Call to Order:

There being a quorum present, Chairperson Polischeck called the meeting to order at 8:58 a.m.

Agenda:

Committee Reports:

4. <u>Rules Committee</u>: Leonard Leong, Chairperson

Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 16-77
Proposed Amendments to the Specialty Contractor Classifications

Chairperson Polischeck explained that the Investigative Committee of the Rules Committee presented its report on its proposed amendments to Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 16-77 specialty contractor classifications to the Board at the January 18, 2019 meeting and that the Board may take action on the proposed amendments at a subsequent meeting. He invited all interested parties to submit written comments on the proposed amendments to the specialty contractor classifications.

Executive Officer Ito stated that after written comments are received by the Board it will be compiled for discussion at a future Board meeting. It was suggested by the guests that the Board allow parties sixty to ninety days to prepare and submit its written comments. The guests requested that the proposed amendments be made available before the next meeting for parties to review. Executive Officer Ito stated that it would be difficult to make a draft available before the subsequent meeting. Mr. Leong stated that the public will be able to see the changes that are proposed at each meeting. He added that the proposed amendments must go through the administrative rules process including a public hearing.

The guests inquired if the Board will take questions today. Chairperson Polischeck responded that the Board will take questions so that the parties may better direct their written comments. Blake Parsons, Sheet Metal Contractors Association, inquired why related firestopping was added to several classifications. Jeffrey Masatsugu added that it would be helpful for the Board to publish the reasons for the changes to facilitate discussion. Executive Officer Tamanaha stated that the Investigative Committee's Report are proposed

amendments for the Board and the interested parties to discuss. Anthony Borge, RMA/DGM, stated that basically, the Board is looking at each classification to make it more pertinent with current terminology. The Board confirmed that the intent of the amendments is to update the classification descriptions. Mr. Borge stated that is helpful for the parties when making comments.

Kika Bukoski inquired how the discussions will occur. Although the Board has not determined how it will organize the discussion of the proposed rule amendments, the Board will discuss comments at subsequent meetings. Chairperson Polischeck stated that this is the very early stage of the process and the Board appreciates comments from interested parties.

Mr. Isemoto stated that there is some confusion because there is the 2013 Report to the Legislature and now there is the Investigative Committee Report. Executive Officer Ito stated that the 2013 Legislative Report is included in the Investigative Committee Report. Mr. Isemoto stated that the 2013 Legislative Report included some explanations for the amendments and it would be helpful to have that in the Investigative Committee Report.

Christopher Delanay, Pacific Resource Partnership, inquired if the "B" General building contractors would hold the subclassifications of all the specialty classifications that automatically come with the "B" license. The Board responded yes.

Arnold Wong, Ironworkers Stabilization Fund, stated that the Ironworkers have introduced legislation requesting a clarification of the C-68 Classified specialist classification and he thanked the Board for the opportunity to provide comments.

Committee Reports:

### Scope of Activity Committee Nathan T. Konishi and Leslie Isemoto, Co-Chairpersons

#### a. Department of Education

Requests a determination on (1) whether the window work for the renovation of portables project at Leilehua High School may be performed by a contractor with a C-5 Cabinet, millwork, and carpentry remodeling and repairs license; and (2) whether the window work for the renovation of portables project at Leilehua High School is work that is incidental and supplemental to the C-5 Cabinet, millwork, and carpentry remodeling and repairs contractor's license.

Members reviewed and discussed the information provided by the Department of Education.

Dwayne Arelliano, Glaziers Union, stood on his January 18, 2019 testimony that the window work should be performed by the C-22 Glazing and tinting contractor even if it is for repairs as there are warranties on the windows. He added that the C-5 classification is related to carpentry work, not windows.

Mr. Masatsugu asked if the Department of Education ("DOE") submitted

additional information to the Board. Executive Officer Ito responded yes, and stated that the DOE provided the following information: the cost and extent of the renovation portion of the project is approximately \$830,000 (including but limited to roofing, painting, doors, windows, framing, insulation, gyp board, flooring, fumigation, HVAC, plumbing, electrical); and the cost and extent of relocation portion of the project is approximately \$370,000 (including but not limited to site preparation and earthwork, concrete, asphalt, water system, sewer systems, portable relocation). Mr. Isemoto added that the DOE stated the cost and extent of the window work is \$9,676 (\$3,326 for material and \$6,350 for installation) and the cost of the entire project is \$1,200,000. The DOE also provided the contract drawings of the project.

