Approval of the Previous Minutes –December 6, 2018

The Chair asked if there were any corrections to the minutes of the December 6, 2018 meeting.

There being no amendments, upon a motion by Ms. Kodama, seconded by Ms. Boyer, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes of the December 6, 2018 meeting as circulated.

Executive Officer's Report:

Remedial Course(s) Approval

Remedial Courses Approved by Other State BONs

The EO reported that the Florida BON requires that their remedial course include a minimum of 80 didactic hours and 96 clinical hours and that they also do not regulate "review" courses when asked about NCLEX review courses. They also require that prospective remedial course providers complete a new nursing education program application and provide compliance with the following:

464.019 Approval of nursing education programs.—

(1) PROGRAM APPLICATION.—An educational institution that wishes to conduct a program in this state for the prelicensure education of professional or practical

- nurses must submit to the department a program application and review fee of \$1,000 for each prelicensure nursing education program to be offered at the institution's main campus, branch campus, or other instructional site. The program application must include the legal name of the educational institution, the legal name of the nursing education program, and, if such institution is accredited, the name of the accrediting agency. The application must also document that:
- (a)1. For a professional nursing education program, the program director and at least 50 percent of the program's faculty members are registered nurses who have a master's or higher degree in nursing or a bachelor's degree in nursing and a master's or higher degree in a field related to nursing.
- For a practical nursing education program, the program director and at least 50 percent of the program's faculty members are registered nurses who have a bachelor's or higher degree in nursing.
 The educational degree requirements of this paragraph may be documented by an official transcript or by a written statement from the educational institution verifying that the institution conferred the degree.
- (b) The program's nursing major curriculum consists of at least:
- Fifty percent clinical training in the United States, the District of Columbia, or a
 possession or territory of the United States for a practical nursing education
 program, an associate degree professional nursing education program, or a
 professional diploma nursing education program.
- 2. Forty percent clinical training in the United States, the District of Columbia, or a possession or territory of the United States for a bachelor's degree professional nursing education program.
- (c) No more than 50 percent of the program's clinical training consists of clinical simulation.
- (d) The program has signed agreements with each agency, facility, and organization included in the curriculum plan as clinical training sites and community-based clinical experience sites.
- (e) The program has written policies for faculty which include provisions for direct or indirect supervision by program faculty or clinical preceptors for students in clinical training consistent with the following standards:
- The number of program faculty members equals at least one faculty member directly supervising every 12 students unless the written agreement between the program and the agency, facility, or organization providing clinical training sites allows more students, not to exceed 18 students, to be directly supervised by one program faculty member.
- For a hospital setting, indirect supervision may occur only if there is direct supervision by an assigned clinical preceptor, a supervising program faculty member is available by telephone, and such arrangement is approved by the clinical facility.
- 3. For community-based clinical experiences that involve student participation in invasive or complex nursing activities, students must be directly supervised by a program faculty member or clinical preceptor and such arrangement must be approved by the community-based clinical facility.
- 4. For community-based clinical experiences not subject to subparagraph 3., indirect supervision may occur only when a supervising program faculty member is available to the student by telephone.

- A program's policies established under this paragraph must require that a clinical preceptor who is supervising students in a professional nursing education program be a registered nurse or, if supervising students in a practical nursing education program, be a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse.
- (f) The professional or practical nursing curriculum plan documents clinical experience and theoretical instruction in medical, surgical, obstetric, pediatric, and geriatric nursing. A professional nursing curriculum plan shall also document clinical experience and theoretical instruction in psychiatric nursing. Each curriculum plan must document clinical training experience in appropriate settings that include, but are not limited to, acute care, long-term care, and community settings.
- (g) The professional or practical nursing education program provides theoretical instruction and clinical application in personal, family, and community health concepts; nutrition; human growth and development throughout the life span; body structure and function; interpersonal relationship skills; mental health concepts; pharmacology and administration of medications; and legal aspects of practice. A professional nursing education program must also provide theoretical instruction and clinical application in interpersonal relationships and leadership skills; professional role and function; and health teaching and counseling skills.
- (2) PROGRAM APPROVAL.—
- (a) Upon receipt of a program application and review fee, the department shall examine the application to determine if it is complete. If the application is not complete, the department shall notify the educational institution in writing of any errors or omissions within 30 days after the department's receipt of the application. A program application is deemed complete upon the department's receipt of:
- 1. The initial application, if the department does not notify the educational institution of any errors or omissions within the 30-day period; or
- 2. A revised application that corrects each error and omission of which the department notifies the educational institution within the 30-day period.
- (b) Following the department's receipt of a complete program application, the board may conduct an onsite evaluation if necessary to document the applicant's compliance with subsection (1). Within 90 days after the department's receipt of a complete program application, the board shall:
- 1. Approve the application if it documents compliance with subsection (1); or
- 2. Provide the educational institution with a notice of intent to deny the application if it does not document compliance with subsection (1). The notice must specify written reasons for the board's denial of the application. The board may not deny a program application because of an educational institution's failure to correct an error or omission that the department failed to provide notice of to the institution within the 30-day notice period under paragraph (a). The educational institution may request a hearing on the notice of intent to deny the program application pursuant to chapter 120.
- (c) A program application is deemed approved if the board does not act within the 90-day review period provided under paragraph (b).
- (d) Upon the board's approval of a program application, the program becomes an approved program.
- (3) ANNUAL REPORT.—By November 1 of each year, each approved program shall submit to the board an annual report comprised of an affidavit certifying continued compliance with subsection (1), a summary description of the program's

