Call to Order: There being a quorum present, Chairperson Polischek called the meeting to order at 8:34 a.m.

Agenda: The agenda for this meeting was filed with the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, as required by Hawaii Revised Statutes (“HRS”) section 92-7(b).

Minutes: It was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Kagawa, and unanimously carried to approve the Applications Committee Meeting and Executive Session Meeting Minutes of April 1, 2019, and the Board Meeting and Executive Session Meeting Minutes of March 15, 2019, as circulated.

Requests a determination on the following:

- i) Whether the C-49b Hot tub and pool contractor's license can install metal corrugated tanks with vinyl liners and soft covers, and Australian tanks larger than 10,000 gallons provided that a cement contractor or excavation contractor prepares the site for the tank to be installed;
- ii) Whether an "A" General engineering contractor's license is required to install a tank larger than 10,000 gallons when a licensed contractor would be installing a cement pad or an excavation company would be creating a professional compacted pad for the tank;
- iii) Whether the C-49b Hot tub and pool contractor's license can install ultraviolet lights, provided an electrical contractor gave us a separate outlet from the pump electricity to plug into; and
- iv) Whether the C-37 Plumbing contractor's license is required to install an ultraviolet light when a licensed electrician is connecting and providing the power for it.

Mr. Isemoto noted that typically these are premanufactured corrugated metal tanks that are bolted together and would require a C-48 Structural steel contractor's license to construct the tank. The "A" General engineering contractor could either self perform the construction of the tank or subcontract that work to a C-48 contractor.

Recommendation:

- i) Whether the C-49b Hot tub and pool contractor's license can install metal corrugated tanks with vinyl liners and soft covers, including Australian tanks, larger than 10,000 gallons provided that a cement contractor or excavation contractor prepares the site for the tank to be installed.

Response: No.

- ii) Whether an "A" General engineering contractor's license is required to install a tank larger than 10,000 gallons when a licensed contractor would be installing a cement pad or an excavation company would be creating a professional compacted pad for the tank.

Response: Yes; the "A" General engineering contractor may self perform the installation of a pre-manufactured corrugated metal tank that is bolted together through its C-37b Irrigation and lawn sprinkler systems classification or may subcontract the installation

of the tank to the C-48 Structural steel contractor and self-perform the installation of the concrete ring.

- iii) Whether the C-49b Hot tub and pool contractor's license can install ultraviolet lights, provided an electrical contractor gave us a separate outlet from the pump electricity to plug into.

Response: No.

- iv) Whether the C-37 Plumbing contractor's license is required to install an ultraviolet light when a licensed electrician is connecting and providing the power for it.

Response: No, a C-13 Electrical contractor's license is required.

Mr. Lee arrived at 8:46 a.m.

b. Honolulu Seawater Air Conditioning ("HSWAC")

Seeking guidance on the following: Entering into a 20 year Chilled Water Service Agreement with the City and County of Honolulu, does HSWAC need to have a contractor's license?

Members reviewed and discussed the information provided by HSWAC.

Mr. Gregory Wong, HSWAC Customer Service Manager, gave an overview of the chilled water service they are providing. Basically, cold deep seawater is piped to its cooling station located behind the Gold Bond Building. Heat exchangers transfer the heat and the warmed water is discharged off shore. Mechanical equipment circulates the cold fresh water through a network of freshwater pipes to its customers. HSWAC would install the meter and lay the infrastructure. HSWAC is the project owner and will contract licensed contractors to build the chilled water cooling system. The system and the plant will be maintained by HSWAC; HSWAC will hire licensed contractors for this work. The Board stated that by selling the interconnection, HSWAC is acting as a contractor.

Mr. Matt Matsunaga, counsel for HSWAC, stated that HSWAC is providing chilled water service and he doesn't believe that HSWAC is required to have a contractor's license. Mr. Matsunaga stated that he looked at public policy and since HSWAC is subcontracting all the work, a contractor's license is not required.

The Board stated that a contractor's license is required because all HSWAC service laterals are going into each customer's building and connecting to each customer. HSWAC is taking their lines into the customer's property and tying into the customer's system. If HSWAC does not contract with the customer for interconnection, then a contractor's license is not required. Utility companies let the building owner hire the contractor to tie the utility service to the building.