Mr. Arelliano inquired about the frames and the window slats. Mr. Konishi stated that the windows have aluminum frames and vinyl slats.

Mr. Masatsugu stood on his January 18, 2019 testimony.

Executive Session:

At 9:22 a.m., it was moved by Mr. Kagawa, seconded by Mr. Matsuzaki, and unanimously carried to enter into executive session pursuant to HRS section 92-5(a)(4) to consult with Christopher Leong, Deputy Attorney General, on questions and issues pertaining to the Board's powers, duties, privileges, immunities, and liabilities.

At 10:00 a.m., it was moved by Mr. Konishi, seconded by Mr. Kagawa, and unanimously carried to move out of executive session and to reconvene to the Board's regular order of business.

Mr. Konishi stated that the Board discussed the DC 50 Supreme Court decision with DAG Leong. Mr. Isemoto stated that the Board requested additional information on the renovation and relocation portions of the project to make a determination consistent with the DC 50 Supreme Court decision. Mr. Isemoto stated that based upon the information provided by the DOE, the window work is incidental and supplemental to the C-5 renovation portion of the project: the window work is subordinate to, directly related to, necessary for the completion and is less than a majority of the C-5 renovation portion of the project. Mr. Matsuzaki added that the primary work for this project is the renovation work.

Mr. Parsons inquired if the louvers affected the air quality and ventilation of the room. He will request to see a copy of the plans.

<u>Recommendation</u>: The window work for this project is work that is incidental and supplemental to the C-5 Cabinet, millwork, and carpentry remodeling and repairs contractor's license.

Mr. Arelliano asked for clarification that this determination is specific to this project and that the C-22 can also perform this work. Chairperson Polischeck confirmed that the determination is specific to this Project and that the C-22 can also perform the window work.

#### b. Norman's Overhead Doors Inc.

Requests a determination on (1) whether the installation of overhead steel garage doors may be performed by a C-5a Garage door and window shutters contractor; and (2) whether the C-5a Garage door and window shutters classification includes the work of the C-48a Steel door contractor.

Members reviewed and discussed the information provided by Norman's Overhead Doors Inc.

Mr. Wong inquired about the additional information provided to the Board. Chairperson Polischeck responded that the doors are being installed on a steel building. Mr. Wong stated that the C-48a contractor's license is required because of the load factor involved, it is not a door being installed on a small house, there are components that are welded and bolted to the structure. He believes that is the reason the C-48a classification was created.

Chairperson Polischeck stated that on this project, welding is required and the doors are being installed on a steel building; a C-48a contractor's license is required. Mr. Isemoto added that this project is not a renovation project. Mr. Konishi agreed that a C-48a contractor's license is required.

Recommendation: (1) The installation of overhead steel garage doors may not be performed by a C-5a Garage door and window shutters contractor; and the C-48 Structural steel or C-48a Steel door contractor is required to perform the installation of overhead steel garage doors for this Project; and (2) the C-5a Garage door and window shutters classification does not include the work of the C-48a Steel door contractor for this Project.

#### c. Contractors Association of Kaua'i

Requests an informal interpretation on the following:

- (1) If a company has only the principal RME, how long can the RME be out-of-state when the company has on-going project(s)? Does this also apply if the RME is hospitalized?
- (2) Can an electronic platform (i.e. Skype, Facebook, etc.) be used in place of an actual "on-the-jobsite" presence by the RME? If this is allowed, what is the protocol or procedure the RME and/or the company must use? What kind of documentation, if any, must be in place?

Members reviewed the inquiry and reviewed Hawaii Administrative Rules ("HAR") chapter 16-77.

Ryan Kobayashi, Laborers Union Local 368, stated that the rules contemplate having an RME be in the State and provides for disability of the RME. If the RME is disabled, the contracting entity must notify the

Board within sixty days. He believes that the RME should be in the State.

Chairperson Polischeck stated that with regard to question number 2, the RME must be in the State.

The Board came to a consensus that regardless of the method the RME uses to communicate with the employees on the jobsite, the RME must be in the State. The Board also noted that HAR section 16-77-64(b) defines "disability" and disability of the RME is treated in the same manner as the dissociation of the RME.

With regard to the second question, Mr. Isemoto stated that the Board should not determine the means and methods of how the RME directs his employees, it's the RME's responsibility to determine the protocols and procedures if he chooses to use an electronic platform. The principal RME is responsible for the direct management of the contracting business, including technical and administrative decisions.

