deferred from September 3, 2015 Meeting

The Chair deferred discussion to later in the meeting.

Alleged Violation of Sunshine Law – Dismissal of Appeal

The members were provided copies of the dismissal for their information.

Hawaii State
Center for Nursing:

There was no report as Ms. Reichhardt was not able to attend.

The EO reported that she met with Ms. Reichhardt previously at which time we discussed holding a meeting with stakeholders regarding the national licensure compact (NLC) instead of introducing a bill for 2016. We discussed a meeting with the intent of providing information on the NLC for the nursing programs, employers, industry organizations, and nurses. She also announced the upcoming Continuing Competency for Nursing Summit to be held on October 20, 2015 at which the Vice Chair is scheduled to be one of the presenters.

Correspondence: **Nurses working on NCL cruise ships – Hawaii Nurse License Required?**

The Board reviewed and discussed an email asking if a Hawaii nurse license is required to work on a cruise ship in Hawaii waters.

After some discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that if an individual is practicing nursing within the State, a nurse license is required. However, the Board is not in a position to determine or define State lines/boundaries.

Delegation of Medication Administration to ROTC Instructor

The Board reviewed and discussed an email inquiry from an out-of-state nurse asking for clarification on the license requirements in order to delegate medication administration to an unlicensed personnel traveling to this State.

The Chair asked if anyone knew of any place where a nurse delegates the administration of medication to a non-licensed person? She stated that she understands there are tasks that may be delegated to unlicensed personnel. However, she had concerns with the administration of medication being delegated to unlicensed personnel.

Ms. Kodama said she did not.

The Vice Chair stated school health aides are allowed to administer medication such as insulin.

The Chair questioned how the out-of-state nurse would “supervise” the unlicensed personnel in the administration of medication.

The EO stated that HAR §16-89-2 defines “indirect supervision” and HAR §16-89-100 allows an RN to provide “indirect supervision” when the RN is not available to provide direct supervision.

There was some discussion on parental permission to administer the medication.

Mr. Joslyn asked if medication administration is a task that can be delegated?

The EO stated that HAR §16-89-100 refers to public school settings and that medication “shall” be administered by school aides.

After further discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that the nurse delegating the medication administration to unlicensed personnel, from out-of-state would have to hold a Hawaii nurse license since the patient will be residing in this State. The nurse will provide indirect supervision of the unlicensed assistive personnel and must perform the activities specified under the definition of “Indirect

supervision”; and that the delegating nurse is accountable and responsible for the quality of nursing care rendered.

Can an APRN change the status of a person (patient) already admitted into a facility, to an emergency admission?

The Board discussed the above mentioned question and after some discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that an APRN can change the status of a person already admitted into a facility, to an emergency admission.

Old Business:

APRN Compact – Status Report

The Board deferred this discussion.

Mandatory Reporting Regulation

The EO stated that at the last meeting, the Board discussed mandatory reporting by a nurse and wanted the EO to check the ANA Code of Ethics. The EO reported that under the NCSBN Model Act/Rules, Standards of Practice Professional Accountability, it requires reports of violations of the act or rules by self or other licensees.

She also mentioned that previously it was determined that we could amend HAR §16-89-60 to include language regarding mandatory reporting and that she received information from some University of Phoenix students who volunteered to do research on this issue.

There was also discussion on remediation for those who are unable to pass the exam three times.

The EO also stated that she will put a draft together for the Board’s consideration for amendments on mandatory reporting, limiting the number of times an individual can fail the NCLEX exam and for an audit of the renewal requirement for APRNs with prescriptive authority.

There was discussion on concerns with MEPN students, who do not have a nursing degree, to be allowed to take the NCLEX-RN and obtain a nurse license. The Board discussed the possibility of issuing a temporary license to MEPN students.

Laser Treatments

The Board reviewed and discussed email inquiries asking if LPNs and/or RNs can provide laser treatments under their nurse license.

The EO stated that we are constantly receiving inquiries on nurses providing laser treatments and that she would like the Board to come out with a position on this based on the nurse practice act.

The Board reviewed the minutes of the August 14, 2014 and November 13, 2014 meetings of the Hawaii Medical Board (HMB) in which the HMB reviewed its 1999 informal interpretation regarding the use of lasers that stated, "except as otherwise provided by law, the use of lasers is considered to be the practice of medicine." In August 2014, the HMB informally opined that unless authority is granted by a statute or admin rule beyond Chapter 453, HRS and Chapter 85 HAR, the use of lasers to cut, shape, burn, vaporize, or otherwise structurally alter human tissue constitutes the practice of medicine. The HMB further informally opined that the delegation of the use of any lasers may only be made to those professions which are regulated by the State of Hawaii. In addition, at its November 2014 meeting, the HMB informally opined that unless authority is granted by statute or admin rule other than Chapter 453 HRS and Chapter 85, HAR, the use of light and heat energy devices; chemical peels; microdermabrasion; spray/airbrush tanning; and dermapen/micro needling constitute the practice of medicine and that the delegation of these procedures may only be made to those professions which are regulated by the State.

The EO stated that although the nurse practice act is not specific regarding laser treatments, both an LPN and RN can administer treatment and medication as prescribed or use of reasonable judgment in carrying out the prescribed medical orders, provided that the nurses performance commensurate with the educational preparation and demonstrated performance and/or competency of the individual but does this apply to laser treatments?

Mr. Joslyn stated that he believes it does but it is up to the institution.

Ms. Kodama agreed with Mr. Joslyn and stated that the institution should think about liability.

The EO stated that ultimately, the nurse is responsible for the quality of nursing care rendered.

The Chair recommended that since the nurse practice act is not specific, we should respond as to what is in the nurse practice act and that the inquirer can interpret the law or rule.

Ms. Kim stated that perhaps an LPN could perform laser treatments under the supervision of a physician.

The DAG stated that the definition scope of practice includes administration of treatment and medication as prescribed under the direction of a physician, etc.

After further discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that both LPNs and RNs could provide laser treatments under their scope of practice based on the following:

1. Pursuant to HRS §457-2 definition of “The practice of nursing as a licensed practical nurse”, an LPN who has received the required education preparation and demonstrated competency, whereby the individual shall be accountable and responsible to the consumer for the quality of nursing care rendered and under the direction of a dentist, physician, osteopathic physician, registered nurse, osteopath, or podiatrist license in accordance with chapter 44, 453, 457, 460, or 463E, or under the orders of a physician assistant licensed pursuant to chapter 453 and acting as an agent of the supervising physician, may perform laser treatments;
2. Pursuant to HRS §457-2 definition of “The practice of nursing as a registered nurse”, an RN who has received the education preparation and demonstrated competency having specialized knowledge, judgment, and skill, whereby the individual shall be accountable and responsible to the consumer for the quality of nursing care rendered and use of reasonable judgment in carrying out prescribed medical orders of a dentist, physician, osteopathic physician, registered nurse, osteopath, or podiatrist license in accordance with chapter 44, 453, 457, 460, or 463E, orders of an advanced practice registered nurse orders of a physician assistant licensed pursuant to chapter 453 and acting as an agent of the supervising physician, may perform laser treatments;
