There being a quorum present, the Chair called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m. and excused the Vice Chair from today's meeting.

Chair's Report: **Announcements and Introductions**

The Chair asked the audience to introduce themselves.

Approval of the Previous Minutes – June 23, 2016 Meeting

The Chair called for a motion in regards to the minutes of the June 23, 2016 meeting and had the following corrections:

- Page 4, second paragraph from the bottom, first sentence, add an "s" at the end of "Regulation";
- Page 8, third paragraph, change "practitioner" to "pharmacist";
- Page 10, second paragraph, second sentence, correct to read, "We do not have anything that expressly allows..."

The DAG had the following corrections:

- Page 10, third paragraph, should be one long sentence. Therefore, remove period after "drugs" and replace with a comma, and the word "Based" shall therefore begin with a lower case b.

There being no further discussion, upon a motion by Dr. Ma, seconded by Mr. Weinberg, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes for the June 23, 2016 meeting as amended.

Executive Officer's
Report:

HAR Title 16, Chapter 95 – Status

The EO reported that the rules were transmitted from the Governor's Office to the Lt. Governor's Office where it will be "filed" and sit for ten (10) days before it is sent back to the Department.

Conferences/Seminars/Meetings

2016 NABP/AACP Districts VI, VII & VIII Joint Meeting, September 11-14, 2016,
Portland, Oregon

The EO reported that Dr. Chock will be attending.

2016 Legislature

The EO reported on the status of the following bills:

- HB 254, HD2, SD1, CD1 Relating to Medicines (Biosimilars) – Act 242, SLH 2016 was signed by the Governor on July 12, 2016. This bill allows for and regulates the dispensing of interchangeable biological products. Requires pharmacists to inform consumers of interchangeable biological products from the Hawaii list when filling a prescription order and to communicate the product name and manufacturer to the practitioner after dispensing the product. Repeals the Drug Product Selection Board. This Act takes effect on July 1, 2016.
- SB 2076, SD2, HD1, CD1 – Relating to Health Care (DME) – Act 137, SLH 2016 was signed by the Governor on June 29, 2016. Effective January 1, 2017, licensing of DME suppliers will fall under the Department of Health.
- SB 2672, SD1, HD1, CD1 – Relating to Advanced Practice Registered Nurses – Act 183, SLH 2016. This bill amends various State statutes in order to improve patient access to medical care by clarifying the circumstances under which APRNs may practice to the fullest extent of their training and education. Effective July 1, 2016, the following state statutes were amended:
 - ✓ HRS 328-1 – Definition of "Out-of-state practitioner" was amended to include APRNs;
 - ✓ HRS 334-59 – Includes APRNs, along with psychiatrist and psychologist, who may perform an emergency examination of a patient to diagnose the presence of absence of a mental disorder, assess the risk that the patient may be dangerous to self or others, and assess whether or not the patient needs to be hospitalized;
 - ✓ HRS 338-9 – Allows APRNs to certify the cause of death;
 - ✓ HRS 338-10 – Allows APRNs to notify the department of health of a late determination of the cause of death;
 - ✓ HRS 386-1 – Amends the definition of "Health care provider" to include APRNs;

- ✓ HRS 457-8.6 – Clarifies authority of APRNs with prescriptive authority to dispense non-controlled substances to patients under their care; and
- ✓ HRS 461-1 – Includes APRNs with prescriptive authority as a practitioner with whom a pharmacist may enter into a collaborative agreement with.

Controlled Substance Prescriptions – Pharmacist’s Corresponding Responsibility

West Hawaii Today Article “Pharmacy group to explore what to do in Arrington arrest, prescription saga”

A copy of the article was distributed to the Board members for their information.

Response from the Department of Public Safety, Narcotics Enforcement Division

The EO reported that she has been in contact with Jared Redulla at the NED and they are working on getting the information the Board asked for.

DEA Chronicles, “A Pharmacist’s Obligation: Corresponding Responsibility and Red Flags of Division

The EO reported that she came across this article pertaining to a pharmacist’s corresponding responsibility and since it was discussed at the last Board meeting, provided a copy of the article to the Board members for their information.