- compliance with subsection (1), and documentation for the previous academic year that, to the extent applicable, describes:
- (a) The number of student applications received, qualified applicants, applicants accepted, accepted applicants who enroll in the program, students enrolled in the program, and program graduates.
- (b) The program's retention rates for students tracked from program entry to graduation.
- (c) The program's accreditation status, including identification of the accrediting agency.
- (4) INTERNET WEBSITE.—The board shall publish the following information on its Internet website:
- (a) A list of each accredited program conducted in the state and the program's graduate passage rates for the most recent 2 calendar years, which the department shall determine through the following sources:
- 1. For a program's accreditation status, the specialized accrediting agencies that are nationally recognized by the United States Secretary of Education to accredit nursing education programs.
- 2. For a program's graduate passage rates, the contract testing service of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing.
- (b) The following data for each approved program, which includes, to the extent applicable:
- 1. All documentation provided by the program in its program application if submitted on or after July 1, 2009.
- 2. The summary description of the program's compliance submitted under subsection (3).
- 3. The program's accreditation status, including identification of the accrediting agency.
- 4. The program's probationary status.
- 5. The program's graduate passage rates for the most recent 2 calendar years.
- 6. Each program's retention rates for students tracked from program entry to graduation.
- (c) The average passage rates for United States educated, first-time test takers on the National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing Examination for the most recent 2 calendar years, as calculated by the contract testing service of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. The average passage rates shall be published separately for each type of comparable degree program listed in subparagraph (5)(a)1.

These requirements do not apply to accredited programs.

It was the consensus of the Board that based on the approval process for remedial courses by the Florida BON, the Board would accept remedial courses approved by the Florida BON completed by an applicant.

2019 Legislative Session

The EO stated asked if the Board can take the agenda item under Correspondence regarding APRNs performing uterine aspirations, and discuss now since it also includes proposed legislation.

The Board discussed an email from Planned Parenthood inquiring if an APRN can perform uterine aspirations for miscarriages and nonviable pregnancies. Also forwarded from Planned Parenthood was proposed legislation to amend HRS §453-16 to allow other "health care practitioners", acting within his or her lawful scope of practice. I have attached the proposed legislation for your perusal.

The EO stated that on November 16, 2016, the Hawaii Medical Board ("HMB") discussed whether HRS §453-16 prohibits other practitioners, specifically APRNs with prescriptive authority from prescribing medical/medication abortion. The HMB informally opined that based on the legislative intent of 1970, APRNs with prescriptive authority may prescribe medical/medication abortions and that prescribing medication for an abortion does not fall within the meaning of abortion as set forth in HRS §453-16.

After further discussion, the Board wanted clarification from the HMB if uterine aspiration was considered a "surgical" procedure in order to further discuss if the nurse practice act would have to be amended to specifically allow APRNs to perform this procedure should the Board determine that it would benefit the health and safety of the women of this State.

Continuing Competency: Updates to Continuing Competency Booklet

The EO stated that she is working on the supplemental information sheet and hope to have the updated information by the next Board meeting.

Certification in Healthcare Compliance

The EO explained that she received a follow-up email from Ms. Von Essen who holds a certification in Healthcare Compliance. Ms. Von Essen originally inquired if the continuing education courses she completes in order to maintain her national certification would count towards the continuing education learning activity option. At the June 2018, the Board determined that "health care compliance" was an area of study that the Board previously approved for independent study course work and that the provider of the continuing education course is an approved provider listed in the Continuing Competency booklet.

The EO further explained that Ms. Von Essen is now asking if her national certification in Healthcare Compliance would exempt her from completing a learning activity.

