Chapter 91, HRS,
Adjudicatory
Matters:

Chairperson Polischek called for a recess from the Board's meeting at 8:37 a.m. to discuss and deliberate on the following adjudicatory matters pursuant to HRS chapter 91.

- 1. Settlement Agreements
 - a. In the Matter of the Contractors Licenses of J & H Electric LLC; Henry J. Hunt; CLB 2016-374-L

Respondent J & H Electric LLC (“J & H”) was licensed as an Electrical contractor under license number C-34262. Respondent J & H’s license was issued on or about June 1, 2015; and expired on September 30, 2016.

Respondent Henry J. Hunt ("Hunt") was licensed as an Electrical contractor under license number C-30098. Respondent Hunt's license was issued on or about August 3, 2009; and expired on September 30, 2016. From June 1, 2015 until September 30, 2016, Respondent Hunt was the RME of Respondent J & H.

RICO received a complaint alleging Respondents contracted to perform electrical updates to a residence without a written contract and performed no work despite being paid a deposit for the work.

RICO alleges that Respondents' contract form was missing required information.

Respondents allege that the total job cost was \$1,000.00 and repaid to the homeowner all of the monies received for the job, and Respondents do not intend to perform homeowner improvement projects in the future.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statute and rule:

- HRS section 444.25.5 (written contract and disclosures required for homeowner projects); and
- HAR section 16-77-80 (written contract and disclosures required for homeowner projects).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$1,000.00.

It was moved by Mr. Konishi, seconded by Mr. Kagawa, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

- b. In the Matter of the Contractor's License of Christensen Bros Construction, Inc., doing business as Sun Force Hawaii; CLB 2016-407-L

Respondent Christensen Bros Construction, Inc. dba Sun Force Hawaii ("Respondent") was issued contractor's license number BC-27977 on or about June 14, 2007; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018.

RICO received a request from the Board to investigate a Settlement Agreement between Respondent and the Hawaii Department of Labor and Industrial Relations' Occupational Safety & Health Division ("DLNR").

Respondent provided information indicating Respondent entered into a Settlement Agreement with the DLNR based on citations related to fall protection. Respondent paid a \$1,650.00 penalty.

RICO alleges Respondent may have violated applicable safety or labor laws.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violation of the following statute:

- HRS section 444-17(6) (violation of applicable safety or labor laws).

Respondent does not admit to violating any law or rule, and agrees to the reprimand of the license by the Board.

The Board noted that the acronym for the Hawaii Department of Labor and Industrial Relations Occupational Safety and Health Division should be "DLIR" rather than "DLNR".

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. Kagawa, and unanimously carried to reject the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

- c. In the Matter of the Contractor's Licenses of Anchor Systems Hawaii, Inc. and Eric Levora; CLB 2015-61-L

Respondent Anchor Systems Hawaii, Inc. ("Respondent Anchor Systems") is licensed as a General building contractor under license number CT-27200. Respondent Anchor System's license was issued on or about October 1, 2006; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018. Respondent Anchor Systems also holds a C-35 Pile driving and foundation specialty license.

Respondent Eric Levora ("Respondent Levora") is licensed as a General building contractor under license number CT-21153. Respondent Levora's license was issued on or about October 9, 1997; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018. Respondent Levora also holds a C-35 Pile driving and foundation specialty license. At all relevant times herein, Respondent Levora is and/or was the responsible managing employee of Respondent Anchor Systems.

RICO alleges that Respondents engaged in out-of-scope activity by offering to perform and/or performing the installation of a swimming pool at a residence in Kaneohe, Hawaii for compensation.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statute and rule:

- HRS section 444-9 (unlicensed activity); and
- HAR section 16-77-33 (out-of-scope activity).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$500.00.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Konishi, seconded by Mr. Mochida, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

d. In the Matter of the Contractors' Licenses of C. Summo Construction, LLC and Christopher Summo; CLB 2015-391-L

Respondent C. Summo Construction, LLC ("Respondent Summo Construction") is licensed as a General building contractor under license number CT-22826. Respondent Summo Construction's license was issued on or about November 16, 2000; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2016. At all times relevant herein, Respondent Summo Construction held a C-31 Masonry and C-32 Ornamental, guardrail, and fencing contractor licenses.

