<u>Call to</u> <u>Order:</u>	The meeting was called to order at 1:05 p.m., at which time quorum was established.
	Chair Geimer-Flanders welcomed everyone to the meeting and proceeded with a roll call of the Board members. All Board members confirmed that they were present, with the exception of Franklin V.H. Dao, M.D., who was excused from the meeting.

<u>Approval of the</u> <u>January 20, 2022,</u> <u>Minutes:</u> It was moved by Vice Chair Holt, seconded by Dr. Young, and carried by the majority to approve the meeting minutes of the executive session and the minutes of the open session of the January 20, 2022 meeting, as circulated.

Dr. Takanishi entered the meeting at 1:08 p.m.

Adjudicatory<br/>Matters:Chair Geimer-Flanders called for a recess from the meeting at 1:13 p.m.,<br/>to discuss and deliberate on the following adjudicatory matter pursuant to<br/>Chapter 91, HRS (Note: Board members and staff entered the Microsoft<br/>Teams meeting). Dr. Young recused herself from this matter and did not<br/>enter the Microsoft Teams meeting to discuss and deliberate on this<br/>matter.

A. <u>In the Matter of the License to Practice Medicine of Dennis I.</u> Ayon, M.D.; MED-2010-109-L; Board's Final Order

It was noted that Dennis I. Ayon, M.D. had his name legally changed to Thomas Isadore, M.D.

Dr. Isadore entered the Teams meeting at 1:27 p.m.

Dr. Isadore exited the Teams meeting at 1:36 p.m.

Following the Board's review, deliberation, and decision on these matters pursuant to Chapter 91, HRS, Chair Geimer-Flanders announced that the Board reconvene to its regular Chapter 92, HRS, meeting at 2:18 p.m. Board members and staff returned to the Zoom meeting.

Dr. John Corboy was promoted to panelist at 2:20 p.m.

Dr. Corboy testified to Dr. Isadore's character and his willingness to serve the Wahiawa Community. He went on to inform the Board that Dr. Isadore is his internist who has provided excellent care.

Dr. Corboy appealed to the Board to reinstate Dr. Isadore's license without probation. He stated further that Dr. Isadore was convicted of a DUI and was falsely accused by a certified schizophrenic patient of soliciting the patient to cause bodily injury/harm to the mother of his child. He served his time and should be allowed to provide continued care without restriction.

Dr. Thomas Isadore was promoted to panelist at 2:26 p.m.

Dr. John Corboy was returned to attendee at 2:28 p.m.

Dr. Isadore requested that Dr. Philip Dunn be allowed to provide comment regarding this matter.

Technical support staff attempted to promote Dr. Dunn to panelist to

provide testimony several times without success.

Dr. Isadore appealed to the Board to remove the probationary status from his license, and indicated that he was unaware of Pu`ulu Lapa`au's letter stating that he was not compliant with their contract.

Chair Geimer-Flanders announced that the Board will announce their decision at the end of the meeting.

Dr. Thomas Isadore was returned to attendee at 2:30 p.m.

		The purpose of these bills is to authorize the establishment of a physician-patient relationship via a telehealth interaction, if the physician is licensed to practice medicine in the State. Effective 7/1/2050. (HD2)
		This is a carryover measure from 2021, which the Board testified in support. The S.B. was enacted as Act 34 (21).

## D. <u>HB487/SB839 RELATING TO HEALTH</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purposes of these bills are to: authorize advanced practice registered nurses, in addition to physicians, to practice medical aid in dying in accordance with their scope of practice and prescribing authority; authorize psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners, in addition to psychiatrists, psychologists, and clinical social workers, to provide counseling to a qualified patient; reduce the mandatory waiting period between oral requests from twenty days to fifteen days; and waive the mandatory waiting period for those terminally ill individuals not expected to survive the mandatory waiting period.

The Board is tracking these measures.

## E. <u>HB945/SB1099 RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF</u> <u>MEDICINE</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills is to clarify the definition of the practice of medicine to provide uniformity of practice for both medical physicians and osteopathic physicians.

These are carryover administrative bills from 2021. The Legislature used SB324/ACT 97 (21) as the vehicle.

