Report Title: Registered Pharmacy Technicians; Registration; Pharmacists-in-charge; Supervision

Description: Beginning 1/1/2026, requires pharmacy technicians to be registered. Imposes a duty on

pharmacists-in-charge to report violations conducted by registered pharmacy technicians. Specifies that supervising registered pharmacists are responsible for the actions of registered pharmacy

technicians and pharmacy interns. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD2)

b. Senate Bill ("SB") 324 & SB 1245 Relating to Pharmacists

Report Title: Insurance Coverage; Pharmacists; Reimbursement

Description: Mandates reimbursement for services provided by participating registered pharmacists practicing

within their scope of practice by private and public health plans in the State beginning January 1,

2026.

c. HB 223 Relating to Pharmacy

Report Title: Pharmacy; Pharmacists; Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy Special Fund; Pharmacist

Workforce Assessment Fees; Appropriation

Description: Establishes the Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy Special Fund to support pharmacist

workforce assessment and planning efforts. Establishes the pharmacist workforce assessment fee. Appropriates funds. Effective 7/1/3000.

d. SB 1279 & HB 561 Relating to Pharmacists

Report Title: Telepharmacy; Pharmacists; Medically Underserved Patients

Description: Authorizes a registered pharmacist under contract with a covered entity for purposes of the federal

340B Drug Pricing Program to supervise via telehealth the filling or receipt of a prescription in

certain circumstances.

e. SB 480 & HB 712 Relating to Health

Report Title: Department of Health; Affordable Health Care; Prescription Drugs; 340B Drug Pricing Program;

Pharmacies; Covered Entities; Discriminatory Practices

Description: Prohibits drug manufacturers and wholesale distributors from restricting or denying access for

pharmacies contracted with 340B covered entities to purchase 340B drugs at a discounted price under the federal 340B Drug Pricing Program. Imposes civil penalties for engaging in unfair or

deceptive acts or practices in the conduct of any trade or commerce.

f. SB 956 & HB 951 Relating to Prescription Drugs

Report Title: Prescriptions; Opiates; Telehealth; Three-day Supply

Description: Allows a patient seen in-person by another health care provider in the same medical group as the

prescribing physician to be prescribed an opiate prescription for a three-day supply or less via

telehealth.

§16-95-2 Definitions

"Remote Processing" means the entering of an order or prescription into a computer from outside a pharmacy for a pharmacy licensed or permitted by the Board.

"Remote Supervision" means supervision of nationally certified pharmacy technicians [and pharmacy interns?] via technology that, at a minimum, ensures a pharmacist (1) is readily available to answer questions of the nationally certified pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?]; and (2) verifies the work performed by the nationally certified pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?].

"§16-95-XX" Remote Prescription Processing (New Section)

- (a) Pharmacists performing remote processing may receive, interpret, evaluate, clarify, and approve medication orders and prescriptions, including medication orders and prescriptions for controlled substances classified in Schedule II, III, IV or V. Remote processing may also include order entry, other data entry, performing prospective drug utilization review, interpreting clinical data, insurance processing, performing therapeutic interventions, providing drug information services, and authorizing release of medication for administration. Remote processing does not include the dispensing of a drug. To engage in remote processing:
 - 1. The pharmacist must be a Hawaii-licensed pharmacist, unless on the premises of a pharmacy licensed or permitted by the Board. 2018
 - 2. From a pharmacy, the pharmacy must be licensed or permitted by the Board. 2019
 - 3. The pharmacist must have secure electronic access to the pharmacy's patient information system and to other electronic systems that an on-site pharmacist has access to when the pharmacy is open.
 - 4. Each remote entry record must comply with all record keeping requirements for pharmacies, including capturing the positive identification of the pharmacist involved in the remote review and verification of a medication order or prescription.
- (b) Remote processing by **nationally certified** pharmacy technicians [and pharmacy interns?] includes nondiscretionary tasks, including prescription or order entry, other data entry, and insurance processing of prescriptions and medication orders for which supervision by a pharmacist is provided using remote supervision. To engage in remote processing:
 - 1. A Hawaii-licensed pharmacist, unless on the premises of a pharmacy licensed or permitted by the Board, remotely supervises the **nationally certified** pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?] via technology that, at a minimum, ensures the pharmacist is (1) readily available to answer questions of the **nationally certified** pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?]; and (2) verifies the work performed by the **nationally certified** pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?].
 - 2. From a pharmacy, the pharmacy must be licensed or permitted by the Board. 2019
 - 3. The nationally certified pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?] performing remote processing must have secure electronic access to the pharmacy's patient information system and to other electronic systems that an on-site nationally certified pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?] has access to when the pharmacy is open.
 - 4. Each remote entry record must comply with all record keeping requirements for pharmacies.

"Remote Supervision" means supervision of nationally certified pharmacy technicians [and pharmacy interns?] via technology that, at a minimum, ensures a pharmacist (1) is readily available to answer questions of the nationally certified pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?]; and (2) verifies the work performed by the nationally certified pharmacy technician [or pharmacy intern?].

§16-95-86 Scope of practice of a pharmacy technician.