Recommendation: (1) In accordance with HAR section 16-77-71(a)(4), contracting entities may have in their employ more than one RME, but shall designate in every case a principal RME who shall be primarily responsible for the direct management of the business of the contracting entity and who shall be in residence in the State during the time the license of the contracting entity is in effect or during the period a project is under construction. This requirement also applies when the principal RME is hospitalized, provided that the contracting entity's business is still under the direct management of the principal RME; and (2) An electronic platform (e.g. Skype, Facebook, etc.) may be used in place of an actual "on-the-jobsite" presence by the RME, provided that the principal RME is in the State during the time the license of the contracting entity is in effect or during the period a project is under construction. If the principal RME uses an electronic platform, the principal RME, who has direct management of the contracting entity's business, is responsible for establishing and implementing the protocols, procedures and documentation.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Konishi, seconded by Mr. Isemoto, and unanimously carried to approve the above scope recommendations.

#### 5. <u>Legislative Committee</u>:

Executive Officer Ito presented the Legislation Committee Report:

#### **Relating to Contractors**

a. House Bill No. 69/Senate Bill. No. 767

Raises the threshold under the contractor licensing law's handyman exemption from \$1,000 to \$1,500 and makes it applicable only to the cost of labor.

The Board previously testified in strong opposition to bills that proposed to raise the exemption from \$1,000.00 to \$5,000.00 for the following reasons:

- raising the exemption will increase the likelihood of consumer harm and contribute to the problem of unlicensed activity;
- unlicensed individuals who have not met the Board's experience, examination, and insurance requirements will legally be able to perform much more work than is currently allowed;
- negatively impacts small contractors, particularly in the specialty contractor classifications, as they will have difficulty competing with unlicensed individuals who do not have to pay license fees and maintain liability insurance; and
- consumers will not be able to file complaints with the Regulated Industries Complaints Office for poor workmanship or other problems.

After discussion, the Board could not come to a consensus on a position.

Board position: No position on these bills.

b. House Bill No. 81 - (1) Prohibits the performance of incidental and supplemental work outside the scope of licensure by a specialtycontractor acting as a subcontractor on any project requiring the seal or stamp of a licensed structural engineer; and (2) specifies that the performance of work in certain crafts or trades shall not be considered incidental and supplemental.

On January 29, 2019 the House Committee on Labor and Public Employment ("LAB") held a hearing on H.B. No. 81. The Board testified that it has strongly opposed similar measures in the past for the following reasons:

- Too many variables exist in construction work to carve out specialty classifications that cannot be performed as incidental and supplemental work.
- The Board's Final Order Upon Remand issued October 18, 2013 (BFO), should remain the current standard in the construction industry for incidental and supplemental work.

The limit of incidental and supplemental work that all specialty contractors can perform has already been established by the Hawaii Supreme Court in <u>District Council 50 v. Lopez</u>, 129 Hawai'i 281, 298 P.3d 1045 (2013) (DC 50). The Board determined that to qualify as incidental and supplemental work, that work must be subordinate to, directly related to, and necessary for the completion of the work of greater importance that is within the scope of the licensee's license (i.e., the primary work the specialty contractor is licensed to perform), and that work must represent less than 50 percent of the project (as measured in relation to the project's total cost or extent).

- Since October 2013, the Board has consistently applied this standard to numerous scope of work inquiries and carefully considers each inquiry pertaining to incidental and supplemental work and studies each project's plans and specifications. Factors considered include: life safety; cost; extent of work; number of man hours; amount of materials involved; proximity of other specialty contracting work to the primary work; and whether the work is less than a majority of the project. The Board's current implementation of its BFO is comprehensive, fair, and protects the public's health and safety.
- The bill eliminates the ability of specialty contractors acting as prime contractors to perform any incidental and supplemental work.

LAB passed H.B. No. 81 with an amended effective date of January 1, 2050 to encourage further discussion.

On February 7, 2019, the House Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce ("CPC") held a hearing on H.B. No. 81, HD1.

CPC passed H.B. No. 81, HD1 as is.

Board position: Oppose this bill for the reasons stated above.

#### c. House Bill No. 838

Exempts an eleemosynary organization that meets certain conditions from the requirement of licensure as a contractor.

On February 7, 2019, the LAB held a hearing on H.B. No. 838. The Board testified that it would discuss this measure at its February 15, 2019 meeting.