# F. <u>HB1575 RELATING TO PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS</u>

The Board discussed this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: expand the scope of practice for physician assistants; and require a sampling of medical records, rather than all medical records, to be reviewed when physician assistants prescribe controlled substances.

Individuals representing the Hawaii Association of Physician Assistants ("HAPA") and Kaiser Permanente Hawaii presented a draft of this bill at the Board's January 20, 2022 board meeting, which the Board voted to support. The Board supports this bill, as it: (1) broadens physician assistants' scope of practice to provide a wide range of services, which would benefit the citizens of Hawaii; and (2) alleviates the overly burdensome administrative requirement of having a supervising physician review all medical records that contain written orders or prescriptions for controlled substances. The Board submitted testimony at the last hearing. At the time of the meeting, H.D. 1 was scheduled to be heard.

### G. <u>HB1667/SB2592 RELATING TO HEALTH</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purposes of these bills are to: define "clinical laboratory director" to include certain physicians, licensed clinical laboratory scientists, and pharmacists-in-charge of pharmacies; and amend the definition of "practice of pharmacy" to include the ordering and performing of certain Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments waived tests.

The Board will track these measures.

## H. <u>HB1675/SB2729 TO MEDICAL CARE FOR MINORS</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills are to: permit minors to consent to medical care and services related to the diagnosis, treatment, or prevention of HIV; specify that a minor, under certain circumstances, shall not be liable for payment associated with the diagnosis, treatment, or prevention of HIV; and authorize physician assistants, in addition to physicians and advanced practice registered nurses, to render such medical care and services to minors.

Ms. Quiogue advised the Board that these measures will allow better access to care and broadens the scope of practice of physician assistants by allowing them to provide more services.

By consensus, the Board will support these measures.

### I. <u>HB1708/SB2645 RELATING TO ACCESS TO</u> <u>BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills is to allow for standard telephone contacts for telehealth purposes related to behavior health services.

Chair Geimer-Flanders shared her personal experience regarding this matter and admitted that, in her situation as well as others, telehealth is an essential method of providing care during the pandemic. Ms. Quiogue advised the members that these measures amend the insurance code and would have to defer to the Insurance Division regarding these bills. However, notes the importance of telehealth during the pandemic.

## J. <u>HB1823/SB2680 RELATING TO HEALTH</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills is are to: authorize advanced practice registered nurses, in addition to physicians, to practice medical aid in dying in accordance with their scope of practice and prescribing authority; authorize psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners and clinical nurse specialists, in addition to psychiatrists, psychologists, and clinical social workers, to provide counseling to a qualified patient; reduce the mandatory waiting period between oral requests from twenty days to fifteen days; and waive the mandatory waiting period for those terminally ill individuals not expected to survive the mandatory waiting period.

The Board will track these measures.

# K. <u>HB2021/SB2152 RELATING TO HEALTH</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills is to: authorize state-licensed and credentialed physicians, advanced practice registered nurses, and physician assistants, who are not physically in the State, to issue prescriptions for certain controlled substances under a limited circumstance; and authorize pharmacies to dispense such prescriptions.

Ms. Quiogue advised both measures have been deferred by the House Committee on Health, Human Services, and Homelessness and the Senate Committee on Health. The Narcotics Enforcement Division ("NED") submitted testimony expressing significant concerns regarding the enforceability of the provisions of these bills. These measures would cause problems for law enforcement if a controlled substance prescriber were of out-of-state. The NED would not have be able to investigate or take action against the prescriber even if licensed in Hawaii.

# L. <u>HB2437 RELATING TO TAXATION</u>

The Board discussed this bill.

> The purpose of this bill is to establish a \$10,000 income tax credit for physicians, osteopathic physicians, and nurses who are licensed and actively practicing in the State.

The Board will track this measure.

### M. SB323 RELATING TO HEALTH

The Board discussed this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: authorize advanced practice registered nurses, in addition to physicians, to practice medical aid in dying in accordance with their scope of practice and prescribing authority; authorize psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners, in addition to psychiatrists, psychologists, and clinical social workers, to provide counseling to a qualified patient; reduce the mandatory waiting period between oral requests from twenty days to fifteen days; and waive the mandatory waiting period for those terminally ill individuals not expected to survive the mandatory waiting period.