Mr. Matsunaga related that the HSWAC contract provided to the Board

does not contain any construction service to provide its chilled water service, consequently a contractor's license is not required. The Board stated that it is not approving HSWAC's contract. Mr. Wong stated that he will be mindful of HSWAC's contract and ensure that it does not include any construction service to tie into a customer's system.

Recommendation: HSWAC is required to have a contractor's license to perform connections to individual customer buildings.

c. Mocon Corporation

Requests a determination whether the coating work is incidental and supplemental to the concrete rehabilitation work (C-43 Sewer, sewage disposal, drain, and pipe laying or the C-31a Cement concrete classifications) for the Countywide WWPS Wetwell Rehabilitation Project Phase 3 and that Mocon Corporation may self-perform the coating work with its "A" General Engineering license. If the coating work is not incidental and supplemental to the concrete rehabilitation work, requests a determination whether the concrete rehabilitation is incidental and supplemental to the coating work under the C-33 Painting and decorating classification, or would a contractor doing this type of work be required to hold multiple licenses?

The Board reviewed and discussed the information received from Mocon Corporation ("Mocon").

Mr. Daniel Kim, counsel for Mocon, stated that the Countywide WWPS Wetwell Rehabilitation Project Phase 3 ("Project") includes the following work:

- 1) Repair and preparation of concrete surface and application of a protective epoxy coating on the concrete and metal surfaces of the pump station wet wells;
- 2) Installation of sewer bypass to get to the wet well to repair; and
- 3) Miscellaneous site-related improvements.

Mr. Kim stated that the above work falls under the C-43 Sewer, sewage disposal, drain, and pipe laying contractor's license which is included with the "A" General engineering contractor's license. Mr. Kim went on to say that per DC50, the C-33 Painting and decorating work is incidental and supplemental to the C-43 Sewer, sewage disposal, drain, and pipe laying classification. The total bid cost is \$547,881.15 and the total contingency cost is \$75,000.00; and that the cost of the epoxy coating work for the wet wells is \$37,436.00 (7.5%). Mocon would hire certified applicators to apply the epoxy coating.

Mr. Darin Fogg, Vice President of Mocon, stated that the County of Maui referred him to request a Board determination at today's meeting. He stated that Mocon will have certified coaters performing the epoxy coating work using the Raven 405 epoxy coating system.

Mr. Ryan Kobayashi stated that the Hawaii Laborers' International Union of North America supports Mocon's position that the epoxy coating work is incidental and supplemental to the C-43 or the C-31a and may be performed by an "A" General engineering contractor.

Mr. Kim stated that the epoxy coating work still falls under 50% of the C-31a Cement concrete work. Chairperson Polischeck informed Mr. Kim that percentage is only one criteria that the Board considers in the determination whether the work is incidental and supplemental. Mr. Kim went on to say that the work cannot be performed if the bypass is not constructed. The Board informed Mr. Kim that the bypass is a temporary structure; it is looking at the permanent work being performed on this Project.

Mr. Lee asked Mr. Fogg if he holds the C-33 Painting and decorating contractor's license. Mr. Fogg responded no and stated that he worked for 6 years with Honolulu Industrial Coating Co. Inc. ("HICCI") doing epoxy coating work under HICCI's C-33 license.

Mr. Albert Stiglmeier, President and owner of HICCI stated that HICCI was given the contract 3 years ago. He went on to say that he wanted to renegotiate the terms of the contract to increase the cost amount. Mr. Stiglmeier stated that their price was \$250,000.00 and it includes surface preparation because cleaning and surface preparation are an essential part of the coating process. The Board asked Mr. Stiglmeier to give a ball park percentage of surface preparation and epoxy coating. Mr. Stiglmeier stated approximately sixty percent is surface preparation and approximately forty percent is epoxy coating application.

Mr. Isemoto asked Mr. Fogg if there is any spall repair work on the Project. Mr. Fogg responded that the work is to rebuild and resurface. He estimated that there may be two percent of the Project where they run into rebar and will work with the general contractor to do the structural work.