- (a) A pharmacy technician and a nationally certified pharmacy technician may perform the following tasks, not requiring professional judgment, under the immediate supervision of a pharmacist:
 - (1) Process prescription labels, drug packaging, stocking, delivery, record keeping, pricing, documentation of third-party reimbursements, and preparing, labeling, compounding, storing, and providing medication; and
 - (2) Medication preparation is permissible provided that the pharmacy technician:
 - (A) Has a working knowledge of the pharmaceutical medical terms, abbreviations, and symbols commonly used in the prescribing, dispensing, and charting of medications;
 - (B) Is able to perform the arithmetic calculations required for the usual dosage determination and solution preparation;
 - (C) Has a thorough knowledge and understanding of the pharmacy technician's duties and responsibilities, including standards of ethics and applicable laws and regulations governing the practice of pharmacy;
 - (D) Has a working knowledge of drug dosages, route of administration, and dosage forms and therapeutics;
 - (E) Has a working knowledge of the procedures and operations relating to the manufacturing, packaging, and labeling of drug products; and
 - (F) Has an appropriate working knowledge of the procedures and operations relating to aseptic compounding and parenteral admixture operations. [Eff and comp 12/24/92; comp 12/25/04; am and comp 06/22/15; am and comp 8/15/16] (Auth: HRS §461-4.5) (Imp: HRS §\$461-9, 461-10, 461-11)
- (b) A **nationally certified** pharmacy technician may also perform the following tasks, not requiring professional judgment, under the remote supervision of a pharmacist:
 - (1) Prescription or order entry, other data entry, insurance processing of prescriptions and medication orders, and record keeping as authorized for Remote Prescription Processing in "§16-95-XX"
 - (2) Transmitting orders on behalf of the pharmacist
 - (3) Communicating with patients and providers regarding information including but not limited to, verifying patient and provider information, collecting patient-reported information (e.g., medications, self-monitored test results such as vitals and blood sugar readings, patient questionnaires, etc.), relaying information from the pharmacist to the patient, follow-up scheduling or reminders (e.g., refills, lab tests, appointments, etc.), billing, pricing, initial and refill requests, prior authorizations, rejections, and order status
 - (4) Inventory management of clinic administered medication in areas that provide direct patient care

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows: 3 "§461- Telepharmacy; limited authorization for 4 5 medically underserved patients. (a) A registered pharmacist 6 who is under contract with a covered entity may oversee the 7 filling or receipt of a prescription for sale or distribution 8 via telehealth by way of an interactive telecommunication system 9 if: 10 (1) The patient for whom the medication is prescribed is 11 located at a facility operated by the covered entity;
- 12 (2) The covered entity obtained a pharmacy license for, or

 13 applied for the relocation of a pharmacy license to,

 14 that facility; and
- 15 (3) The contracted pharmacist is not located at that facility.
- (b) For purposes of this section:



"Covered entity" has the same meaning as defined in section 1 340B(a)(4) of the Public Health Service Act (42 United States 2 3 Code section 256b, et seq.). 4 "Interactive telecommunications system" has the same 5 meaning as defined in title 42 Code of Federal Regulations 6 section 410.78(a). 7 "Telehealth" means the use of telecommunications services, 8 as defined in section 269-1, including real-time audio and video 9 conferencing-based communication, secure interactive and 10 non-interactive web-based communication, and secure asynchronous 11 information exchange, to transmit patient medical information 12 for the purpose of delivering enhanced health care services and 13 information while a patient is at an originating site and the 14 health care provider is at a distant site." RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the federal 340B
- drug pricing program is essential for providing health care 2
- access to low-income and uninsured populations. The federal 3
- 340B program requires drug manufacturers to offer significant
- 5 discounts on outpatient medications to eligible nonprofit
- hospitals and safety-net providers, rural hospitals, community 6
- 7 health centers, and Native Hawaiian health centers.
- The legislature further finds that the 340B program helps 8
- stretch limited resources, allowing hospitals to reinvest 9
- savings into essential community benefits. These benefits 10
- include financial assistance for low-income patients, free 11
- 12 wellness visits, screenings, vaccinations, transportation to
- appointments, health education classes, and workforce 13
- development programs. In Hawaii, the 340B program also supports 14
- unique services such as integrating Native Hawaiian health 15
- practices into patient care. 16

The legislature further finds that, despite the program's 1 2 importance, drug manufacturers have consistently tried to undermine the benefits provided by the program by limiting the 3 use of contract pharmacies by 340B covered entities, which has 4 made it particularly difficult for patients living in rural 5 areas of the State. Contract pharmacies play a vital role in 6 ensuring that patients can access medications, especially in 7 8 rural areas where many hospitals do not have an in-house 9 pharmacy. For example, more than eighty per cent of rural 340B hospitals nationwide rely on contract pharmacies to dispense 10 medication to patients who might otherwise go without essential 11 12 treatments. 13 The legislature further finds that contract pharmacies are 14 crucial in Hawaii, where geographic barriers make access to 15 health care difficult for many residents. By partnering with pharmacies in those communities, hospitals can ensure that 16 17 patients in remote areas receive their prescribed medications without the need to travel long distances. This is especially 18 important for those requiring specialty drugs, which are often 19 available only through specific pharmacy channels. 20

RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that appropriate, timely
- 2 pain management is an integral part of ensuring high quality,
- 3 patient-centered health care. As the rising danger of opiates
- 4 became clear, the legislature acted to put guardrails in place
- 5 to protect patients from the harmful effects of overprescribing,
- 6 long-term use, and addiction. However, the legislature
- 7 recognizes the need to balance these protections with the need
- 8 for timely patient access to appropriate pain management.

For the purposes of 11 prescribing opiates or certifying a patient for the medical use 12 of cannabis, a physician-patient relationship shall only be 13 established after an in-person consultation between the 14 prescribing physician and the patient[-]; provided that a 15 patient who has been seen in-person by another physician in the 16 same medical group as the prescribing physician may be 17 prescribed an opiate prescription for a three-day supply or less 18 via telehealth by the prescribing physician."
