Approval of the Previous Minutes – October 5, 2017

The Chair called for a motion in regards to the minutes of the October 5, 2017 meeting.

There being no discussion or amendments, upon a motion by Ms. Daub, seconded by Ms. Napoleon, it was voted on and unanimously carried to approve the minutes of the October 5, 2017 meeting as circulated.

Report on September 7, 2017 Education Committee Meeting

The Chair moved to accept the recommendations from the Education Committee's Attached Report for the September 7, 2017 meeting

Vice Chair's Report:

Executive Officer's Report:

Conferences/Seminars/Meetings

2017 NCSBN Leadership & Public Policy Conference, October 11-13, 2017, New Orleans, Louisiana

The EO provided a written report to the Board. She also provided a brief verbal report on her attendance at the conference. She stated that most of the presentations are available on the NCSBN web page and that she highly recommends the presentation on "Generational Legislative Relations Strategies",

She mentioned that besides being delayed in arriving home, it was an interesting conference.

The Vice Chair also provided a written report and stated that the presentation on “Generational Legislative Relations Strategies” was very interesting.

NCSBN BON Investigator Training, October 24-26, 2017, Chicago, Illinois

The EO reported that Karen Axsom, RICO Investigator (Hilo Office) and Billy Chin, RICO Investigator (Oahu Office) attended and she anticipates that both Ms. Axsom and Mr. Chin will provide a report for the Board’s December meeting.

Hawaii State Center for Nursing Community Conversations 2017: Workforce Data, October 10, 2017, Queen’s Conference Room

The EO asked if anyone was able to attend? No one was able to attend.

Hawaii’s 2017 Health Care Leadership Conference, November 2-3, 2017, Royal Hawaiian Hotel

The EO reported the Chair, Ms Kodama and Ms. Boyer will be attending the second day of this conference tomorrow and they will report at the December meeting.

2018 Legislature

The EO reported that there may be a bill to amend the insurance regulations to include a more general definition for “health care provider” and to delete references to specific health care professions. This amendment would still allow APRNs to be reimbursed for services that fall within their scope of practice.

When a final draft is available, the Board will be able to review.

Amendments to Title 16, Chapter 89 – Status Report

The Board was provided a copy of the memo to the Small Business Regulatory Review Board (“SBRRB”) and the latest draft of the proposed rules. Amendments in this draft include:

- Placing a limit (3) as to how many times a candidate may sit for the NCLEX before being required to take a remedial course;
- Allows the Board to require all nurse applicants to obtain an additional background check, including a self-query report from the National Practitioner Data Bank;
- Includes failure to report oneself or the director of nursing, nursing supervisor, peer or colleague, any disciplinary action, termination or

resignation of a nurse before conclusion of any disciplinary proceeding as “unprofessional conduct”;

- Amends APRN “recognition” to APRN “license”;
- Allows the Board to conduct a random audit of the renewal of APRNs with prescriptive authority compliance with the continuing education requirement; and
- Technical, non-substantive amendments for clarification.

The EO asked if there were any questions. There were none.

Nursys – Status Report

The EO reported that there was a conference call with NCSBN’s staff and the Department’s IT personnel about Hawaii’s participation in Nursys and that at this time, we can only provide some of the “mandatory” information to Nursys.

Another meeting is scheduled for tomorrow with the Department’s IT personnel and Licensing Administrator.

Temporary/Conditional Nurse License for LPN

Issuing a License to AS in Nursing Candidates Eligible for NCLEX-PN – Kapiolani Community College

The EO explained that at the September Education Committee meeting, the Committee discussed the issue of an RN student sitting for the LPN exam but not being issued a license to practice. The basis for not issuing a license to practice as an LPN was due to the fact that the RN student did not graduate or receive a diploma, certificate of achievement or nursing degree pursuant to HRS §457-8.

The EO reported that these students were being issued a LPN license to practice after passing the LPN exam even though they did not graduate or receive a diploma, certificate of achievement or nursing degree and that the concern was that these individuals may drop out of the RN program because they now have a license to practice as an LPN, and may even endorse to another state even though they have no nursing degree or diploma.