Mr. Lee asked Mr. Fogg if the Project includes the installation of cured-in-place-manhole. Mr. Fogg responded no.

Mr. Leong asked if the concrete preparation was included with the contract with HICCI. Mr. Fogg responded yes.

Mr. Kim submitted additional information pertaining to the contract between Mocon and HCCI at today's meeting. Mr. Stiglmeier stated that he met with Mocon last week to renegotiate.

Mr. Leong asked Mr. Fogg if Mocon contacted any other contractors. Mr. Fogg responded no, they will self perform the epoxy coating work.

Mr. Mark Stiglmeier stated that he is a licensed C-33 Painting and decorating contractor since 1993, he is the President of Coating Works

Hawaii, Inc., and the previous RME for HICCI. He went on to say that Mocon does not have a C-33 Painting and decorating or a C-55 Waterproofing contractor's license and that Mr. Fogg applied for a C-33 Painting and decorating license and was not issued the license. Epoxy coating has always been performed by C-33 Painting and decorating contractors. Mr. Mark Stiglmeier stated that the epoxy coating work is not incidental and supplemental work, rather it is vital to the Project. HICCI was the previous contractor on the Maui Project Phase II and that the C-33 Painting and decorating classification was listed by the general contractor. The work requires removal of the existing coating and painting on a protective coating. The C-33 classification includes the application of protective materials including epoxy whereas the C-43 and C-31a Cement concrete classifications do not.

Mr. Jeffrey Masatsugu, Painters Fund, stated that based upon the Board's prior determinations, the C-33 classification is the appropriate classification to perform the epoxy coating on wet wells and other sewer structures. Although he does not have the project specifications or pricing breakdown, he stated that the percentage of work is not the only factor in determining whether the work is "incidental and supplemental" work.

Mr. Lee noted that Mr. Fogg has experience in applying epoxy coating because he worked for HICCI in the past. Mr. Masatsugu stated that it is telling that the inquirer applied for the C-33 Painting and decorating license; it implies that a C-33 classification is required.

Recommendation: The application of the epoxy coating is the primary work for the Project; thus, this work is not incidental and supplemental to the C-43 Sewer, sewage disposal, drain, and pipe laying or the C-31a Cement concrete classifications and Mocon Corporation may not self-perform the coating work with its "A" General engineering license. The Board did not have enough information to determine whether the concrete rehabilitation work would be incidental and supplemental to the C-33 Painting and decorating work; however, the C-33 Painting and decorating contractor may perform surface preparation work provided that the work is non-structural.

Requests a determination that the C-43 Sewer, sewage disposal, drain, and pipe laying contractor cannot perform the application of plural – component, chemical resistant epoxy coating to new and/or existing sewer manholes, wet wells or any

other sewer structures requiring protective coating against biogenic sulfide corrosion.

Recommendation: The C-43 Sewer, sewage disposal, drain, and pipe laying contractor cannot perform the application of plural – component, chemical resistant epoxy coating to new and/or existing sewer manholes, wet wells or any other sewer structures requiring protective coating against biogenic sulfide corrosion.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. Kagawa, and unanimously carried to approve the above scope recommendations.

Chairperson Polischek called for a recess from the Board's meeting at 12:07 p.m. to discuss and deliberate on the following adjudicatory matters pursuant to HRS chapter 91.

- 1. Settlement Agreements
 - a. In the Matter of the Contractors' Licenses of True Line Construction Services, LLC, and Reynaldo U. Tabura; CLB 2018-139-L

RICO's investigation indicated that on or about September 26, 2016, Respondent True Line Construction Services, LLC ("TLCS") contracted with Unlimited Construction Services, Inc. to install tile at Moanalua Hillside Apartments.

At the time TLCS entered into this contract, neither TLCS nor Respondent Reynaldo U. Tabura ("Tabura") had the required C-51 or C-51a classification.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violation of the following rule: HAR §16-77-33(c) (out-of-scope activity).