Respondent Christopher Summo ("Respondent Summo") is licensed under license number CT-21553. Respondent Summo's license was issued on or about July 30, 1998; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 20, 2016. At all times relevant herein, Respondent Summo was the responsible managing employee of record for Respondent Summo Construction and held a C-31 Masonry and C-32 Ornamental, guardrail, and fencing contractor licenses.

On or about January 24, 2017, Petitioner filed a Petition for Disciplinary Action Against Contractors' Licenses; Demand for Disclosure in this matter ("Petition"). The Petition alleged the following:

- a. On or about September 18, 2009, the State of Hawaii Department of Taxation ("DOT") filed a Certificate of State Tax Lien against Respondent Summo for withholding taxes owed for 2005 in the amount of \$18,317.81 and for withholding taxes owed for 2006 in the amount of \$6,632.54.
- b. On or about November 12, 2009, the Department of Treasury, Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") filed a Notice of Federal Tax Lien against Respondent Summo for income taxes owed for 2007 in the amount of \$13,082.38 and for income taxes owed for 2008 in the amount of \$24,607.94.
- c. On or about May 1, 2013, the IRS filed a Notice of Federal Tax Lien against Respondent Summo for income taxes owed for 2010 in the amount of \$49,978.55, for income taxes owed for 2011 in the amount of \$23,255.25, for payroll taxes owed for 2010 in the amount of \$34,199.64, and for payroll taxes owed for 2011 in the amount of \$7,344.85.
- d. On or about September 9, 2013, the DOT filed a Certificate of State Tax Lien against Respondent Summo for income taxes owed for 2010 in the amount of \$21,331.91, and for income taxes owed for 2011 in the amount of \$9,403.13.
- e. On or about November 25, 2013, a judgment in the amount of \$22,511.12 was entered against Respondent Summo Construction and Respondent Summo in the District Court of the First Circuit, Ko'olauloa Division, State of Hawaii, in Honsador Lumber, LLC v. C. Summo Construction, LLC; Christopher A. Summo, Civil No. 1RC13-1-3454.

- f. On or about June 26, 2015, the DOT filed a Certificate of State Tax Lien against Respondent Summo for income taxes owed for 2010 in the amount of \$12,169.52, and for income taxes owed for 2011 in the amount of \$7,556.92.
- g. On or about October 7, 2015, a judgment in the amount of \$20,544.41 was entered against Respondent Summo Construction and Respondent Summo in the District Court of the First Circuit, Ko'olaupoko Division, State of Hawaii, in ABC Supply Co. Inc. v. C. Summo Construction LLC; Christopher A. Summo, Civil No. 1RC15-1-5969.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statutes and rules.

- HRS section 444-17(21) (failure to pay delinquent taxes, interest and penalties);
- HRS section 436B-19(8) (failure to maintain a history of financial integrity);
- HAR section 16-77-71(a) (RME responsibility); and
- HAR section 16-77-71(a)(5) (RME responsible for violations of company).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to the voluntary surrender of Respondents' licenses.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. Isemoto, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement After Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

- e. In the Matter of the Contractor Licenses of Andrew Chekene Enterprises, Inc., dba AC Enterprises; and Andrew D. Chekene; CLB 2016-237-L

Respondents Andrew Chekene Enterprises, Inc., doing business as AC Enterprises ("Respondent AC Enterprises") and Respondent Andrew D. Chekene ("Respondent Chekene") are licensed as General building contractors. Respondent's licenses were issued on or about April 7, 2015; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018. At all times relevant herein, Respondents AC Enterprises and Chekene held a C-33 Painting and decorating contractor's license. At all times relevant herein, Respondent Chekene was the responsible managing employee of record for Respondent AC Enterprises.