The Board will track this measure.

## N. SB364 RELATING TO SPORTS MEDICINE

The Board discussed this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: provide a limited exemption from state licensure requirements to out-of-state physicians who accompany a sports team to a specific sporting event in Hawaii or are invited to provide services at a national sport training center, event, or competition in Hawaii, if certain conditions are met; and require out-of-state physicians to provide notice to the Hawaii medical board.

Ms. Quiogue advised members that this is a carryover measure and addressed all the Board's concerns in earlier iterations of the bill.

The Board will continue to support this measure.

## O. <u>SB598 RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF MEDICINE</u>

The Board discussed this bill, which is a carryover measure. The purpose of this bill is to clarify the definition of the practice of medicine to provide uniformity of practice between both medical physicians and osteopathic physicians.

The Board will continue to support this measure.

### P. <u>SB613, SD2/HB313 RELATING TO PHYSICIAN</u> WORKFORCE ASSESSMENT

The Board discussed these bills, which are carryover measures.

The purposes of these bills are to: repeal the requirement that no less than fifty per cent of the physician workforce assessment fees deposited into the John A. Burns School of Medicine special fund be used for purposes identified by the Hawaii medical education council; repeal the monetary cap of expenditures from the John A. Burns School of Medicine special fund; and authorize the John A. Burns School of Medicine special fund to provide loan repayment to certain physicians and scholarships to qualifying medical students. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD2)

The Board provided comments appreciating the intent of this bill, which would authorize the John A. Burns School of Medicine to use the monies collected through the physician workforce assessment to provide loan repayment to certain physicians and scholarships to qualifying medical students. The Board recognizes that this would provide an incentive for future physicians to practice in Hawai'i.

## Q. <u>SB624/HB576 RELATING TO HEALTH CARE</u>

The Board discussed these bills, which are carryover measures.

The purpose of these bills is to authorize licensed physician assistants and advanced practice registered nurses to perform certain abortions.

The Board provided comments appreciating the intent of this bill, but requested certain amendments to the measures as reflected in prior testimonies.

# R. <u>SB846 RELATING TO MEDICAL RESIDENCY</u> <u>PROGRAMS</u>

The Board discussed this bill, which is a carryover measure.

The purposes of this bill are to: appropriate funds to support and expand physician residency training programs in state teaching hospitals; and require dollar-for-dollar matching funds from private funding sources.

The Board will continue to support this measure.

### S. <u>SB1258, SD1, HD1/HB1120 RELATING TO TELEHEALTH</u>

The Board discussed these bills, which are carryover measures.

The purpose of these bills is to authorize the establishment of a physician-patient relationship via a telehealth interaction, if the physician is licensed to practice medicine in the State. Effective 7/1/2060. (HD1)

The Board will continue to support these measures.

### T. <u>SB2199 RELATING TO TREATMENT OF</u> CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019

The Board discussed this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to protect physicians, advanced practice registered nurses, and pharmacists from civil and criminal liability for prescribing or administering early treatment for the coronavirus disease 2019 in good faith to prevent hospitalization and death.

Chair Geimer-Flanders and Vice Chair Holt expressed their concerns with this measure. Both members stated that this measure would set a dangerous precedent and changes the standard of care. Chair Geimer-Flanders stated that given the high percentage of misinformation on treatments of COVID is something that she would not want to protect. This is not a measure that protects patient safety.

Vice Chair Holt and Dr. Jaffe referred to line 13 of the bill and the phrase "in good faith", which is too broad.

In addition to the above, Ms. Quiogue also noted that this measure addresses the practice of nursing and pharmacy in HRS chapter 453 by adding a new section. The Board does not regulate either of these professions.

Discussion followed. It was moved by Chair Geimer-Flanders, seconded by Vice Chair Holt, and voted by majority, with the exception of Mr. Belcher who opposed the motion, to provide testimony in opposition to this bill.