Respondents agree to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$1,000.00.

b. In the Matter of the Contractors License of Stephen J. Menezes; CLB 2019-19-L

RICO alleges that on or about August 12, 2018, Stephen J. Menezes ("Respondent") electronically submitted his contractor's license renewal application and answered "no" in response to the question "In the past 2 years have you been convicted of a crime which has not been annulled or expunged?"

On or about January 19, 2017, Respondent was convicted of the petty misdemeanor offense of Operating a Vehicle Under the Influence of an Intoxicant in the District Court of the Third Circuit, State of Hawaii.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statutes: HRS §§ 436B-19(5) (procuring a license through fraud, misrepresentation, or deceit) and 444-17(10) (misrepresenting a material fact by applicant in obtaining a license).

Respondent agrees to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$500.00.

c. In the Matter of the Contractors License of H Nu Solar, LLC doing business as H Nu Energy; CLB 2018-250-L

RICO alleges that from February 2, 2017 to May 18, 2017, H Nu Solar, LLC doing business as H Nu Energy ("Respondent") installed a solar photovoltaic system at a State of Hawaii project.

From May 31, 2017 to March 12, 2018, Robert E. Hilbun was the RME for Respondent. The case against Robert E. Hilbun was addressed in a separate RICO case as he is no longer Respondent's employee.

RICO further alleges that during the course of this project, Respondent and the RME failed to properly supervise the apprentice electrician. Specifically, Respondent and the RME failed to ensure the compliance with the 1:1 ratio of licensed electricians to apprentice electricians. The matter against the unlicensed electrician was handled in a separate RICO case.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violation of the following statute: HRS §444-9.5(b) (failure to ensure that half of electrical workers were licensed).

Respondent agrees to pay an administrative fine in the amount of \$2,000.00.

d. In the Matter of the Contractor's License of Michael S. Malkovich; CLB 2008-445-L

RICO received a complaint alleging that Michael S. Malkovich ("Respondent") failed to include required homeowner contract disclosures in his contract for renovation of a residence on Maui and Respondent exhibited poor workmanship.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following statute and rules: HRS §444-25.5 (required homeowner contract disclosures) and HAR §16-77-80 (required disclosure for homeowner contracts) and 16-77-97 (workmanship shall conform to trade standards).

Respondent agrees to the voluntary revocation of Respondent's license.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Kagawa, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Actions in each of the above cases.

2. Board's Final Order

a. In the Matter of the Contractors Licenses of Chriscontract, Inc. and Christopher R. Johnston; CLB 2016-180-L

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Matsuoka, and unanimously carried to amend the Board's Final Order dated March 15, 2019, to reflect that the Respondents requested to present oral arguments before the Board.

Following the Board's review, deliberation and decisions in these matters, pursuant to HRS chapter 91, Chairperson Polischek announced that the Board was reconvening to its open meeting at 12:07 p.m.

Chairperson Polischek called for a short recess at 12:15 p.m.

The Board reconvened at 12:21 p.m.

Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 16-77
Proposed Amendments to the Specialty Contractor Classifications

Executive Officer Ito reported that the Iron Workers Stabilization Fund, Hawaii Laborers-Employers Cooperation and Education Trust, LiUNA Local 368, and Pacific Resource Partnership submitted comments.

Mr. Leong stated that the Board will review the written comments submitted by interested parties. The comments will be grouped by classification for discussion at future Board meetings.

5. Legislative Committee:
Peter Lee, Chairperson

Mr. Lee presented the Legislative Committee Report:

Relating to Contractors

a. House Bill No. 69, H.D. 1/Senate Bill No. 767, S.D. 1, H.D. 1

Raises the threshold under the contractor licensing law's handyman exemption from \$1,000 to \$1,500 and makes it applicable only to the cost of labor and materials.

The Board opposes these bills.

H.B. No. 69 HD1 crossed over to the Senate and has a single committee referral (Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health).

CPH did not schedule a hearing on HB69 HD1.