California State Board of Pharmacy’s “Corresponding Responsibility – It’s the Law” – Discussion on a Proposed Guidance Document/Tool for Pharmacists Filling Controlled Substance Prescriptions

The EO also reported that in her research she also found that the California State Board of Pharmacy issued an information/guideline on a pharmacist’s corresponding responsibility and was wondering if the Board would be interested in preparing some guidance document or “tool” for Hawaii pharmacist?

She stated that she mentioned this to NED and they were also interested and that perhaps it can be a joint venture between the Board and NED.

There were no objections.

Correspondence: **“Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors Adopt Safe Drug Collection Program Ordinance”**

The Chair asked Ms. Keefe to lead the discussion on the above mentioned article in which it is reported that the Board of Supervisors became the first County in Southern California to pass an Extended Producer Responsibility ordinance which will provide a new program for residents to safely dispose of their unused household medications at pharmacies in Santa Barbara County. Reasons cited for this initiative include protection of public health and safety, help reduce toxic pollutants in the water supply and decrease availability of addictive drugs in homes and the community. The initiative is being financed by drug manufacturers who conduct business in Santa Barbara County and should be ready for implementation in approximately fifteen months.

How long is a prescription good for? – Justin C. Haskamp, Cardinal Health at Home

The Chair asked Dr. Chock to lead the discussion on an inquiry asking how long a prescription is good for.

Although not specified in the pharmacy laws or rules, HRS §328-16 refers to refills up to twelve months from the date the original prescription was written.

The Chair added that standard practice dictates that a prescription for a non-controlled substance is valid for one year but that the pharmacist shall use his/her professional judgment when filling any prescription.

The EO asked the members of the audience if they had any thoughts on this issue.

Mr. Cruz reiterated what the Chair stated.

After further discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that the pharmacy laws and rules do not specify how long a prescription is valid for, assuming it was not initially filled. However, current standards of practice and provided a pharmacist may use his/her professional judgement to fill or not fill the prescription, dictates a prescription for a non-controlled substance may be valid up to one year from the date it was written. This informal interpretation does not apply to prescriptions for controlled substances.

This is an informal interpretation, in accordance with §16-201-90, HAR, for informational and explanatory purposes only. It is not an official opinion or decision and is thus, not binding upon the Board.

The Board also referred this matter to the Laws and Rules Committee and to direct the Committee to come up with FAQ's for scope of practice questions that may not be specifically addressed in the pharmacy laws or rules.

Safeway Pharmacy Questions

The Chair asked Dr. Ma to lead the discussion on the following questions posed by Safeway:

1. Naloxone is recently approved by HI board to be furnished by pharmacists. Is this one hour DSN training module, "Leveraging Pharmacies to Address Opioid Overdose through Naloxone Distribution and Patient Education." In drug store news approved by the board to be sufficient for continue education? What are the CPA requirements?
2. Our Hawaii pharmacist had extra immunization CE completed to vaccine 14-17 years old. Under what situation are they authorized to vaccinate to 14-17 years old? Are they allowed to dispense when they finish the CE? Would you forward any board regulation regarding this?

For the Naloxone question, the Board reviewed the new language under the definition of "Practice of pharmacy" in the law and decided to refer the inquirer to the new section that states:

""Practice of pharmacy" means:

- (1) The interpretation and evaluation of prescription orders; the compounding, dispensing, and labeling of drugs and devices (except labeling by a manufacturer, packer, or distributor of nonprescription drugs and commercially legend drugs and devices); the participation in drug selection and drug utilization reviews; the proper and safe storage of drugs and devices and the maintenance of proper records therefor; the responsibility for advising when necessary or where regulated, of therapeutic values, content, hazards, and use of drugs and devices;
- (2) Performing the following procedures or functions as part of the care provided by and in concurrence with a "health care facility" and "health care service" as defined in section 323D-2, or a "pharmacy" or a licensed physician, or a "managed care plan" as defined in section 432E-1, in accordance with policies, procedures, or protocols developed collaboratively by health professionals, including physicians and surgeons, pharmacists, and registered nurses, and for which a pharmacist has received appropriate training required by these policies, procedures, or protocols:
 - (A) Ordering or performing routine drug therapy related patient assessment procedures;
 - (B) Ordering drug therapy related laboratory tests;
 - (C) Initiating emergency contraception oral drug therapy in accordance with a written collaborative agreement approved by the board, between a licensed physician and a pharmacist who has received appropriate training that includes programs approved by the American Council of Pharmaceutical Education (ACPE), curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy, state or local health department programs, or programs recognized by the board of pharmacy;