The Vice Chair stated that the certification did not appear to meet the definition of "Competency" or "Continuing competency" as defined in HRS 457-2.

After further discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that this certification was not specific to nursing and therefore would not approve this certification.

Hawaii Nursing Continuing Competency Preceptor Activity for Nursing Employees Form Created by the HSCFN

The EO reported that at the December meeting, the Board discussed the form created by Ms. Muraoka from the HSCFN. At that time, Ms. Kodama recommended the form be amended to be utilized by both the preceptor and the nursing student instead of 2 separate forms. Also, the Board members were given time to review and provide any further recommendations by the end of the year. No further recommendations were received.

It was the consensus of the Board to accept the preceptor form and to have it posted on the Board's web page.

RN and APRN (No national certification) License – Renewal Requirements?

The Board discussed part of the following email inquiry from Ms. Raquel-Arucan:

"Because I have these licenses...what are the requirements of me for renewal in 2019? With both license (RN & APRN) for me to renew ...do I need to just provide proof of the 30 CEUs if audited. Am I on target or is there something else that I am missing to do. Please advise."

The Board determined that if an individual hold both an RN and APRN license, it would behoove the individual nurse to complete a learning activity for continuing competency to ensure that the nurse has the ability to integrate knowledge, skills, judgment and personal attributes to practice safely and ethically in the professional nursing position and in accordance with the scope of nationally recognized nursing practices.

And although this nurse may not be nationally certified in a specialized practice area as an APRN but holds a current APRN license and may not be practicing as an RN, it is the nurses' personal responsibility to complete thirty (30) hours of continuing education, if that is the learning activity he/she chooses, that suits their current nursing practice.

Two Semester Credits Learning Activity Option

The Board discussed the following email inquiry from Ms. Bayudan:

"Thank you so much for taking the time in speaking with me today. I appreciate the help. I have attached my transcript and the list of classes that I have been taking since 2017 towards the RN-MS APHN program at UH Manoa. Can you please review and see if the classes I took counts towards my learning activity.

Per the Continuing Competency Guidance and Information booklet for Nurses, Employers, and Facilities it notes:

LEARNING ACTIVITY OPTIONS

Two Semester Credits of Post -licensure Academic Education Related to Nursing Practice Completion of a minimum of two semester credits of post licensure academic education related to nursing practice from an accredited nursing program within the renewal biennium (i.e. July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2019), will satisfy as one of the learning activity options.

- Examples:
- •LPN to RN
 •RN to BSN
- •BSN to MSN/DNP
- •RN to PhD in Nursing

Clarification is needed to how many credits is needed per semester. Would like to make sure that I fulfilled my obligations to renew my RN license."

The Board reviewed the definition of "Semester credit" as defined in HAR §16-89-2 and after some discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that completion of a nursing course that is at least 2 semester credits, from an accredited nursing program completed within the prior biennium will satisfy this learning activity option.

Certified Patient Experience Professional Certification (CPXP)

The Board discussed the following email inquiry from Ms. Gregory:

I am exploring the requirements for my nursing license renewal in the state of Hawaii.

- I have recently obtained a certification in patient experience.
- I would like to request that this be considered as something that would meet criteria for license renewal as it was quite an effort to complete and pass, and is directly related to my work as a nursing professional in patient/care experience.
- Is it possible for that to be considered?
 - o If so how can I go about that request?"

After some discussion, based on the information from the webpage submitted, the Board determined that this certification did not necessarily promote nursing practice as it was not specific to nurses, however, the continuing education hours to maintain the certification may be counted towards the continuing education learning activity option if offered by an approved provider.

Healthcare Technology CE Not Specific to Nursing/Direct Patient Care

The Board discussed the following email inquiry:

"Thank you for responding. I am providing examples of two conferences which are granting CEU in other areas that do intersect with health care.

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INTERFACE Hawaii 2018, September 20, 2018

Content: Technology solutions re: Al, Cyber Security, Data Privacy, etc.

Location: Sheraton Hotel

I have read the Continuing competency booklet and called your office for clarification. Again, as I previously stated, the required CEUs are related to patient care. I acquired my BSN and MA-Organizational Management years ago, so the college course work isn't applicable to me. If you accept college courses in Health care compliance, Health care trends, issues, or policies, and Health informatics, wondering why continuing education post-graduation wouldn't be applicable?

After some discussion, the Board was unable to accept these courses towards the continuing education learning activity option for continuing competency because the Board determined that it did not meet the definitions for "Competency" or "Continuing competency".