On or about June 25, 2015, Respondents entered into a contract with Waikoloa Beach Villas which called for Respondents to perform contracting work at Waikoloa Beach Villas, including but limited to renovating the buildings at the subject location to address deficiencies in plumbing and fire prevention materials. At all times relevant herein, including but not limited to the period of time covered by the contract, Respondent Chekene was not residing with the state of Hawaii.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statute and rule:

- HRS section 436B-19(17) (violating rules or order of the licensing authority); and
- HAR section 16-77-71(a)(4) (RME not is residence in the state of Hawaii during the period a project is under construction).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$25,000.00.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Lee, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

- f. In the Matter of the Contractor's Licenses of Hawaiian Solar & Plumbing, Inc., Kenneth W. Bloom, PRME; CLB 2012-41-L; CLB 2014-127-L; CLB 2014-189-L; CLB 2016-183-L

Respondent Hawaiian Solar & Plumbing, Inc. ("Respondent Hawaiian Solar") was issued a contractor's license under license number CT-17629. Respondent Hawaiian Solar's license was issued on or about August 3, 1992; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018.

Respondent Kenneth W. Bloom, PRME ("Respondent Bloom") was issued a contractor's license under license number CT-21058. Respondent Bloom's license was issued on or about August 11, 1997; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018. Since August 11, 1997, Respondent Bloom has been the PRME of Respondent Hawaiian Solar.

RICO received several complaints alleging that Respondents exhibited poor workmanship, failed to follow plans and specifications, and failed to honor warranty.

Respondents contend that they have not engaged in any poor workmanship and deny that Respondent Hawaiian Solar performed work without permits or failed to follow plans, specifications or to honor its warranty or workmanship.

RICO alleges that Respondents used an unregistered trade name and failed to include in its homeowner contracts all of the required information.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statute and rules:

- HRS section 444-25.5 (required information in homeowner contracts);
- HAR section 16-77-8(a) (trade name must be registered with the Board);
- HAR section 16-77-71(a)(2) (RME must sign or initial all contracts); and
- HAR section 16-77-80 (required information in homeowner contracts).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$3,000.00.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. Isemoto, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

g. In the Matter of the Contractor's Licenses of Resolute Performance Contracting, Inc; Robert D. Olson; CLB 2015-181-L

Respondents Resolute Performance Contracting, Inc. ("Respondent Resolute") and Robert D. Olson ("Respondent Olson") are licensed as General building contractors under license numbers BC-32579 and BC-32580, respectively. Respondent's licenses were issued on or about November 30, 2012; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018. Respondent Olson has been the RME of Respondent Resolute since November 30, 2012. Respondents were licensed by the Board as C-48 Structural steel contractors since October 2, 2015.

In June 2015, RICO received a complaint alleging that Respondents were constructing parking canopy solar system racks without the appropriate contractors' licenses classifications.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statute and rule:

- HRS section 436B-19(17) (violating laws and rules); and
- HAR section 16-77-33(a) (general contractor shall not act or assume to act or advertise as a specialty contractor except in the specialty classifications which the licensee holds).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$500.00.

The Board noted for the record that name of the Respondent should be "Resolute Performance Contracting, LLC" instead of "Resolute Performance Contracting, Inc."

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Konishi, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

h. In the Matter of the Contractors' License of Lonny B. Cooper; CLB 2016-332-L

Respondent Lonny B. Cooper ("Respondent") is licensed as a General building contractor under license number BC-31324. Respondent's license was issued on or about February 10, 2011; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018.

RICO alleges that Respondent used an unregistered trade name and failed to include in its homeowner contracts all of the required information.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statutes and rules:

- HRS section 444.25.5 (required information in homeowner contracts);
- HAR section 16-77-8(a) (trade name must be registered with the Board);
- HAR section 16-77-79 (bond and lien rights must be disclosed before contracting); and
- HAR section 16-77-80 (required information in homeowner contracts).

