Call to Order:	There being a quorum established, Dr. Tsuchiyama called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.
<u>Approval of</u> <u>the Minutes</u> :	It was moved by Dr. Kroll, seconded by Dr. Tsuchiyama, and unanimously carried to approve the Board meeting minutes of December 6, 2018 with changes.
	After some discussion, the following changes to the minutes were requested (underlined material added, while bracketed material is to be deleted):

**New Business** 

b. Washroom and Toilet Facilities in Residential and Commercial Buildings Pursuant to Section §16-72-52 and §16-72-53

The Board also conveyed to Dr. Mac that the use of a portable sink with soap and hot water is an acceptable means to [disinfect] <u>cleanse</u> the hands and acupuncture treatment tools.

Executive Officer's New member, Dr. McMenemy, was introduced to the Acupuncture Board.

New Business: a. Reciprocal Certification for California Licensed Acupuncturists

As per the December 6, 2018 Acupuncture Board meeting, the Board discussed Route 8, which is a reciprocal certification for California licensed acupuncturists. It is a program offered through the National Certification Commission for Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine (NCCAOM) that allows acupuncturists who are licensed through the state of California to apply during an 18-month period, that extends through 2020, to be grandfathered into national licensure. Hawaii requires acupuncture applicants to provide test scores before they will issue an acupuncture license to practice in the state. Those people who are grandfathered into a national license through Route 8 do not qualify for a Hawaii license because they do not have a national test numerical score; they have a "passing" grade. The Board has not made a decision; this topic is still under discussion.

b. <u>SB547 (Relating to the Physical Therapy Practice Act)</u>

The Board discussed SB547, which amends the Physical Therapy Act to allow physical therapists to practice dry needling. It was moved by Dr. Kroll, seconded by Dr. Tsuchiyama and unanimously carried to oppose the bill because dry needling is a technique of acupuncture and it is within the scope of the defined Acupuncture Practice. The Board believes that the lack of education, clinical training and malpractice insurance coverage physical therapists receive for dry needling makes allowing them to practice it a danger to the public.

Old Business: a. Finalizing Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) Chapter 16-72 Revisions

The Board discussed and revised Subchapters below (crossed-out material is to be deleted; underlined material is to be added):

Subchapter 2

§16-72-3 <u>Definitions.</u> "Acupuncture needle" means a straight, slender rod an FDA approved Class II medical device; a sterile, solid filiform needle of various lengths and gauges diameter, tapered to a sharp point at one end for piercing <u>or non-invasive</u> <u>stimulation</u> of the skin, with one end for manipulation or maintaining the needle in place. , and inserted by an acupuncture practitioner into acupuncture points on the human body. A staple is not an acupuncture needle.

> <u>"Ashi needling", also known as "dry needling," "motor point</u> <u>needling,' and "myofascial trigger point needling" is an Acupuncture</u> <u>technique synonymous with the definition of Acupuncture and is a</u> <u>treatment modality</u> that involves the insertion and retention or nonretention of thin, non-medicated solid needles into muscles or <u>connective tissues.</u>

Subchapter 3

§16-72-4 <u>Authorized practice of acupuncture</u>. An acupuncture practitioner is authorized to <del>conduct</del> <u>diagnose and</u> treatment of the human body by means of stimulation of a piercing and/or <u>stimulating</u> certain acupuncture point or points to <u>regulate</u> for the purpose of controlling and regulating the flow and balance of energy, <u>neurovascular</u>, <u>immunological</u>, <u>endocrine and pain</u> <u>pathways in the body</u>. <u>The practice includes cutaneous or invasive</u> <u>stimulation of specific points on the skin with or without retention</u> <u>needles</u>. <u>Techniques included are the techniques of piercing the skin by inserting needles and point stimulation by the use of ashi needling</u>, <u>aquapuncture</u>, acupressure, electrical, mechanical, thermal therapy, moxibustion, cupping, <u>laser acupuncture</u>, <u>auricular acupuncture</u>, lifestyle and dietary consultation and or traditional therapeutic means-, <u>including prescribing and dispensing herbal medicine</u>.

Subchapter 5

§16-72-20 <u>Applications.</u> (a) Every person seeking a license to practice acupuncture <u>and/or [Oriental]</u> herbal medicine or wishing to use any acupuncture title in the <u>this</u> State shall file an application on a form provided by the board.

16-72-20(b)(a). The applicant shall be responsible for having the testing contractor verify, directly to the board, the passing score of the examination as required in section 16-72-36.