LAB passed H.B. No. 838 with an amended effective date of January 1, 2050 to facilitate further discussion and technical non-substantive amendments for clarity and style.

On February 13, 2019, the CPC held a hearing on H.B. 838 HD1 and passed the bill as is.

Board position: Oppose this bill as this exemption is too broad and puts the public's safety at risk.

Relating to the Contractors License Board

#### d. House Bill No. 156

Clarifies the qualifications for membership for the Contractors License Board. Specifies that the Contractors License Board must prioritize the protection of the public above all other considerations when exercising its functions.

On January 29, 2019, the LAB held a hearing on H.B. No. 156. The Board testified that it has not had an opportunity to review and discuss this bill; however, the Board has strongly opposed similar measures in the past for the following reasons:

Restricting the specialty contractor Board members from holding a general
contractor's license is unreasonable and unnecessary. Although a specialty
contractor's license is sufficient for the project, many project owners seem to
want a general contractor on the project. Many specialty contractors have
obtained or are in the process of obtaining their own general contractor's

licenses to bid on specialty projects, even though their primary work is in a specialty classification.

- There is no proof that a specialty contractor Board member who also holds a
  general contractor's license has been biased toward general contractors or
  harmed the public. All Board members, regardless of the type(s) of
  contractor's licenses they hold, are committed to protecting the public and
  neutral in their decision-making.
- Prohibiting public Board members from having an immediate family member who is a licensee and having any financial interest in the business of a person who holds a license appears to be unnecessary given the conflict of interest provisions that already exist in HRS chapter 84 (e.g., it is a conflict of interest

if a board member takes official action that directly affects a business or undertaking in which the board member, the board member's spouse, or board member's dependent child has a financial interest).

 Proposed subsection 444-4(a) is unnecessary because Hawaii Administrative Rules section 16-77-2 sets forth the primary intent of the Board as protecting the health, safety, and general welfare of the public.

LAB deferred this measure.

Board position: Oppose this bill for the reasons stated above.

e. Senate Bill No. 423

(1) Clarifies that a specialty contractor, acting as a subcontractor, is not prohibited from taking and executing a construction contract involving two or more crafts or trades if the performance of the work is incidental and supplemental; (2) prohibits the performance of incidental and supplemental work on any project requiring the seal or stamp of professional engineer licensed to perform structural engineering; and (3) specifies that the performance of work in certain specialty contractor subclassifications shall not be considered incidental and supplemental.

On February 5, 2019, the Senate Committee on Labor, Culture and the Arts ("LCA") held a hearing on S.B. No. 423.

The Board submitted similar testimony to H.B. 81 with an additional request to delete the scope of work for specialty contractor classifications in proposed subsection (f), as that is already set forth in Exhibit A of Hawaii Administrative Rules chapter 16-77. The Board is currently updating the descriptions of the specialty contractor classifications, and once the relevant rules are promulgated, it will be confusing to have two different descriptions for certain specialty contractor classifications.

The LCA amended this bill by deleting its contents and inserting language specifically prohibiting incidental or supplemental work outside of a specialty contractor's licensure on any work that requires the seal or stamp of a professional engineer licensed to perform structural engineering pursuant to section 464-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Board position: Oppose this bill for the reasons stated above.

Relating to Professional and Vocational Licensing

f. House Bill No. 73/Senate Bill No. 774

Prohibits a licensing authority from using rules to supersede requirements set forth in licensing laws and adopting rules that authorize an unlicensed individual to perform duties, activities, or functions that, if performed by another professional, would require licensure of that professional.

The Board was opposed to a similar bill in 2018 (S.B. 2638 S.D. 1) because the

bill only exempts apprentices or trainees who are working toward licensure in an apprenticeship program or clinical program. The Board accepts on-the-job training as qualifying experience and believes it should be exempted as well.

Board position: Oppose these bills for the reasons stated above.

Relating to Mutual Assistance Agreement

#### g. House Bill No. 1305

Authorizes the State and electrical utilities to enter into a mutual assistance agreement with an out-of-state utility to assist in the restoration of electrical power following a natural disaster or emergency.

On February 5, 2019, the House Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection ("EEP") held a hearing on H.B. No 1305.

EEP amended this bill by changing its effective date to July 1, 2100 to encourage further discussion and making technical, non-substantive amendments for clarity, consistency, and style.