Respondent does not admit to violating any law or rule, and agrees to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$2,500.00.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Lee, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

- i. In the Matter of the Contractors' Licenses of REC Solar Commercial Corporation; Tyrone J. Takahashi; Joshua A. Meyers; CLB 2016-181-L

Respondent REC Solar Commercial Corporation ("REC") is licensed as a "B" General building and C-13 Electrical contractor under license number BC-33433. Respondent REC's license was issued on or about February 18, 2014.

Respondent Tyrone J. Takahashi ("Takahashi") is licensed as a C-13 Electrical contractor under license number C-14027. Respondent Takahashi's license was issued on or about March 3, 1987. Respondent Takahashi has been a subordinate responsible managing employee of Respondent REC since August 5, 2015.

Respondent Joshua A. Meyers ("Meyers") is licensed as a "B" General building contractor under license number BC-31969. Respondent Meyers' license was issued on or about December 23, 2011. Respondent Meyers has been the principal responsible managing employee of Respondent REC since February 18, 2014.

RICO received a complaint alleging that Respondents were not in compliance with the ratio for individuals performing electrical work set forth Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") section 444-9.5 (at least half of all individuals performing electrical work at a project must be licensed in accordance with HRS chapter 448E).

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statute:

- HRS section 444-9.5 (at least half of all individuals performing electrical work at a project must be licensed in accordance with HRS chapter 448E).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$25,000.00.

The Board noted for the record that the citation in paragraph A.11. should be "HRS section 444-9.5" instead of "HRS section 444-9".

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. Leong, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

j. In the Matter of the Contractors' Licenses of Shawmut Woodworking & Supply, Inc. and Matthew K. Tripp; CLB 2017-29-L

Respondent Shawmut Woodworking & Supply, Inc. ("Shawmut") is licensed as a "B" contractor under license number CT-21749. Shawmut's license was issued on or about December 10, 1998; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018.

Respondent Matthew K. Tripp ("Tripp") is licensed as a "B" contractor under license number CT-26642. Tripp's license was issued on or about February 7, 2006; and will expire or forfeit on or about September 30, 2018. At all relevant times herein, Tripp was the responsible managing employee for Shawmut.

RICO received a complaint alleging that Tripp was not in residence in the State of Hawaii during the time period in which Shawmut was working on a project to construct a Diesel store at the Ala Moana Shopping Center in approximately July through October of 2015.

Respondents agree not to contract to perform work on any other projects unless Respondents comply with the RME requirements of the law.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following rules:

- HAR section 16-77-71(a)(4) (RME shall be in residence in Hawaii during the period a project is under construction); and
- HAR section 16-77-71(a)(5) (RME shall be held responsible for any violation of HAR).

Respondents do not admit to violating any law or rule, and agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$25,000.00.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. Isemoto, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Action and Board's Final Order in the above case.

Mr. Kamai arrived at 8:50 a.m.

k. In the Matter of the Contractors Licenses of Drain-N-Rooter Plumbing, Inc. dba AM/PM Drain-Rooter, Inc. dba Hawaii Solar Company and Eric L. Baker; CLB 2011-58-L – Noncompliance with the terms of settlement agreement prior to filing of petition for disciplinary action and Board's Final Order approved on September 23, 2016

On September 23, 2016, the Contractors License Board ("Board") issued its Final Order in the above case. Respondent Drain-M-Rooter Plumbing, Inc. dba AM/PM Drain-Rooter, Inc. dba Hawaii Solar Company ("Respondent Hawaii Solar") and Respondent Eric L. Baker ("Respondent Baker") agreed to the voluntary surrender of its CT-29389 and CT29390 contactor licenses effective September 23, 2016; not to apply for a new license for at least five years from September 23, 2016; and pay an administrative of \$1,000.00 pursuant to a monthly payment plan of \$100.00 a month. The first payment was due on October 23, 2016. All subsequent payments are be due in thirty day increments thereafter. Respondents only made one payment of \$100.00 and the outstanding amount of the administrative fine is \$900.00.