The EO stated that when the RN student applies to sit for the NCLEX-PN, the nursing program submits a “Student Status Sheet” that indicates that a particular student has “successfully completed” the minimum education requirements to sit for the NCLEX-PN. The Board has been accepting this document, signed by someone at the nursing program, in order to allow the student to sit for the NCLEX-PN exam.

Upon review of the form(s), it was determined that if the "Student Status Sheet" was "Certified by" instead of "Reviewed by" and signed by the Nursing Program Administrator or School Registrar, the Board may accept this document, along with a certified transcript for the student, and provided the student passes the NCLEX-PN exam, to issue the LPN license to practice.

It was the consensus of the Board that based on the information provided and upon review of the applicable laws and rules, the Board informally opined that the student's status sheet, if "certified" by the Nursing Program Administrator or School Registrar, may be considered a "certificate" in accordance with HRS §457-8 and therefore, if a RN student who completes the LPN curriculum and passes the NCLEX-PN exam and submits a certified transcript indicating the LPN curriculum completed, the individual may be issued a license to practice as an LPN provided the applicant meets all other additional licensing requirements.

If the Board receives a status sheet that indicates that it was "Reviewed by", the student may be able to sit for the NCLEX-PN but will NOT be issued an LPN license to practice.

Continuing Competency

Inquiry from Joelle Phillips, Chair, Hawaii State Center for Nursing Residency Program

The Board reviewed and discussed the following questions from Ms. Phillips and recommendations from the Hawaii State Center for Nursing and responds to the email inquiry as follows:

1. Clarification needed on out-of-state CE rules. Which out-of-state organizations will be allowed to provide CEs for Hawai'i nurses?

Response:

If the provider or approver is out-of-state AND the national certifying body that they are approved by is included in the list "CE Providers (a), (b), (c), (d), or (e), then the CE activity will be recognized by the Board.

Example: CE activities provided or approved through the "Western Multi-State Division" which includes Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho and Utah will be accepted because they are accredited by ANCC (on Provider (a) list, pg. 20). <http://www.westernmsd.org/MainMenu/CE>

2. Clarification needed on new grad residency completion dates for those whose start or end dates are not completely within the 2 year time-frame. Will those whose start or end dates are partially within the 2 year time-frame be allowed to use residency as CEs?

Response:

Completion of a board-recognized nurse residency program is defined as meeting the requirements established in the guidelines.

Furthermore, completion is defined as “graduating, finalization or completing the residency program within the biennium” (i.e. July 1, 2017-June 30, 2019). Qualification is based on the date of the program completion, alone. Start dates may or may not fall within the biennium. The learning activity option may only be used by the nurse in the biennium in which the nurse residency program is completed.

3. Can there be more emphasis on the disallowance of life support training as CEs? Many nurses may be unaware that life support training cannot be used as CEs. Greater emphasis is requested to make clear these are not countable as CEs.

Response:

The Board previously discussed this and determined that these courses would not count towards the CE requirement for the following reasons:

- These courses involve renewing a “skill” and does not necessarily add to the nurse’s “knowledge”. The purpose of Continuing education is professional development; and
- This may be an “employer” requirement.

4. Clarification of the Preceptor’s Learning Activity Option: What is the definition of “an organized preceptorship program”? Can what constitutes “an organized preceptorship program” be clarified?

Response:

An organized preceptor program is one that includes a formal agreement between the student, school the student is enrolled in, and the preceptor OR the employee, preceptor, and employer of the employee and preceptor.

All preceptor hours must occur within the biennium (i.e. July 1, 2017-June 30, 2019)

Requirements to demonstrate organized preceptor activities for nursing student(s):

- Student name
- Name of school
- Program
- Year of expected graduation
- Preceptor experience objectives

- Precepted hours
- Signature of school of nursing faculty confirming completed precepted hours

Requirements to demonstrate organized preceptor activities for employee(s):

- Employee name
- Employee former specialty area (or “new grad” for new grad)
- Employee new specialty area
- Preceptor experience objectives
- Precepted hours
- Signature from facility clinical educator or CNO/DON

5. Can the State or BON provide a CE tracking document, for both employers and for individual nurses?

Response:

Not at this time. There are some national certifying organizations that are able to keep track of one’s CE, but please make sure that any report generated includes the name of the nurse, date of the course taken, name of course(s) and hours. Also, the nurse is responsible for maintaining their own records.