S.B. No. 767 SD1 HD1 will continue on to conference committee meetings.

b. House Bill No. 81, H.D. 1

Prohibits the performance of incidental and supplemental work outside the scope of licensure by a specialty contractor acting as a subcontractor on any project requiring the seal or stamp of a licensed structural engineer; and specifies that the performance of work in certain crafts or trades shall not be considered incidental and supplemental.

H.B. No. 81 HD1 crossed over to the Senate and has a single committee referral (CPH).

CPH did not schedule a hearing on H.B. No. 81 HD1.

c. House Bill No. 838, H.D., S.D. 1

Exempts an eleemosynary organization that meets certain conditions from the requirement of licensure as a contractor.

On April 3, 2019 the Senate Committee on Ways and Means ("WAM") held a hearing on H.B. No. 838 HD1 SD1. The Board submitted testimony in opposition. WAM passed H.B. No. 838 HD1 SD1 unamended.

It appears that H.B. No. 838 HD1 SD1 will continue on to conference committee meetings.

Relating to the Owner-Builder Exemption

d. House Bill No. 1154, H.D. 1

Requires owner-builders to provide proof of withholding taxes and workers' compensation insurance. Amends fines for failure to comply with statute.

H.B. No. 1154 HD1 crossed over to the Senate and has a double committee referral (CPH, Senate Committee on Judiciary/WAM).

The Senate committees did not schedule a hearing on H.B. No. 1154 HD1.

Relating to Mutual Assistance Agreement

e. House Bill No. 1305, H.D. 2, S.D. 1

Authorizes the State and electrical utilities to enter into a mutual assistance agreement with an out-of-state utility to assist in the restoration of electrical power following a natural disaster or emergency.

On March 28, 2018, the CPH held a hearing on H.B. No. 1305 HD2 and passed this bill with an effective date of July 1, 2019.

Board position: No position on this bill.

f. Senate Bill No. 1293, S.D. 2

Authorizes the State to enter into a mutual assistance agreement with an out of state utility in order to restore electrical power of the State, without regard to any regulatory law, in times of an emergency or natural disaster.

S.B. No. 1293 SD2 crossed over to the House and has a triple committee referral (House Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, CPC, FIN).

The House committees did not schedule any hearings for

S.B. No. 1293, SD2.

Relating to Commerce and Consumer Affairs

g. House Bill No. 1528, H.D. 1

Requires the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to suspend all fees relating to the licensing or registration of persons under its jurisdiction, from the fiscal year beginning in 2021 to the fiscal year ending in 2029.

H.B. No. 1528 HD1 crossed over to the Senate and has a double committee referral (CPH, WAM).

The Senate committees did not schedule a hearing on H.B. No. 1528 HB1.

Relating to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs

h. House Bill No. 1126, H.D. 2

Appropriates funds for Fiscal Biennium 2019-2021 for the professional and vocational licensing program of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, which is under the purview of the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Intrastate Commerce. Establishes criteria to determine the amounts to be assessed for fees and expenses regulated under Title 25, HRS. Provides for the reduction or cessation of fees or interest paid into the contractors recovery fund, contractors education fund, real estate recovery fund, real estate education fund, and condominium education fund if the funds attain a certain dollar amount.

H.B. No. 1126 HD2 crossed over to the Senate and has a double committee referral (CPH, WAM).

The Senate committees did not schedule a hearing on H.B. No. 1126 HD2.

i. Senate Bill No. 812, S.D. 1, H.D. 2

Establishes the operating budget for certain programs of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Establishes or amends certain special fund ceilings and provides for suspension or refund of fees if the ceiling is exceeded.

On March 27, 2019 FIN held a hearing on S.B. No. 812 SD1 HD1. This measure provides for the refund or cessation of fees to be paid by renewing licensees into the contractors recovery fund and the contractors

education fund once the funds attain the following amounts respectively, \$420,893.000 and \$15,315.00.

The Board submitted testimony offering comments and requested to be given the opportunity to gather information before the establishment of ceilings for the recovery and education fund; and requested that the option of refunding licensees be deleted from the bill. FIN passed out HD2, however the sections pertaining to the contractors recovery fund and contractors education fund remained unamended.

On April 11, 2019, S.B. No. 812 SD1 HD1 was enrolled to the Governor.