Mr. Baker was present and provided proof of payment of \$1,000.00.

Mr. Baker was excused from the meeting room.

Mr. Baker re-entered the meeting room at 8:57 a.m.

It was moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. Isemoto, and unanimously carried to not revoke the Respondents' voluntarily surrendered licenses. Respondents' licenses remain voluntarily surrendered and Respondents cannot apply for a new license for at least five years from September 23, 2016.

2. Board's Final Orders

At 10:09 a.m., it was moved by Mr. Matsuzaki, seconded by Mr. Mochida, and unanimously carried to move out of executive session and to reconvene to the Board's regular order of business.

Requests a determination on whether or not they need the B (General building) license if they are not self-performing any of the civil or structure building work associated with the Solar PV systems (Ground/Carport mounts); whether a C-13 Electrical contractor is allowed to subcontract out all other scopes of work associated with the A (General engineering), B (General building), and other specialty C licenses; what Hawaii Administrative Rule prevents their company from just operating under a C-13 Electrical contractor license as the general contractor and take on the prime contract; and what the Board considers “incidental and supplemental work” to the C-13 license for Solar PV systems (Roof Mount, Ground Mount, Carport Mount).

Mr. Grant T. Jones, RME was present.

Mr. Jones stated his attendance at today’s meeting is primarily to discuss his license application; however, REC Solar Corporation (“REC”) is inquiring whether it can operate under its C-13 Electrical contractor classification for large scale carport and ground mount projects. REC subcontracts the structural building work associated with carport mount systems such as large I beams and steel purlins.

DAG Tam requested that REC provide job specific information as the Board cannot give a general determination. Mr. Lee added that every job is different, and it is difficult for the Board to give a broad generalized response.

Mr. Jones stated that REC also installs utility ground mounts which entails driving piles to install the mechanical racking. He also related that REC is making this inquiry because its “B” General building RME has left the company.

The Board indicated that depending on the project, the “B” General building contractor’s license may be required to perform this type of work. Additionally, projects may require work to be subcontracted to appropriate licensed specialty contractors. For example, if there is any structural steel work, the “B” General building contractor may be required to subcontract that work to a C-48 Structural steel contractor.

b. **Regulated Industries Complaints Office**

Requests a determination whether making trellises (metal or otherwise) with a C-32 Ornamental, guardrail, and fencing contractor’s license is within the scope of that classification. If it is not, which contractor’s license would be needed to make trellises on a commercial property?

c. **Nether Industries Inc.**

Requests a determination on the contractor’s license required to install process equipment at Big Island Dairy. All the interconnecting piping cannot be performed in a shop environment when the equipment is built,

and they always need to do some field retrofitting and new tubing installation. The style of sanitary food grade welding used in the food industry on thin wall stainless steel is TIG with an argon backed purge.

d. **Contractors Licensing Center**

Requests a determination whether or not a C-13 Electrical contractor or C-60 Solar power systems contractor will need an additional license classification to build substations when doing solar PV installations.

The Board stated that its determinations are made on a case-by-case basis. Every job is different and it is difficult for the Board to give a broad generalized response. However, in general, the Board indicated that the C-62 Pole and line or C-63 High voltage electrical contractor may be required if the voltage is more than 600 volts phase to phase. Also, depending on the scope of the project, additional contractor's licenses may be required (e.g., the project involves other site work).

e. **Island Tower & Communications, Inc.**

Requests a generalized ruling on whether a C-68TN Communication tower contractor can engage in and pull a building permit as the general contractor for projects where the majority of the scope of work to be performed is for modifications only to an existing Antennae Telecommunication facility/cell site where the approved building permit calls for only antennae and electrical work. They hire a Hawaii licensed C-13 Electrician to sign the Contractor Statement as the subcontractor for the phases of electrical work to be completed. Or vice versa, allowing a licensed C-13 Electrical contractor to pull a building permit as the general contractor while hiring a C-68 TN Communication tower licensed contractor to be listed as the specialty contractor on the DPP's contractor's statement.