Hawaii State Center for Nursing – Summary of Continuing Competency Awareness Data from the 2017 Nursing Workforce Supply Survey

The EO reported that based on the 2017 Nursing Workforce Supply Survey, there was an 80% awareness among hospital-employed nurses on the continuing competency renewal requirement, however, there are still nurses who are not aware of the continuing competency renewal requirement, specifically LPNs working outside of hospitals and nurses not currently employed in-state.

The EO stated that she is checking to see if PVL will approve a mail out post card reminder of the continuing competency requirement to all nurses, in-state and out-of-state and ensure that the nurse applications also include this information on the renewal requirements.

2018 Board of Nursing Meeting Schedule

The Board was provided a copy of the 2018 Board of Nursing Meeting Schedule that is attached to these minutes and will be posted on the Board’s web page.

Correspondence

NCSBN

NCSBN Passport – Deactivated Accounts due to 90 Days of Inactivity

The EO reported that she received an email from NCSBN about “deactivated” accounts. She encouraged the members to log on to NCSBN and participate in webinars if possible. There are also articles and research materials of interest. She stated that if a member wants to attend an NCSBN sponsored conference or meeting, they would have to have an “active” account. If the account is “deactivated” then the member may not be able to attend the conference or meeting.

Legislative Updates

The EO reported on the following:

➤ Legislative Update 9/29/17

Bills that were enacted:

California – Increases the maximum fine for the discrimination or retaliation of a health care facility against a patient or health care worker who has participated in an investigation or administrative proceeding concerning the facility.

Bills that were introduced:

US H – Provides for the Veterans Opioid Abuse Prevention Act. This Act directs the VA to enter into an memorandum of understanding with the national network of state-based PDMP to ensure VA health care providers participate in such networks to monitor prescription drug use among veterans.

Illinois – Defines “retail health care facility,” makes changes to workplace safety requirements for facilities and hospitals, and requires a workplace violence prevention programs and whistleblower protection.

➤ Legislative Update 10/6/17

Bills that were enacted:

California – Extends the sunset of the CA RN board until 2022, provides an intervention program to identify and rehabilitate RNs with impaired competency due to substance abuse or mental illness, and makes changes to continuing education requirements and disciplinary measures. It also requires the California Research Bureau to deliver a report to the Legislature evaluating the extent to which employers voluntarily report disciplined nurses to the board.

California – Authorizes the Board of Nursing to either hear a petition regarding reinstatement of license or assign the petition to the Office of Administrative Hearings.

Delaware – Allows licensing boards to recognize education, training, and experience for all current and former military personnel.

Bills that were introduced:

US H – Ensures that patients receive accurate health care information and requires the identification of the licensure of health care professionals.

Illinois – Urges Congress to pass US HR 2574 for scholarships programs to help insure an adequate number of health care professionals in all areas.

➤ Legislative Update 10/16/17

Bills that were enacted:

California – Extends the sunset of the VN Board to 2021 and temporarily removes the current Executive Officer position and establishes one to be appointed by the Governor. This bill also requires the board to appoint an administrative and enforcement program monitor to evaluate the board's processes and procedures and requires relevant reports to be periodically submitted to the Legislature.

Bills that were introduced:

Michigan – Would modify the licensing process to incorporate and enter Michigan into the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact.

Pennsylvania – Authorizes the state to join the Physical Therapy Licensure Compact.

US H – Amends the Controlled Substances Act to grant greater flexibility in allowing certain pharmacists to dispense narcotic drugs for maintenance or detoxification treatments.

New Jersey – Permits law enforcement to access prescription monitoring information without the requirement for a court order or subpoena.

Ohio – Provides for firearm training for "tactical medical professionals,"

including EMTs, nurses, APRNs, and physicians. This bill would permit these professionals to carry firearms while on duty and grant them the right to carry a concealed handgun after receiving such training and being authorized by the law enforcement agency.

➤ Legislative Update 10/20/17

Bills that were introduced:

US H – Requires education on pain management and addiction as a condition of registration to prescribe or dispense opioids.

