Call to Order: The Chair called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. at which time quorum was established and excused Ms. Kim from today’s meeting.

Chair’s Report: **Announcements/Introductions**

The Chair asked the audience to introduce themselves.

Additions to the Agenda/Additional Distribution:

The Chair called for a motion to delete the following agenda item:

 - b. In the Matter of the License to Practice Nursing of Michelle J. Hayashi, RNS 2015-83-L, Findings of Fact dated August 31, 2016, Conclusion of Law and Recommended Order and Board’s Final Order, Petitioner’s Exceptions to the Hearings Officer’s Recommended Order and Request for Oral Argument; Exhibit “1”, Certificate of Service, Notice of Opportunity to Present Oral Arguments.

Upon a motion by Mr. Joslyn, seconded by the Vice Chair, it was voted on and unanimously carried to delete the above agenda item.

Approval of the Previous Minutes – October 18, 2016

The Chair called for a motion in regards to the minutes of the October 18, 2016 meeting.

There being no discussion, upon a motion by Mr. Joslyn, seconded by Ms. Daub, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes of the October 18, 2016 meeting as circulated.

Executive Officer’s Report:

Conferences/Seminars/Meetings

2016 Hawaii Action Coalition Summit: Culture of Health, November 2, 2016, Honolulu, Hawaii – Chair and EO

The EO reported that she was not able to attend, however if the Chair, Ms. Kodama or Ms. Daub attended they can give a report at this time.

The Chair stated that she, Ms. Kodama, Ms. Daub, and Ms. Reichhardt from the Hawaii State Center for Nursing (“HSCFN”) attended.

Ms. Kodama stated what interested her was the discussion on equality and equity, meaning just because you give things fairly to everybody it doesn’t always help all people. They showed a picture of a crowd of people trying to watch a sports event, and they gave everyone a block to stand on so they could see. However, because some people are taller than others and they could already see, the block just made them taller so the people in the back still couldn’t see. So even though everyone got the same thing and it was fair and equitable, it didn’t help all the individuals. So the message she got was those in a hospital setting need to focus more on the individual needs of patients, because you don’t always know their individual situation.

Ms. Daub stated they were talking quite a bit about how caring for people is really moving to the community and the growth of that is going to be important. One person said the most critical thing that occurs is transition. This is true because you transition when you are born, you transition when you die, and so this a transition for us.

Ms. Reichhardt stated last year the Institute of Medicine ("IOM"), now known as the National Academies Press did a review of the future of nursing recommendations and updated their recommendations based off of the progress. The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation also did a review and created a public health model called the Culture of Health that focuses broadly on inter-professional, where the IOM review was very focused on healthcare professionals. The Culture of Health is saying that we're seeing a lot of accidents in the community, so maybe you don't just focus on trauma team, maybe you also reach out to the police department or the local schools to have conversations about crosswalk safety, or driving safety, how to prevent these accidents in the community before they come into the healthcare setting.

The Chair mentioned that she also attended Regulation 2030 in Chicago, Illinois. It was basically a group of board members, regulators, people in the medical community and people from other agencies discussing what should be the healthcare and regulatory priorities for the next 20 years.

Leadership in Action Conference, November 9-10, 2016, Honolulu, Hawaii
The EO asked if anyone will be attending.

Ms. Kodama stated she will be going as a panelist.

2017 Legislature

The EO stated she is unaware of any legislation at this time and deferred to Ms. Reichhardt.

Mr. Reichhardt stated there is a bill that the Director of Labor reached out to her about. The bill is a continuation of the APRN barrier bill from last session. The Director of Labor stated there is a shortage of providers who can certify someone for disability benefits, so she would like to add APRNs to that list of providers. She did send her a draft but she has not had an opportunity to review it yet. There is apparently a loophole in the worker's compensation rules related to temporary disability even though we added APRNs to certify. Their staff is currently working with their Attorney General to identify a solution that does not involve legislation.