DAG Leong stated that this bill and Senate Bill No. 1293 allows utility workers from other states, pursuant to a mutual assistance agreement, to assist public utilities in the State when the Governor declares a disaster under HRS chapter 127A. HRS chapter 127A permits the Governor to suspend any laws, including licensing laws, that would impede emergency functions. The proposed bill does not conflict with HRS section 444-10.6 which allows for expedited licensure when the Governor declares a disaster under HRS chapter 209.

Board position: No position on this bill.

#### h. Senate Bill No. 1293

Authorizes the State to enter into a mutual assistance agreement with an out of state utility in order to restore electrical power of the State, without regard to any regulatory law, in times of an emergency or natural disaster.

On February 11, 2019, the joint committees on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs ("PSM") and CPH held a hearing on S.B. No. 1293 and passed this bill with amendments to include the comments submitted by the Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii ("LURF"). LURF requested to expand the language to include all energy sources and utilities because in section 1 of the bill (page 2 line 6) it states that the legislature finds that all Hawaii based public utility providers are members of the Western Region Mutual Assistance Agreement ("WRMAA").

Board position: No position on this bill.

Relating to Taxation

i. House Bill No. 112

Requires a tax clearance before a professional or vocational license may be issued or renewed. Applies to taxable years after 12/31/2020.

On February 5, 2019 the IAC held a hearing on H.B. No. 112 and passed this bill unamended.

On February 12, 2019 the CPC held a hearing on H.B. No. 112 and deferred this bill.

Board position: Oppose this bill as it is already difficult to get a tax clearance for contracting entities at renewal due to the Department of Taxation's workload.

Relating to Commerce and Consumer Affairs

#### j. House Bill No. 1528

Requires the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs to suspend all fees relating to the licensing or registration of persons under its jurisdiction, from the fiscal year beginning in 2021 to the fiscal year ending in 2029.

On February 12, 2019, the IAC held a hearing on H.B. No.1528. The IAC passed H.B. No. 1528 with amendments.

Board position: Defer to next Board meeting.

Relating to Professional and Vocational Regulatory Programs

#### k. Senate Bill No. 202

Establishes repeal dates for all professional and vocational regulatory programs under the professional and vocational licensing division of the department of commerce and consumer affairs. Requires the auditor to perform an evaluation of each program prior to repeal.

Board position: Oppose this bill as the Board has concerns that HRS chapter 444 may be repealed if the auditor does not have the resources to conduct an evaluation.

Relating to the Owner-Builder Exemption

#### I. House Bill No. 1154, H.D. 1

Requires owner-builders to provide proof of withholding taxes and workers' compensation insurance. Amends fines for failure to comply with statute.

On February 5, 2019, the IAC held a hearing on H.B. No. 1154.

The Board testified that in the past it had supported additional restrictions on owner-builders to prevent abuses of the permit process which foster unlicensed contractor activity.

The IAC amended this bill by changing its effective date to July 1, 3000 and making technical, non-substantive amendments for clarity, consistency, and style.

On February 14, 2019 the LAB held a hearing on H.B. No. 1154 HD1.

Board position: Support the intent of this bill; request clarification as to who the owner is required to provide proof of withholding of applicable taxes and workers' compensation insurance for. For example, whether this requirement pertains to individuals working on the construction activity who are not employed by licensed contractors and are considered as employees of the owner.

# Chapter 91, HRS, Adjudicatory Matters:

Chairperson Polischeck called for a recess from the Board's meeting at 1:40 p.m. to discuss and deliberate on the following adjudicatory matters pursuant to HRS chapter 91.

- 1. Settlement Agreements
- a. <u>In the Matter of the Contractor's License of Mieto's Corporation doing</u> business as Mieto's Servicemaster; CLB 2017-347-L

RICO received a complaint alleging that on or about June 25, 2017, Mieto's Corporation, doing business as Mieto's Servicemaster ("Respondent") entered into a contract with two individuals for a kitchen renovation.

Respondent's responsible managing employee, Brian T. Yahata, terminated employment with Respondent on June 9, 2017, and Respondent did not have a responsible managing employee at the time Respondent entered into the above contract on June 25, 2017.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following: HRS §§444-17(9) (direct management of the contracting business of a corporation), 436B-19(17) (chapter, laws, rules or order of the licensing authority) and HAR § 16-77-64(e) (bid or enter into contracts without having a principal RME).