The Board stated that its determinations are made on a case-by-case basis. Every job is different and it is difficult for the Board to give a broad generalized response. The Board indicated that the C-68TN Communication tower or the C-13 Electrical contractor may be the prime contractor for projects where the majority of the scope of work to be performed are only modifications to an existing antennae telecommunication facility/cell site; provided that the C-68TN Communication tower contractor must subcontract any electrical work to a C-13 Electrical contractor. With regard to the contractor that may pull a permit on these projects, the Board defers to the City and County, Department of Planning and Permitting as this agency has primary jurisdiction on the issuance of permits.

f. **Marathon Engineering Corporation**

Requests a determination on the contractor's license required to install safety padding to walls in facilities. They are 4' x 8' and are mechanically

fastened – they offer zero structural support.

Answer: This determination is made on a case-by-case basis, and is fact dependent. In this case, the Board did not receive enough information to make a determination.

- (3) What Hawaii Administrative Rule prevents their company from just operating under a C-13 Electrical contractor license as the general contractor and take on the prime contract.

Answer: HRS section 444-9 states that:

"No person within the purview of this chapter shall act, or assume to act, or advertise, as general engineering contractor, general building contractor, or specialty contractor without a license previously obtained under and in compliance with this chapter and the rules and regulations of the contractors license board."

See also, HAR section 16-77-4. In addition, HAR sections 16-77-33(c) and (d) state that:

"(c) A licensee classified as a specialty contractor shall not act, assume to act, or advertise as a contractor in any classification other

than those which the licensee holds; and
(d) Any licensee who acts, assumes to act, or advertises in any classification other than for which the licensee is duly licensed under this chapter shall be construed to be engaged in unlicensed activity.”

- (4) What the Board considers “incidental and supplemental work” to the C-13 license for Solar PV systems (Roof Mount, Ground Mount, Carport Mount).

Answer: This determination is made on a case-by-case basis, and is fact dependent. In this case, the Board did not receive enough information to make a determination

However, the Board noted that to qualify as “incidental and supplemental” work, that work must represent less than 50% of the project (as measured in relation to the project’s total cost or extent), and the work must be subordinate to, directly related to, and necessary for the completion of the work of greater importance that is within the scope of the licensee’s license (i.e., the primary work the specialty contractor is licensed to perform). For more information on “incidental and supplemental” work, see the October 22, 2013 Board’s Final Order Upon Remand at:

Requests a determination on (1) whether making trellises (metal or otherwise) with a C-32 Ornamental, guardrail, and fencing contractor’s license is within the scope of that classification. (2) If it is not, which contractor’s license would be needed to make trellises on a commercial property?

Recommendation:

The C-32 Ornamental, guardrail, and fencing contractor may not construct “trellises” (wood or otherwise). The “B” General building or C-6 Carpentry framing contractor’s license is required to construct a “trellis” made of wood; and the C-48 Structural steel contractor’s license is required to construct a “trellis” made of metal.

c. **Nether Industries Inc.**

Requests a determination on the contractor’s license required to install process equipment at Big Island Dairy. All the interconnecting piping cannot be performed in a shop environment when the equipment is built and always need to do some field retrofitting and new tubing installation. The style of sanitary food grade welding used in the food industry on thin wall stainless steel is TIG with an argon backed purge.

Recommendation: The C-37 Plumbing contractor's license; C-52 Ventilating and air conditioning or C-40 Refrigeration contractor's license (depending on the temperature of the glycol); C-4 Boiler, hot-water heating, hot water supply, and steam fitting contractor's license; and a C-56 Welding contractor's license is required if the welding performed is not related to the C-4 classification work.

d. **Contractors Licensing Center**

Requests a determination whether or not a C-13 Electrical contractor or C-60 Solar power systems contractor will need an additional license classification to build substations when doing solar PV installations.