Amendments to Title 16, Chapter 89 – Status Report

The EO reported she is still working on the draft.

Continuing Competency Program

The EO stated that Ms. Joanna Smith has offered to help the Board with determining accreditation agencies and clarifying the requirements. She provided a list of nursing organizations and associations for credentialing memberships. The EO did cross check the list with ANCC of their list of credentialing organizations and will be meeting further with Ms. Smith and Ms. Daub to discuss. With the information that Ms. Smith is providing, it will be much easier for the Board to come up with a list to post on the Board's webpage.

NCSBN Makes Substance Abuse Use Disorder Educational Course Free to Nurses and Nursing Students

The Board reviewed a news release from NCSBN stating NCSBN Makes Substance Abuse Use Disorder Educational Course Free to Nurses and Nursing Students.

The EO stated you can refer this to RICO to use for Settlement Agreements, etc.

Hawaii State Center for Nursing:

Ms. Reichhardt stated she has Ms. LeVasseur here with her today and they have some info-graphics to share with the Board on their 2015 workforce report. The info-graphics are a visual briefing of the workforce survey that came out last year.

Ms. LeVasseur stated the data you see on the info-graphics will coincide with the data on the report. This was put together to show you a snapshot in relationship to some of the priority areas for the license groups. The representation of males in the workforce has gone up a bit, but we are a small state and so it takes a little while before you start to see change. Over the last decade there has been

increment increases in relationship to men in our workforce across the state. For LPNs it provides what's the percentage by county, where are they working and the total number of LPN licenses for the years 2005 to 2015 using PVL's data.

The Chair asked if the HSCFN have considered how they will start to look at these things if we were to become a compact state?

Ms. LeVasseur stated NURSYS gave her our states data for 2015. They did the NURSYS survey in the same time frame that we did ours, and so we were very lucky in that we have those snapshots for both in the same time period. In relation to NURSYS, she was able to pull a randomized sample from each state. Part of the challenge is they pull from our license population which are made up of LPNs, RNs, and APRNs. So the NURSYS data for 2015 in regard to that randomized sample, for LPNs there were 7, APRNs there were 69 and the rest were RNs. The other issue is we are an island state in isolation, so what we do with our data is we pull out who is actively employed in the State. When we did that with the NURSYS data, LPNs went from 7 to 5 and APRNs went from 69 to 45 and then we could probably take off about 300 RNs to get to our RN population. What that tells us is we do not even have numbers to look at them as a large state group. If NURSYS is using that marker for the states and for the national brushstroke, that is fine, but for us in-state because our interest in this data sits in what is happening with our workforce, where are they, who are they, what are they doing, where do they work, how old are they, what's the ethnic fusion and does that look anything like the population that they are serving. All of those questions which a lot of them you will see in these info-graphics we have given you, for NURSYS data we cannot do any of that. With our data we collect in the State, we can do all of that. That is why it is so important that we at a state level, just like our colleagues on the mainland, collect that state data because that allows us to drill down into the data to give us a really good profile of what our workforce looks like. You have all heard me say this before, but we need to continue to collect our state level data, we need to do that and we need the Board's support to do that.

The Chair stated if we become a compact state, nurses can come here and practice without advising us, so it's not a matter of collecting data from NURSYS or collecting data from in-state, we would essentially have an open market for nurses, and we would not be able to gather specific information except from an employer.

Ms. LeVasseur stated there must be some way that they are still connected to the State of Hawaii?

The Chair stated if we are a compact state, and they come from a compact state, they do not have to report to us if they are practicing here.

Ms. Reichhardt stated her understanding was that if you reside in a state, you have to be licensed in that state.

The EO stated you are issued a multi-state license to practice. So any state that is part of the compact, if you have a multi-state license, you can go to that other multi-state license state and practice. The State Board does not receive any notification.

Ms. Reichhardt stated you have to be licensed in your home state. So if you now reside in Hawaii, you would have to change your home state license to Hawaii.