Respondent agrees to the voluntary surrender of Respondent's license.

b. <u>In the Matter of the Contractor's License of DCK Pacific Construction LLC;</u> CLB 2016-291-L

On or about July 23, 2016, DCK Pacific Construction, LLC ("Respondent") entered into a contract with Paul's Electrical Contracting, LLC ("Paul's") for the installation of a lighting system for a State of Hawaii project.

The project was thereafter completed.

On or about October 20, 2017, Respondent emailed Paul's indicating that they would begin to make monthly payments to Paul's to satisfy the outstanding balance on the project.

Respondent made three (3) payments of \$8,000.00 each on November 2, 2017, December 4, 2017, and January 5, 2018.

Since January 2018, no further payment has been made by Respondent to Paul's.

If proven at an administrative hearing, the allegations would constitute violations of the following: HRS § 444-17(14) (failure to pay a business debt).

Respondent agrees to pay restitution in the amount of \$170,000.00 and an administrative fine in the amount of \$2,500.00.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Matsuzaki, and unanimously carried to approve the Settlement Agreement Prior to Filing of Petition for Disciplinary Actions and Board's Final Order in the above cases.

- 2. Board's Final Order
- a. <u>In the Matter of the Contractor's Licenses of Safe Home Control, Inc. and Matthew I. Zupancic; CLB 2017-251-L & CLB 2017-275-L</u>

DAG Leong recused himself from discussion of the Hearings Officer's Findings of Facts, Conclusions of Law, Recommended Order Upon Remand, and Board's Final Order.

Daniel Jacob, Deputy Attorney General, presented the Hearings Officer's Findings of Facts, Conclusions of Law, Recommended Order Upon Remand, and Board's Final Order.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Isemoto, seconded by Mr. Konishi, and unanimously carried to reject the Hearings Officer's Final Order with the fine amount increased to \$15,000.00 as the Board's Final Order in this case. DAG Jacob will draft the Board's Final Order to revoke Safe Home Control Inc.'s license and Safe Home Control Inc. to pay a fine of \$15,000.00.

DAG Jacob left the meeting at 2:30 p.m.

DAG Leong re-entered the room at 2:32 p.m.

b. <u>In the Matter of the Contractors Licenses of Chriscontract, Inc. and</u> Christopher R. Johnston; CLB 2016-180-L

Christopher Leong, Deputy Attorney General, presented the Hearings Officer's Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law, and Recommended Order.

On or about September 22, 2016 Respondent Johnston, on behalf of himself and Respondent Chriscontract, submitted Respondents' contractor's license Renewal Applications to the DCCA.

Respondent Johnston answered "No" to question number 4 on both Renewal

Applications that asked: "Are there any liens or judgments against you?"

On or about March 28, 2013, Hardware Hawaii filed suit against Respondents alleging a principal balance due of \$84,247.26.

On or about July 26, 2013, Hardware Hawaii obtained a Judgement against Respondents in the principal amount of \$84,247.26 plus attorney's fees and costs of \$2,263.86.

On or about March 25, 2015, Vincent and Jennifer Lowell ("Homeowners") entered into a contract with Respondent Chriscontract.

The Hearings Officer found the following:

- 1) Failure to disclose judgment on renewal applications;
- 2) Contract failed to disclose bond and lien rights and contractor's right to resolve alleged construction defects prior to commencing any litigation in accordance with section 672E-11;
- 3) Failure to timely pay subcontractors and material suppliers;
- 4) Diversion of funds paid to Respondents for personal expenses;
- 5) Failure to complete the project;
- 6) Violating terms and conditions of project manual; and
- 7) Restitution should be paid.

The Hearings Officer found that Respondent Chriscontract and Respondent Johnston jointly and severally violated Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS") and Hawaii Administrative Rules ("HAR") as follows:

- a. HRS § 436B-19(2) (Making untruthful or improbable statements);
- b. HRS § 436B-19(5) (Procuring a license through fraud, deceit, or misrepresentation);
- c. HRS § 436B-19(8) (Failure to maintain a record or history of competency, trustworthiness, fair dealing, and financial integrity);
- d. HRS § 436B-19(17) (Violating Chapter 436B or applicable licensing laws);
- e. HRS § 444-17(1) (any dishonest, fraudulent, or deceitful act as a contractor that causes substantial damage to another);
- f. HRS § 444-17(4) (Wilful diversion of funds or property received for prosecution or completion of a specific construction project);
- g. HRS § 444-17(5) (Wilful departure from or willful disregard of plans or specifications in any material respect without consent of the owner that is prejudicial to a person entitled to have the construction project completed in accordance with those plans);
- h. HRS § 444-17(10) (Misrepresentation of any material fact by an applicant in obtaining a license);
- i. HRS § 444-17(11) (Failure to complete in any material respect a construction project for the agreed price if the failure is without legal excuse);
- j. HRS § 444-17(12) (Wilful failure in any material respect to comply with Chapter 444 or rules adopted thereto);
- k. HRS § 444-17(13) (Wilful failure or refusal to prosecute a project to completion with reasonable diligence);
- I. HRS § 444-17(14) (Wilful failure to pay when a debt incurred for services or materials rendered or purchased in connection with the licensee's operations

when the licensee has received sufficient funds thereof as payment for the particular operation for which the service or materials were rendered or purchased):

- m. HRS § 444-25.5(b)(1) (Failure to disclose bond and lien rights in the written contract to homeowner);
- n. HRS § 444-25.5(b)(2) (Failure to contain notice of the contractor's right to resolve alleged construction defects in accordance with HRS § 672E-11 in the written contract to the homeowner); and
- o. HAR § 16-77-80(a)(7) (Failure to include a provision within the homeowner contract explaining the lien rights of all parties performing under the contract).

For the multiple and repeated violations found, the Hearings Officer recommends that the Respondents' licenses be revoked; Respondents be ordered to pay a fine in the amount of forty-one thousand dollars (\$41,000.00) within ninety (90) days of the Board's Final Order.

The following parties were in attendance to present oral arguments: Mike Okazaki, Chuck Choi, Esq. and Chris Johnston, for ChrisContract, Inc.; Ryan Markham, Esq., attorney for Mr. and Mrs. Lowell. The Lowells were not present, though; and John Hassler, Supervising Attorney, Regulated Industries Complaints Office.

Mr. Markham stated that the Lowells have entered into a Settlement Agreement with Mr. Johnston for \$310,000.00 spread out over a number of years. He also stated that the settlement amount is non-dischargable in bankruptcy. Mr. Markham stated that the violations are serious and egregious, and caused serious harm to his clients however, the Lowells feel that Mr. Johnston can meet that obligation if he is allowed to continue working. Mr. Markham stated that the Lowell's contract with Mr. Johnston was front loaded. Mr. Markham wanted some assurance that Mr. Johnston would not front load his contracts to pay his clients and not be able to complete his projects for other clients. He reviewed some of Mr. Johnston's contracts and they are earned progress payments. Chairperson Polischeck asked Mr. Markham if he looked at all of Mr. Johnston's contracts; his concern is that Mr. Johnston still may have other front loaded contracts. Mr. Markham stated that he only looked at some of Mr. Johnston's contracts. Mr. Markham asked the Board to let Mr. Johnston keep his license.

Mr. Hassler objected to the introduction of new evidence. The Board is only allowed to look at the evidence that was presented to the Hearings Officer at the hearing.

Mr. Choi reiterated that Mr. Johnston entered into a Settlement Agreement with the Lowells and that the judgement is not dischargeable in bankruptcy. Mr. Choi asked the Board to consider that Mr. Johnston is a first-time offender with thirty years of experience. He stated that revocation of Mr. Johnston's license and a \$41,000.00 fine is too high for technical violations. Mr. Choi added that there was one small defect; workmanship was not an issue.

Mr. Hassler acknowledged that there is overlap in RICO's case and the civil action. He explained to the Board that RICO's case is separate from the civil lawsuit. Mr. Hassler informed the Board that the Hearings Officer listened to

three days of testimony before coming to his decision that revocation and a civil fine was appropriate. Mr. Hassler asked the Board to make a decision that is consistent with its prior decisions. Mr. Johnston must pay the judgment whether or not his license is revoked. Mr. Hassler stated that the Board is aware of other individuals who apply for licensure after their license has been revoked and the Board requires these individuals to pay the judgments to get re-licensed.

After discussion, it was moved by Mr. Kagawa, seconded by Mr. Isemoto, and unanimously carried to defer the Hearings Officer's Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law. Recommended Order, and Board's Final Order in the above case.

Following the Board's review, deliberation and decisions in these matters, pursuant to HRS chapter 91, Chairperson Polischeck announced that the Board was reconvening to its open meeting at 3:30 p.m.