US HR – Ensures that VA physicians report to state licensing authorities impaired, incompetent, or unethical health care activities in a timely manner.

Wisconsin – Clarifies that APRNs and physician assistants are permitted to issue prescription orders as an act delegated by a podiatrist.

➤ Legislative Update 10/27/17

Bills that were introduced:

Wisconsin – Makes various changes to APRN statutes, including clarifying title, requiring an APRN license in addition to an RN license, changing certification requirements, and repealing the requirements for collaborative agreements.

Illinois – Requires hospitals to designate patient-care areas where peace officers may not enter without the consent of the health supervisor or a valid search warrant. The bill also makes changes to provisions concerning DNA submissions.

Opioid Toolkit – Prescribing Opioids

The EO reported that in an effort to prevent overprescribing, many associations, governmental organizations and regulators created specific opioid prescribing continuing education materials, guidelines and toolkits. NCSBN has created a toolkit to reach those materials. The toolkit can be accessed at:

The EO recommends that all APRNs with prescriptive authority for controlled substances go to the NCSBN's web page to view the materials online.

AANP – APRNs Prescribing Medication Assisted Therapy

The Board reviewed an email and letter from the AANP encouraging training for APRNs who are able to prescribe buprenorphine for the treatment of addiction.

The EO checked with the Department of Public Safety, Narcotics Enforcement Division (“NED”) on whether or not Hawaii APRNs that are registered with the NED and DEA are allowed to prescribe buprenorphine for the treatment of addiction. According to the NED, according to HRS 329-38 a prescriber, such as an APRN with prescriptive authority, can prescribe buprenorphine as long as the APRN meets federal training requirements and holds a separate DEA X registration number. APRNs only recently received authority for buprenorphine at the federal level and state law would allow this so long as the APRN meets federal requirements.

The EO will look into where the APRN can obtain the required “training”.

NCSBN National Accreditation of Pre-Licensure Nursing Programs

The Board reviewed correspondence from NCSBN stating that their NCSBN Standards Development Committee has developed a standard related to boards of nursing requiring national nursing accreditation. They are asking for comments, or feedback to the draft standard.

The Board had no comments at this time.

Scope of Practice Inquires

LPN/Phlebotomy Certified Performing Blood Draws, IV Therapies, Injections

The Board reviewed the following email inquiry:

“I have a question regarding licensing and phlebotomy. We currently employ a practical nurse (not licensed in the state of Hawaii) with a phlebotomy certificate in our office. We are a naturopathic office with 2 state licensed naturopaths. We offer our patients iv therapy, b-12 injection, iron injections, etc.

Is it legal in the state of Hawaii to allow a practical nurse to do blood draws, iv therapies, injections, etc.? She would be under the supervision of a license naturopath.”

The EO stated she believes the Department of Health regulates phlebotomist.

The Board by consensus refers this inquiry to the Department of Health as the Board of Nursing has no jurisdiction over phlebotomist. However, should the inquiry pertain to a Hawaii “licensed” practical nurse, a licensed naturopath is not included in the LPNs scope of practice to carry out the orders of.

Authority of Health Care Providers to Practice Telehealth – Proposed Rule by the VA

The Board reviewed an article from www.federalregister.gov that states the VA proposes to amend its medical regulations by standardizing the delivery of care by VA health care providers through telehealth. This rule would ensure that the VA health care providers provide the same level of care to all beneficiaries, irrespective of the State or location in a State of the VA health care provider of beneficiary. This proposed rule would achieve important Federal interests by increasing the availability of mental health, specialty, and general clinical care for all beneficiaries.

Hawaii State Center for Nursing:

Ms. Oliveira stated the results of the workforce survey are expected to be published in the next two weeks. They are working on their annual report that will go out to the legislature and will be packaging the workforce survey into that. In the meantime, they have been publishing a lot of info graphics on their website coming out of the data of the survey. In terms of policy, they have the preceptor tax credit bill is in progress and they are gearing up for the upcoming legislative session.

The EO stated that Mary Boland earned the Healthcare Association of Hawaii's Executive Award. Nominees must demonstrate health care leadership in the community, serve as an inspiration for colleagues, and lead by innovation.
