Call to Order: The agenda for this meeting was filed with the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, as

required by section 92-7(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS").

There being a quorum, the Chair called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m.

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Chair's Report:

Announcements and Introductions

The Chair excused Dr. Ma and Mr. VandenBussche and asked the audience to introduce themselves.

The Chair acknowledged Ms. Isobe's picture on the cover of the July 2018 issue of Pharmacy Today, a publication of the American Pharmacists Association.

Approval of the Previous Minutes – July 19, 2018 Meeting

The Chair called for a motion in regards to the minutes of the July 19, 2018 meeting.

There being no substantive amendments, upon a motion by Mr. Weinberg, seconded by Ms. Isobe, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes for the July, 19, 2018 meeting as circulated.

2018 Legislation

<u>SB 2247, SD1, HD2, CD1</u> Relating to Opioid Antagonists – Authorizes pharmacists to prescribe, dispense, and provide related education on opioid antagonists to individuals at risk of opioid overdose and to family members and caregivers of individuals at risk of opioid overdose without the need for a written, approved collaborative agreement; subject to certain conditions. (CD1) Governor approved on 7/9/2018, Act 154, SLH 2018.

The EO reported that the pharmacy working group is working on a bill for the 2019 Legislative session that would amend Act 154, SLH 2018 and align it with the HD2 version and other amendments for clarification and that one of the questions raised at the working group meeting was if a pharmacist was able to "prescribe" an opioid antagonist, but not dispense the opioid antagonist.

The Board discussed various scenarios in which a pharmacist may not be able to dispense the opioid antagonist because the pharmacy does not have it in stock or ran out. They also asked if the prescription could be transferred to another pharmacy if that was the case.

The EO explained that this was not the intent of the law and pointed out the following:

Section 1 of the bill refers to expanding "the scope of registered pharmacists'
practice by allowing pharmacists to prescribe, dispense, and provide related
education on opioid antagonists without the need for a written approved
collaborative agreement.";

- The definition of "Practice of pharmacy" specifically refers to "prescribing **and** dispensing an opioid antagonist..."; and **not** "prescribing **or** dispensing";
- The current law states that a pharmacist who prescribes and dispenses opioid antagonists pursuant to subsection (a) shall:
 - 1. Complete a training program...
 - Provide the individual who is receiving the opioid antagonist with information and written educational material on risk factors of opioid overdose, etc; and
 - 3. **Dispense** the opioid antagonist to the individual who is at risk for an opioid overdose, family member, or caregiver **as soon as practicable after the pharmacist issues the prescription.**

The EO stated that the intent of the legislature was not to give pharmacists "prescriptive authority" but to give the pharmacist the authority to "prescribe and dispense" opioid antagonists, like women's contraceptives.

Revisions to Pharmacist's Corresponding Responsibility Guidance Statement - Draft

The EO reported that she is working with the Chair on revisions that will also include reference to the new laws recently enacted by the Governor.

Pharmacists Continuing Education Audit – Report

The EO reported that there are still a few pharmacists who did not respond and a few more that are deficient. She will try to finalize by the next Board meeting.

Working Conditions Survey

The EO reported that she is checking if the working conditions survey can be placed on the Board's web page.

State Board of Pharmacy ACPE CPE Activity

The EO reported that she is still considering this as an option to provide a laws and rules update online course.

Ms. Isobe volunteered to assist the EO on this project.

<u>Correspondence:</u> Inpatient and Outpatient Dispensing Emergency Kits

The Chair asked Ms. Keefe to lead the discussion on the following inquiry from Emily Cowan:

"I we spoke yesterday about some questions regarding inpatient MedDispense units being managed from out of state. I was just following to see if you were able to get some clarification.

To expand on that question- if it allowed what license would be needed? Just a regular Hawaii pharmacy license?

My other question regarding off side medication management pertains to outpatient dispensing. You had mentioned that automatic dispensing pharmacy laws were repealed, so is there a way to dispense emergency medications from an IPU to out patients?

For example, if a hospice patient in an outpatient setting emergently needs morphine in the middle of the night, would there be a way to utilize meddispense or another dispensing model to dispense the medication without an RPH present from the inpatient setting (ie pyxis) to get delivered to the patient? "

Ms. Keefe stated that this sounds like an ekit under HAR 16-95-80

The Chair wondered if the unit was more like a Pyxis machine and that an out-of-state pharmacy is servicing the unit.

The EO asked for clarification about who can stock a Pyxis machine.

Ms. Pi stated that their pharmacy technicians stock the Pyxis machines.

Ms. Keefe stated that HAR §16-95-81 (e) specifies that a pharmacist replace any expired drugs, relabel, and reseal the kit.

After further discussion, the Board deferred this matter to their October meeting.