- (D) Administering drugs orally, topically, by intranasal delivery, or by injection, pursuant to the patient's licensed physician's order, by a pharmacist having appropriate training that includes programs approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy, state or local health department programs, or programs recognized by the board of pharmacy;
- (E) Administering:
 - (i) Immunizations orally, by injection, or by intranasal delivery, to persons eighteen years of age or older by a pharmacist having appropriate training that includes programs approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy, state or local health department programs, or programs recognized by the board of pharmacy; and
 - (ii) Vaccines to persons between fourteen and seventeen years of age pursuant to section 461-11.4;
- (F) As authorized by a licensed physician's written instructions, initiating or adjusting the drug regimen of a patient pursuant to an order or authorization made by the patient's licensed physician and related to the condition for which the patient has been seen by the licensed physician; provided that the pharmacist shall issue written notification to the patient's licensed physician or enter the appropriate information in an electronic patient record system shared by the licensed physician, within twenty-four hours;
- (G) Transmitting a valid prescription to another pharmacist for the purpose of filling or dispensing; ~~or~~
- (H) Providing consultation, information, or education to patients and health care professionals based on the pharmacist's training and for which no other licensure is required; ~~and~~ or
- (I) Dispensing an opioid antagonist in accordance with a written collaborative agreement approved by the board, between a licensed physician and a pharmacist who has received appropriate training that includes programs approved by the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education (ACPE), curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy, state or local health department programs, or programs recognized by the board; and
- (3) The offering or performing of those acts, services, operations, or transactions necessary in the conduct, operation, management, and control of pharmacy."

As for the collaborative practice agreement ("CPA"), the EO reported that the Laws and Rules Committee is close to or has finalized the draft of the definition for CPA and perhaps we should send the draft to members of the audience for their comments and recommendations before moving forward.

There were no objections.

For the question pertaining to immunization of minors, the Board recommend the following section be referred to the inquirer:

§461-11.4 Vaccinations; children. (a) A pharmacist may administer a vaccine to persons between fourteen and seventeen years of age pursuant to a valid prescription. The pharmacist shall verify that the prescriber or the prescriber's authorized agent is the patient's medical home.

(b) After the vaccination is administered, the pharmacist shall immediately provide to the patient a vaccination record including the following information:

- (1) The patient's name and date of birth;
- (2) The type of vaccine administered; and
- (3) The date and location that the vaccine was administered.

(c) The pharmacist shall provide within seventy-two hours to the medical home and within five business days to the department of health immunization registry the same information provided to the patient pursuant to subsection (b) as well as the following:

- (1) The name of the vaccine product that was administered, including the manufacturer, lot number, and expiration date;
- (2) The method of administration; and
- (3) The anatomical site of administration.

(d) All pharmacists who administer vaccines to persons between the ages of fourteen and seventeen years shall complete a training program approved by the Accreditation Council of Pharmacy Education for which a certificate of completion is issued. The pharmacist shall complete the training program and submit the completion certificate for the training program to the board prior to administering any vaccine to persons between the ages of fourteen and seventeen years.

(e) For the purposes of this section, "medical home" means the primary care physician who, working in collaboration with the family, oversees the acute, chronic, and preventive health needs of the patient in a comprehensive, coordinated, and continuous fashion.

The Board clarified that a valid prescription is still required for a pharmacist to "administer" a drug and that this section does not authorize pharmacists to "dispense" a drug without a valid prescription, even to administer the immunization.

Executive Session: At 9:34 a.m. upon a motion by Mr. Weinberg, seconded by Dr. Chock, it was voted on and unanimously carried to move into Executive Session in accordance with HRS, 92-5(a)(4), "To consult with the board's attorney on questions and issues pertaining to the board's powers, duties, privileges, immunities, and liabilities".

At 10:07 a.m. upon a motion by Mr. Weinberg, seconded by Dr. Chock, it was voted on and unanimously carried to move out of executive session.
