Call to Order: There being a quorum present, the meeting was called to order at

<u>Legislation</u>: <u>H.B. No. 1381, Relating to Elevator Mechanics (and subsequent drafts)</u>

This bill expands or clarifies various aspects of statutes regarding

elevator mechanic licensing and apprentice registration.

Executive Officer Cabral stated that the biggest issue the Board has with H.B. No. 1381 is the apprenticeship training. There are currently two paths of training: formal through a training program, and informal through

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on the job training. The Board recognizes the importance of formal training as everyone gets the same information and training. Executive Officer Cabral also mentioned there has not been any adjudicatory matters regarding those who have been trained under a licensed elevator mechanic. She stated that Senator Baker would like to ensure, since the industry is technologically progressing, that apprentices are aware of new information.

Because the union has its own program, Executive Officer Cabral is not sure if the union bylaws prevent non-union members from attending the apprenticeship program. She referenced when DAG Tam mentioned that the Board cannot treat anybody differently; everyone should be able to pay the same price and get the same training. Mr. Yamane of the IUEC stated that the union offers continuing education ("CE") courses to non-union members, but not formal training.

Mr. Tsunemoto did some research and found that there are online apprenticeship courses available, but he is not sure if they are at the same level as what the union offers. Mr. Tsunemoto thinks that apprentices should go through the DLIR and not the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Executive Officer Cabral mentioned that some apprentices that undergo on the job training do not go through the DLIR.

Executive Officer Cabral asked the Board if Honolulu Community College were to offer training, would there be enough apprentices to attend? The Board felt that there would not be enough apprentices for the program.

Executive Officer Cabral cited questions previously asked to DAG Tam: If the board were to remove the apprenticeship registration would it be an issue that the Board does not have any authority over them? Would it be unlicensed activity? DAG Jacob stated if the definition of an apprentice elevator mechanic were to be removed from H.B. No. 1381 he does not believe it would be considered as unlicensed activity. As the Statute requires training, it would be difficult to say that the apprentices are practicing without a license.

Mr. Yamane of the IUEC expressed his concerns on the current registration date requirement. He stated that if he has an IUEC member come to Hawaii, who has four years of experience working on the mainland and can furnish proof of hours, his/her hours reset upon registration and he/she will need to start the process from the beginning to sit for the exam. Executive Officer Cabral stated that if she understands Mr. Yamane correctly, removing the requirement to register with the Board would resolve that issue. Monitoring would have to be done through a training program, which needs to be acceptable by the Board, like a didactic program with on the job training, and with a licensed elevator mechanic. Also, to ensure that everyone is up to par in knowledge, the continuing education ("CE") portion with renewal should be added. He advised the Board that the PACE program offers CE.

Mr. Yamane also explained to the Board that because there is a shortage

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of licensed elevator mechanics, H.B. No. 1381 proposed to issue temporary permits to apprentices under certain condition.

Apprenticeship Training:

The Board has concerns that an apprentice with on the job training would not be able to get the full range of training as an apprentice in a formal training program. Executive Officer Cabral asked if CE courses would be able to bring an apprentice up to speed on knowledge and information. The Board does not think so as CE courses are meant to be taken after the baseline education is complete and focuses more on codes. The Board wants the CE requirement changed from ten hours to eight hours.

Executive Session:

At 2:37 p.m., it was moved Mr. Wilburn, seconded by Ms. Garcia-Paahana, and unanimously carried (by roll call with Chairperson Morinaga, Vice Chairperson Wilburn, Ms. Garcia-Paahana, Mr. Nakamine, and Mr. Tsunemoto voting aye) for the Board to move into Executive Session to consult with the Board's attorney on questions and issues pertaining to the board's powers, duties, privileges, immunities, and liabilities, as provided in HRS § 92-5(a)(4).

At 3:35 p.m., it was moved by Mr. Tsunemoto, seconded by Vice Chairperson Wilburn, (Chairperson Morinaga, Vice Chairperson Wilburn, Ms. Garcia-Paahana, Mr. Nakamine, and Mr. Tsunemoto voting aye) and unanimously carried for the Board to move out of Executive Session.

Elevator Mechanic Temporary Permit:

Peter L. Shannon

At the previous Board meeting, the Board had asked Executive Officer Cabral if Mr. Shannon held a license in another state since he was applying for a temporary permit. Executive Officer Cabral confirmed that Mr. Shannon does have a license in another state.

It was moved by Vice Chairperson Wilburn, seconded by Mr. Nakamine, and unanimously carried to ratify the Elevator Mechanic Temporary Permit for Peter L. Shannon.