The EO stated she asked that question at the NLC meeting in October, and they did not have an answer. However, there is nothing that prohibits the Board from at least asking for some sort of notification that they are practicing in Hawaii.

Ms. Reichhardt stated she will address other workforce centers about how they are addressing that specific issue, because she was not aware of that.

The EO asked if we have a sustainable nursing workforce currently in the State of Hawaii?

Ms. LeVasseur replied we do.

The Chair called for a recess from the meeting at 9:20 a.m., to discuss and deliberate on the following adjudicatory matters pursuant to Chapter 91, HRS:

The Vice Chair recused herself from the following adjudicatory matter and exited the room.

In the Matter of the License to Practice Nursing of **Marzie A. Valdez, RNS 2010-25-L**, Hearings Officer's Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and Recommended Order Granting Petitioner's Motion for Summary Judgement, Exhibits "A" through "C"; Petitioner's Exceptions to Hearings Officer's Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and Recommended Order Filed on May 9, 2016; Exhibits "1" – "4"; Certificate of Service dated May 24, 2016; Plaintiff Marzie A. Valdez's Statement in Support of Administrative Hearings Officer's May 9, 2016 Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and Recommended Order; Notice of Board's Proposed Final Order; Proposed Board's Final Order; Objections to the Board's Proposed Final Order and Request for Oral Argument; Certificate of Service; and Notice of Opportunity to Present Oral Argument filed by Respondent's Attorney, Board's Final Order.

Upon a motion by Mr. Joslyn, seconded by Ms. Daub, with the Vice Chair recusing herself, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the Board's Final Order.

The Vice Chair was invited back into the meeting room.

In the Matter of the License to Practice Nursing of **John E. Sulecki, RNS 2015-74-L**, Findings of Fact, Conclusion of Law dated September 13, 2016, Petitioner's Exceptions to the Hearings Officer's Recommended Order, Amended Findings of Fact, Conclusion of Law and Recommended Order, Notice of Opportunity to Present Oral Arguments, Respondent's Exceptions and Request for Oral Argument, Board's Final Order.

Upon a motion by Mr. Joslyn, seconded by the Vice Chair, it was voted on and unanimously carried to accept and adopt all of the Hearings Officer's Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law in his Amended Recommended Order, however the Board disagreed with and rejected (with the exception of the fine) the Hearings Officer's recommendation that Respondent's license be revoked. The Board determined that Respondent's unprofessional conduct warranted the following:

1. Two-year suspension starting from the date of this Final Order;
2. Payment of the \$1,000 fine within 90 days of this Final Order;
3. Satisfactory completion of coursework as specified below; and
 - a. The National Council of State Boards of Nursing ("NCSBN") course on Substance Use Disorder In Nursing;
 - b. The NCSBN course on Professional Boundaries In Nursing; and
 - c. The NCSBN course on Righting A Wrong: Ethics & Professionalism In Nursing.
4. Submit to the Board for its consideration within ninety (90) days of the date of this Final Order the name and credentials of a proposed monitor, and a proposed monitoring plan that shall be in place for the duration of Respondent's suspension. The monitoring plan shall include, but is not limited to, periodic random drug testing and mandatory attendance and participation in NN/AA group meetings. The monitor shall be an independent licensed or credentialed substance abuse counselor (e.g., physician, psychologist, social worker) who agrees to submit quarterly reports to the Board's Executive Officer. The monitor shall not be treating Respondent currently nor have treated him previously. Respondent shall continue to submit proposed monitors' names and credentials, and proposed monitoring plans until he obtains the Board's approval; and
5. Respondent shall notify his current and future nursing employers including, but not limited to the Director of Nursing, about this disciplinary action and the basis for the disciplinary action. Respondent shall arrange for his employer's Director of Nursing to sign and directly return to the Board's Executive Officer a letter indicating knowledge of this disciplinary action and its basis. The Director of Nursing shall also agree to submit directly to the

Board's Executive Officer quarterly reports on Respondent's performance as a nurse.