Recommendation: This determination is made on a case-by-case basis, and is fact dependent. In this case, the Board did not receive enough information to make a determination.

e. **Island Tower & Communications, Inc.**

Requests a generalized ruling on whether a C-68TN Communication tower contractor can engage in and pull a building permit as the general contractor for projects where the majority of the scope of work to be performed is for modifications only to an existing Antennae Telecommunication facility/cell site where the approved building permit calls for only antennae and electrical work. They hire a Hawaii licensed C-13 Electrician to sign the Contractor Statement as the subcontractor for the phases of electrical work to be completed. Or vice versa, allowing a licensed C-13 Electrical contractor to pull a building permit as the general contractor while hiring a C-68 TN Communication tower licensed contractor to be listed as the specialty contractor on the DPP's contractor's statement.

Recommendation: This determination is made on a case-by-case basis, and is fact dependent. Because every job is different, the Board is unable to give a broad generalized response.

2. Legislation Committee:
Peter H.M. Lee, Chairperson

Mr. Lee presented the Legislation Committee Report. A summary was distributed to the Board for their review and comment.

S.B. No. 865, S.D. 1, H.D.1 - This bill requires any person applying for a license as an electrical contractor or electronic systems contractor to possess an electrician trade license or an electrical engineering degree from an accredited college to perform electrical work in the State. This bill also exempts public utilities and community antennae television companies.

S.B. No. 865 S.D. 1 crossed over to the House and was referred to the House Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce ("CPC").

On March 30, 2017, the CPC held a hearing on S.B. No. 865. The Board continued to testify in strong opposition for the following reasons: the requirement is unnecessary as the current license requirement is sufficient, the bill will close the door for otherwise qualified individuals to become licensed, and the exemption for public utility employees and community antennae companies is unclear as HRS chapter 448E already provides this exemption.

CPC passed this bill with an amendment to state that pole and line contractors and high voltage contractors are exempt from the requirement to possess an electrician trade license or electrical engineering degree.

The Senate disagrees with the House amendments and S.B. No. 865, S.D. 1, H.D.1 is referred to conference.

House Bill No. 573, H.D. 1, S.D. 1/ Senate Bill No. 1070, S.D. 2, H.D. 1 - This bill proposes to prohibit the prime contractor from substituting a listed subcontractor; and allows substitution of a listed subcontractor by the prime contractor for reasons which include: the inability of the listed subcontractor to perform the requirements of the proposed contract or the project; and the inability of the listed subcontractor to obtain the necessary license, bonding, insurance, or other statutory requirements to perform the work detailed in the contract.

H.B. No. 573, H.D. 1 crossed over to the Senate and referred to Senate Committee on Government Operations (“GVO”) and Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor (“JDL”).

On March 16, 2017, GVO held a hearing on H.B. No. 573, H.D. 1. The Board submitted comments that this bill may allow contractors without a license or the proper license classification to bid on construction projects, which conflicts with the contractors licensing laws.

GVO passed H.B. No. 573 H.D. 1 with the following amendments: deleting its contents and replacing with the contents of S.B. No. 1070, S.D. 2; clarifying that the substitution of an originally licensed subcontractor who has a valid and appropriate contractor’s license from the time of bid through the time of award may be made for specified reasons; clarifying that substitution of a listed subcontractor is allowed when the originally listed subcontractor is unable to perform in a manner consistent with the terms and written understandings of the parties; and inserting an effective date of July 1, 2055.

On March 30, 2017, the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor (“JDL”) and the Senate Committee on Ways and Means (“WAM”) held a public decision making and passed H.B. No. 573 H.D. 1, S.D. 1 and passed this bill with a sunset date of July 1, 2019.

S.B. No. 1070, S.D. 2 crossed over to the House and was referred to House Committee on Labor & Public Employment (“LAB”) / House Committee on Economic Development & Business (“EDB”) and House Committee on Finance (“FIN”).

On March 21, 2017, LAB and EDB held a hearing on S.B. No. 1070, S.D.2. The Board submitted testimony expressing concerns that a contractor without the proper classification may be allowed to bid.