Preceptor Credit Question

The Board discussed the following email inquiry:

"Under the learning activity option for: 120 Hours as a Preceptor for One (1) Nursing Student or Employee Transitioning into New Clinical Practice Area stated on page 24 of the handbook, my question is as follows:

I have a few nursing students that come in throughout the year for (75) hours at a time per nursing student. Would the learning activity option stated above suffice if my nurses precept for multiple nursing students that when totaled they meet well over 120 hours for multiple nursing students by the time for license renewal?" After some discussion, the Board determined that regardless of how many students the nurse has precepted, as long as the **total** number of preceptor hours equaled or exceeded 120 hours, the nurse would have met the preceptor hour(s) learning activity option.

Dissertation from Kelly J. Collins (ND)

The EO explained that she received a dissertation from Kelly Collins asking if this would qualify for the research learning activity option.

Both the Chair and Dr. Napoleon volunteered to read the dissertation to see if it meets the "nursing research project that is an institution review board project or evidence-based practice project."

Scope of Practice

RN Performing Sharp Debridement

The Board discussed the following email inquiry:

"My name is Benjamin Ramos. I am the Regional Wound Consultant for Avalon Care Group. I have searched online regarding the Scope of Practice for Registered Nurses for the state of Hawaii in regard to conservative sharp

debridement. I did find some information but I wanted a definite answer. The Board of Nursing does not state whether an RN can or cannot perform the procedure. If an RN has appropriate training and certification for sharp debridement, is the RN able to perform the procedure? The reason why I'm asking is we have a large population of patients with necrotic tissues over the wound bed. With the removal of necrotic tissues, the wound will heal faster and decrease the likelihood of developing infections. Please advise."

The Vice Chair stated that her research revealed that sharp debridement was an invasive most aggressive procedure.

The Chair stated that this procedure is performed by surgeons and believes this is a surgical procedure.

After some discussion, it was the consensus of the Board to ask the Hawaii Medical Board if sharp debridement is considered a surgical procedure.

<u>LPN/RN Performing Medical Record Summary/Review Based on Health Plan's</u> Policy

The Board discussed the following email inquiry:

"I have a question about RN/LPN licensure requirements in the State of Hawaii. Our company is an independent review organization. We do business for Health Plans and Third-Party Administrators (TPA) all across the nation. We employ remote nurses from a few states.

My question: Does the State of Hawaii Board of Nursing require nurses (either LPN or RN) to be licensed in Hawaii if they perform medical record summary/review based on a health plan's policy if the patient resides in Hawaii? We do not presently have any nurses in Hawaii, but may look to recruit in the future.

Please let me know if you have any questions or would like to schedule a phone call to discuss. I do appreciate your time and effort in responding to this inquiry. If this inquiry should go to another department/division, please forward."

The Vice Chair referred to the definition under HRS §457-2 for "Scope of practice as a licensed practice nurse" and "Scope of practice as a licensed registered nurse" but was unclear what the activity of performing medical record summary/review based on a health plan's policy.

After further discussion, it was the consensus of the Board to refer the inquirer to the definitions of LPN and RN scope of practice to determine if the activity being performed falls within those definitions and if it does, then those nurses contacting anyone residing in this State will be required to obtain a Hawaii nurse license and be familiar with the Hawaii nursing laws and rules.

<u>APRNs Performing Uterine Aspirations for Miscarriages and Nonviable</u> Pregnancies

The Board previously discussed this agenda item during the 2019 Legislative Session agenda item due to the additional distribution of proposed legislation.

RNs Performing External Jugular & Peripheral IV

The Board discussed the following email inquiry:

"I work as a Registered Nurse for a state owned medical facility. I'm having difficulty finding any information, policies or general information that covers my ability in a critical care setting (ER /ICU) to obtain ABG's and start an External Jugular (EJ) peripheral IV as a Nurse."

After some discussion, the Board determined that based on the definition of "Scope of practice as a registered nurse" under HRS §457-2, an RN who has received the appropriate education and training and pursuant to the policies and procedures of the facility, an RN may perform the activities indicated above.

In accordance with HAR § 16-201-90, the above interpretation is for informational and explanatory purposes only and based solely on the information provided. It is not an official opinion or decision and therefore not binding on the Board.

Hawaii State Center for Nursing:

It was the consensus of the Board that although nothing prohibits an APRN from obtaining certification as an Advanced Certified Hospice and Palliative Nurse, this was not a national certification for a nurse practitioner APRN recognized by the Board and that Ms. Freitas would have to maintain her Oncology CNS NP national certification for her APRN license.