## U. <u>SB2241 RELATING TO MEDICAL CARE FOR MINORS</u>

The Board discussed this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: permit minors to consent to medical care related to the diagnosis or treatment of HIV or the prevention of HIV; provide that a minor, under certain

circumstances, shall not be liable for payment for treatment or prevention of HIV; and authorize physician assistants, in addition to physicians and advanced practice registered nurses, to render medical care and services to minors.

By consensus, the Board supports this measure as it will provide greater access to care.

#### V. SB2442 RELATING TO PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS

The Board discussed this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to streamline the records review process for physician assistants by including review of physician assistants' prescriptions for controlled substances.

The Board voted to support this bill at its January 20, 2022 board meeting.

## W. SB2445 RELATING TO PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS

The Board discussed this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to expand the authorized scope of practice for physician assistants.

The Board voted to support this bill at its January 20, 2022 board meeting.

## X. <u>HB1484/SB2017 RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL</u> <u>SERVICES</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills is to repeal section 453-34(d), HRS, which limits licensure as an emergency medical technician 1 to individuals whose practice is performed in a county with a population of 500,000 or greater.

By consensus, the Board supports these measures.

### Y. <u>SB455/HB214 RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL</u> <u>SERVICES</u>

The Board discussed these bills, which are carryover measures.

The purpose of this bill is to certify Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) to include personnel with proper certifications, to be deemed qualified to perform emergency medical services as EMTs in the State.

The Board provided comments in 2021.

#### Z. <u>SB2026 RELATING TO THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL</u> <u>SERVICES PERSONNEL LICENSURE INTERSTATE</u> <u>COMPACT</u>

The Board discussed this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to enter Hawaii into the Emergency Medical Services Personnel Licensure Interstate Compact to allow EMS personnel from other states to practice in Hawaii during a declared emergency.

Ms. Quiogue advised that this bill was deferred indefinitely by the Senate Health Committee. She went on to say that the testimony provided by the Regulated Industries Complaints Office (RICO) provided testimony expressing concerns regarding, among other things: (1) the release of investigatory records to outside agencies/third party, which is a direct conflict with the State's Constitution and privacy laws; (2) grants licensure without the ability to collect fees; and (3) allows the practice to occur without licensure or notification to the Board of said practice; and allows the Compact Governing Body to use the State's employees for functions outside of the RICO's jurisdiction.

Ms. Quiogue also referred members to the testimony of Hawaii Association for Justice ("HAJ"). HAJ made relevant points about the bill being confusing and grants overbroad immunity to Compact employees, members, etc.

By consensus, the Board voted unanimously to oppose this bill.

Ms. Quiogue asked the Board to consider adding the following bills to its agenda for discussion: SB2282/HB2210 Relating to Abortion; and SB25, SD2/HB478 Relating to Medical Care for Minors.

By consensus, members voted to add SB2282/HB2210 Relating to Abortion; and SB25, SD2/HB478 Relating to Medical Care for Minors to its agenda.

#### AA. <u>SB2282/HB2210 RELATING TO ABORTION CARE</u>

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills is to: clarify that access to abortion care is inclusive of all pregnant people in the State; and repeal a criminal penalty for violations of certain abortion provisions.

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Clarifies that advance practice registered nurses may provide abortion care.

Discussion followed. Members stated that it supports the intent of these measures as it: allows greater access to abortion care; recognizes all people in Hawaii by deleting the term "female" and replacing it with "person; and repeals criminal penalty with respect to physician providers engaging in and providing safe care.

By consensus, members voted to support the intent of these measures.

#### BB. <u>SB25, SD2/HB478 RELATING TO MEDICAL CARE FOR</u> MINORS

The Board discussed these bills.

The purpose of these bills are to: permit minors to consent to medical care related to the diagnosis or treatment of HIV or the prevention of HIV; provide that a minor, under certain circumstances, shall not be liable for payment for treatment or prevention of HIV; and authorize physician assistants, in addition to physicians and advanced practice registered nurses, to render medical care and services to minors.

By consensus, the Board will support these measures.

The Board noted that Dr. Isadore is not in compliance with its Final Order dated December 8, 2016, specifically, Condition No. 6 since he has not paid all costs of the monitoring agreement with Pu`ulu Lapa`au.