LAB and EDB passed this bill with the following amendments: limiting bid clarifications and corrections to minor entity name corrections and the validity of a listed subcontractor’s license; and clarifying that a listed subcontractor may be substituted by the prime contractor due to the inability of the listed subcontractor to perform the contractual requirements of the proposed contract or the project consistent with the terms and written understandings of the parties at the time of bid.

S.B. No. 1068, S.D. 1, H.D. 1 - Prohibits the disqualification or rejection of a bid that includes a listed subcontractor whose license is not valid at the time of the bid due to a lapse in continuous insurance and bond coverages if the subcontractor meets certain conditions. Requires procurement officers to report any unlicensed activity if a bid is disqualified or rejected because the subcontractor fails to meet certain licensing requirements.

S.B. No. 1068 S.D. 1 crossed over to the House and was referred to LAB and FIN.

On March 21, 2017, LAB and EDB held a hearing on S.B. No. 1068, S.D.1. The Board submitted testimony to clarify the unlicensed activity that the procurement officer would be required to report to the Board.

LAB and EDB passed this bill with the following amendments: establishing time constraints for the subcontractor to satisfy certain conditions that would prevent the disqualification or rejection of a bid due to the subcontractor's invalid license; requiring a procurement officer to report any unlicensed activity if a bid is disqualified or rejected because the subcontractor fails to meet certain licensing requirements at the time of bid; and changing the effective date to July 1, 2050.

On March 31, 2017, FIN held a hearing on S.B. 1068, S.D. 1, H.D.1. The Board did not submit testimony as its concerns regarding unlicensed activity were addressed. FIN passed S.B. 1068, S.D. 1, H.D.1 unamended.

H.B. No. 1229, H.D.1, S.D. 1 - Requires public procurement construction bids to list subcontractors and joint contractors only for contracts with an unspecified total value; provided that bids lacking this list may be accepted if in the State's best interest and the value of the work to be performed by the joint contractor or subcontractor is equal to or less than an unspecified per cent of the total bid amount.

H.B. No. 1229, H.D.1 crossed over to the Senate and was referred to GVO and WAM.

On March 16, 2017, GVO held a hearing on H.B. No. 1229, H.D.1 and passed this bill with the following amendments: removing the one percent threshold and inserting a blank percent for situations when the total bid value that the joint contractor or subcontractor work must be less than for the bid to be acceptable without the listing joint contractors and subcontractors.

On March 30, 2017, JDL and WAM held a decision making on H.B. No. 1229, H.D.1, S.D.1 and passed it unamended.

H.B. No. 1415, H.D. 2 - Establishes additional performance bond requirements for surety companies and bond companies under the Hawaii Public Procurement Code. Establishes conditions for releasing or terminating the obligations of a payment bond.

H.B. No. 1415, H.D. 2 crossed over to the House and was referred to GVO and CPH.

GOV and CPH did not schedule hearings for H.B. No. 1415, H.D. 2.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 29 - Requests the Board to review all C-68 classified specialist classification definitions per the Hawaii Revised Statutes to provide the opportunity for public review and input.

On March 21, 2017 LAB held a hearing on H.C.R. No. 29. The Board submitted testimony in opposition. LAB passed H.C.R. No. 29 unamended.

On April 4, 2017 LAB held a decision making on H.C.R. No. 29. FIN did not accept any testimony and passed H.C.R. No. 29 unamended.

H.C.R. No. 29 crossed over to the Senate and was referred to CPH.

House Resolution No. 47 and House Concurrent Resolution No. 85 - Requesting the Auditor to Conduct a Feasibility Study for the Creation of a Structural Licensing Board.

H.R. No. 47 is referred to House Committee on Intrastate Commerce ("IAC") and CPC.

IAC and CPC have not scheduled a hearing on H.R. No. 47.

H.C.R. No. 85 is referred to IAC and CPC. IAC and CPC have not scheduled a hearing on H.C.R. No. 85.
